Incumbents Are Winners Three Close Contests

Eastland To Meet Weatherford Here Game Sunday

The Eastland hardball Mavericks, with a revamped lineup that was much promise in a 4 to 1 victory at Mineral Wells Sunday, will take on Weatherford at 3:00 p. m. Sunday at Firemen's Field.

Several former Eastland High School players, including Lewis Spivey, Bobby Blair, Jimmy News, Dick Sparks and Billy Schier, played with the Eastland club at Mineral Wells. The game was unusual in that not an out was scored by either team.

The Weatherford contest should be closely contested. Neither team has done too well in Brazos Valley League play, and they are about equally as to ability.

Softball Injury Proves Not Serious

Wiley Nominated Draft Board

Dick Sparks of Eastland, Edward of Rising Star and E. W. of Breckenridge have been nominated by Governor Jester as members of the draft board, which also includes Stephens County, according to press dispatches Thursday.

Board is No. 36 among the boards. Wiley will have the duty of administering the first peacetime draft, rules set up by Congress recently passed law.

Governor Jester recommended names of board members to President Truman, and their appointment was considered certain.

Crossley, Williams And Davenport Gain Primary Victories

Three hotly contested Eastland County races were all decided in favor of the incumbents in Saturday's primary as District Judge George Davenport, County Judge Lewis Crossley and Sheriff J. B. Williams won by close counts.

Judge Davenport's race was the closest as he nosed out Earl Conner, Jr., by an unofficial 99 votes, 3400 to 3301.

Judge Crossley won over Clabe Eldridge 3502 to 3115, and Sheriff Williams beat Jack White 3545 to 3168.

Results of the primary were to be canvassed by the Eastland County Democratic Committee before the county Democratic convention to be held in the 91st District Courtroom at 2 p. m. Saturday.

Delegates to the convention had been named at precinct conventions held last Saturday.

In what came the closest to being an upset, Billie Mac Jobe surprised many in Eastland County by sweeping to a clear victory in the race for state representative, 107th Floterial District. Jobe won a huge majority in his native Callahan County, and came in a close second to the incumbent, L. R. Pearson of Ranger, in Eastland County. In this county, Pearson had 3315 votes, Jobe 2866 and Charles H. Dawson of Cross Plains 418.

Turner Collie of Eastland won re-nomination to the Legislature easily in the 106th District over Millard Slaughter of Ranger, 4272 votes to 2213.

In the race for associate justice of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals, Allen D. Dabney of Eastland led in the county with 3559 votes, followed by Cecil C. Collings of Big Spring with 1819, and Judge Courtney Gray of Brownwood, the incumbent, with 1172.

In the district, Judge Collings led, with Dabney second. A runoff will be required to determine the winner.

In Eastland County Precinct 1, E. E. Wood won from J. W. Cooper in the justice of the peace race, 1200 votes to 582, and Dug Barton won from C. C. Street in the constable's race, 1042 to 730. Wood and Barton are the incumbents.

Eastland County gave Harley Sadler a 3508 to 3123 lead over Pat Bullock in the state senatorial race, but Bullock won in the district.

The county followed the state trend in giving Coke Stevenson a lead in the hot race for U. S. Senate, with 2624 votes, closely followed by Lyndon Johnson with 2271, and with George Peddy trailing with 1321.

Gov. Beauford Jester led the field in the governor's race in the county, but failed to win a majority as he did over the state. Caso March got 1744 of the county's votes and Roger Evans got 1208.

Arch Bint of Cisco, Ed Castleberry of Eastland and Henry Carter of Rising Star all were returned to the Commissioners Court, but the other place, in Precinct 2, will be determined by a runoff between A. M. Thurman and B. M. Bennett, the two top men in a field of six which contested for the right to represent the Gorman-Carbon-Desdemona precinct on the court.

Dr. R. L. Donahue, agronomist for the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, will meet with the 16 Eastland County farm unit demonstrators in the County Courtroom in the Courthouse in Eastland at 2 p. m. Friday for a discussion of the demonstration practices.

The demonstrators receive free TVA fertilizer to use on crop and pasture lands to show the value of synthetic fertilizers.

Dr. Donahue will bring with him a visitor to this country from India who is studying agricultural developments.

County Tax Rate Likely To Remain At Sixty Cents

Eastland County's tax rate next year likely will be the same, 60 cents on the \$100 valuation, as it was this year, County Judge P. L. Crossley said Thursday.

The estimate on the tax rate was based on work done by the County Equalization Board, which is made up of the Commissioners Court, and on knowledge of how much money will be needed to keep the various county funds in good shape.

Judge Crossley said that the tax collection campaign has wrung a whole lot of more or less fictitious tax values out of the county's tax rolls, but that new construction and other new values will leave the county's assessed taxation value at about the same as a year ago.

Then, the total assessed value of the county was a little over \$20, 210,000.

For the first time in several years, the county will have to assess five cents of taxes for the jury fund, Judge Crossley said. The five-cent tax levied for the fund about four years ago brought in enough money to keep the fund going until now, he said.

However, because of the county's increasingly good bond outlook, the levy for payment of county road bonds will be cut five cents in all probability, leading to the conclusion that the 60-cent tax total can be maintained.

The equalization board is winding up its business for the year, the county judge said. He said, however, that no totals have been run on the amount of county tax valuations wrung out of the rolls as the result of the tax collection campaign.

This happened because much property that was on the rolls at high valuations has been sold recently for low delinquent taxes, and put back on the rolls at much lower but more realistic figures.

In the end, Judge Crossley admitted, this will mean more taxes collected, since the new owners are likely to pay taxes while almost all of the property sold had been tax delinquent for many years, with no taxes collected at all. However, the shakedown does have a lessening effect on the total tax valuation of the county.

Dairy Group Begins Campaign To Get Breeding Program

Owners of about 125 dairy cows in Eastland County signed their animals up for the proposed artificial insemination program of the Eastland County Dairy Association at the monthly meeting of the association at the Rising Star High School Monday night.

Almost no dairy herd owners from the Eastland area were present at the meeting, and other parts of the county were thinly represented also. About 80 attended, many of them students in the Eastland County Vocational School agriculture courses in Rising Star.

A committee was appointed by A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, president of the association, to sign up more dairy cows under the artificial insemination program.

Owners of one or more dairy cows interested in the program were asked to contact the committee in their community. Those appointed include H. J. Tanner for Eastland, L. R. Higginbottom for Gorman, Preston Capers for Kokomo, Harry Crowe for Carbon, Cecil Shultz for Rising Star and Myrick for Cisco.

It was pointed out that for a fully successful artificial insemination program, 1200 cows will have to be included in the breeding circle. Under that type of program, a technician could be bull stud at Dallas would be used, and calves born to registered cows under the program would be subject to registration.

Eastland men attending the Rising Star meeting included County Agent J. M. Cooper, Dr. C. M. Patterson, E. E. Witt, H. J. Tanner, J. P. Kilgore and L. E. McGraw.

The next meeting of the association will be in the county courtroom in Eastland at 8 p. m. Monday, August 30.

The oldest of the boys was returned to the state reformatory at Gatesville, where he had once been, and the other two were to be released to juvenile authorities at Corpus Christi.

Rig Shut Down Awaiting Casing; Total Depth 3185

Drilling had progressed to 3185 feet Thursday at the Tex-Harvey No. 1 City of Eastland wildcat well near Lake Eastland, and drillers said the hole was in the top of the once prolific Lake sand.

The rig was shut down awaiting the arrival of two truckloads of seven-inch casing from Illinois. After the casing is set and cemented, there will be a 72-hour wait for the cement to set, and then testing will be started with a cable tool rig, the drillers said.

High hopes are held for production from the Lake sand, but if no pay is found there, the cable tool rig will be used for drilling to the Ranger and Marble Falls pay zones, and on to the Mississippi and Ellenburger if necessary.

If pay is hit in commercial quantities in any of the pay zones, another well will be drilled by the Tex-Harvey firm 600 feet north of the wildcat. If no pay is hit in any zone, said a driller, "that will be the end of that," indicating the company is staking its entire hopes for a paying well on its block of leases north of Eastland on the one well.

The first drill-stem test on the well probably will be run some time early next week, it was indicated.

The well is located about 600 feet from the east shore and 1100 feet from the south shore of Lake Eastland, in a bend of the lake not far from the dam. If oil production is found and a second well drilled, it will be about half way between the first test and the southern shore of the lake.

The Lake sand once produced much oil in wells not too far from the present test. However, old time observers in Eastland said they could not recall a well producing from the sand that was located south of the course of the Leon River, now under the lake.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is here-

by amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, of fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties in this State beginning January 1, 1949; providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

ed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Building Index In Texas Shows Gain

Austin, Texas— Building permits in Texas declined 8 per cent from May to June, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

The Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index rose 11 per cent in June to 521 per cent of the base period (1935-39). Compared to the June 1947, building permits stepped up 14 per cent.

Many substantial increases were reported. Cities whose building permits more than doubled from May were: Kerrville, Lockhart, Del Rio, Texas City, Wichita Falls, Marshall, Victoria, Brownsville, and Plainview.

On the other hand, a number of cities turned in decreases for June. Paris permits fell 86 per cent; Big Spring, 70 per cent; Brownwood, 63 per cent; Childress, 57 per cent; and Denton, 56 per cent, for the greatest declines over the month.

The most outstanding gains over the year occurred in Lickhart and Kenedy. McAllen permits increased seven-fold; Borger, five-fold; Pampa, four-fold; and Brownsville and Victoria, three-fold, from a year earlier. The greatest decreases in per-
