Democrats Split Over Referendum; Not On Ballot

Eastland County's Democratic convention Saturday, split by dissension over loyalty to the Truman-Barkley ticket as were other county conventions over the state, was carried by the anti-Truman forces by a close 6-5 margin.

But whether the debate and the vote would have any practical A warmup card is scheduled effect was in doubt, because of Saturday night of this week in the the form taken by the resolution which was the crux of the debate

The resolution, similar in form to those introduced in county conventions all over Texas, asked Governor Jester and the state Dmocratic central committee to have put on the Aug. 28 run-off primary ballot a referendum proposal. Voters in the referendum would indicate whether they wantd to vote for electors favorable to the Truman-Barkley ticket or favorable to the "Dixiecrat," Thurmond-Wright ticket.

The resolution was carried in the convention by the 6 to 5 margin, the vote taken by voting pre cincts. Sixteen of the county's 27 precincts were not represented at the convention, and there were about 35 persons present.

However, after the convention Democratic Oscar Lyerla said he had no intention of putting the referendum on the run-off ballot in Easland County, anyway, because he considered it illegal.

In any event, he pointed out the ballots had to be printed this week so absentee balloting can begin Sunday, and he couldn't wait to find out how the controversy turned out over the state. So it appeared Eastland County voters will not decide on their that the Eastland population choice of the Dixiecrats or loyalty seems to have grown somewhat in to Truman, at least not on the August 28 ballot.

Stock Shipments **Show Decline**

Austin. Texas— Texas shipments of livestock in June slid 20 percent below May levels, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

June movements totaled 8,870 carloads, or 12 per cent below a year earlier.

Hog shipments decreased the greatest over the month-29 per cent; while cattle shipments, down 27 per cent, followed closely behind. Movement of calves and sheep increased 8 and 4 per cent, respectively, from May.

Compared to June 1947, hog shipments climbed 31 per cent, despite the slack in shipments over the month. The other groups registered dclines: sheep, 23 per cent cattle, 12 per cent; and calves, 6 per cent.

Interstate shipments plus Fort Worth dipped 17 per cent from May and 10 per cent from a year

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949, and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis be

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

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

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


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
