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Stevenson Gains Tight Election Through Error Here

Eastland County's run-off primary, which had been expected to be a fairly tame business, got a state spotlight this week when a vote net error in favor of Stevenson over Lyndon Johnson was discovered Monday night. Stevenson's major part of the 362-vote lead when the Texas Election Bureau compiled the totals for the state Thursday.

The error, purely a clerical one on the first figures written on the election chart used Friday night to tabulate the vote, came when Johnson was given 382 votes on the chart and Stevenson 282 votes.

In fact, the votes had been opposite, with Johnson getting 282 votes and Stevenson 382. The mistake was on Box 1, the Grand Courthouse box, the first report Saturday night after the election.

Lyndon Johnson, the Democratic county chairman, and Paul McDaniel, the official vote tabulator for many years, found the error Monday night while checking the chart against the returns from the election judges.

When Johnson issued a statement hinting he had been a victim of foul play in Eastland County, Lyndon invited Johnson supporters to attend the canvass of the votes on Tuesday afternoon, and on Wednesday afternoon, when he was in the home of Alexander Bickley of Abilene and the Roberts of Breckenridge.

Lyndon expressed himself as being satisfied that an honest mistake had been made—and Stevenson had led by a bare margin on the basis of the complete unopposed returns from all counties of the county, on the basis of the correct total, gave Stevenson 382 votes to Johnson's 2317.

On an even closer race, Eastland County gave its own citizens Allen D. Dabney, a 2499 vote to 2458 for Cecil C. Collins of Big Spring in the race for associate justice of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Abilene.

The district as a whole, Collins won handsily, and will be next associate justice, barring an unprecedented upset in Abilene.

Sidelights

Oscar Lyerla, the foghorn-voiced Democratic county chairman whose humor sometimes cuts pretty deep, was ragging Eastland's Assistant Postmaster Percy Harris the other evening about the mail delivery at Flatwood.

Lyerla said, during a lull in the election returns, that Rural Mail Carrier Fred Davenport has a system of his own for getting out attendance at the Flatwood church.

Davenport mixes the mail up so among the people on his route that they have to take the mail to church to get it sorted out to the right people, and anyone who misses going to church doesn't get his mail that week, Lyerla declared.

Here and now I want to state that the above is a joke, and was so intended by Lyerla, and that Davenport is a good mail carrier, and doesn't get the mail mixed up any more than the next one. I'll let you argue how much that is.

Anyway, Lyerla wound up by saying that Davenport had delivered one of Davenport's bills to Lyerla's house with the evident hope that Lyerla would pay it, but he didn't.

I have on hand a report on a citizens' committee report to the Texas Gilmer-Aiken Committee on Education saying "The movement of grouping small school districts is sweeping the State of Texas," and elaborating to say that big economies are achieved by the move, by cutting administrative expenses and reducing the numbers of teachers needed by having larger classes in larger schools, instead of smaller classes in smaller schools. In addition, larger high schools offer a wider choice of subjects, and better facilities.

All of this is sound doctrine, and Eastland County School districts could well take heed. What you have in many instances is a battle between selfish community pride in keeping the schools, against better education and more economical education.

You can't blame the people in the smaller communities. Their school is the center of their community life. Many have expensive school plants for which they have taxed themselves heavily.

Eastland County has too many small school districts and too many small schools, for economy or efficiency. A master plan of eventual consolidations could well be drawn up by a county-wide committee, but any such plan would draw bitter opposition from local groups. Meanwhile, we have a hodge-podge of education in the county, some good, some fair, some poor, and the pupils in the less efficient schools suffer.

I was quite disappointed when the Commissioners Court Monday discussed eliminating some of the county's voting boxes, and cut out only one, that at Mangum. There had been 27 voting boxes in the county, and now there are 26.

There should be no more than 12 or 13 at the most. The extra judges and clerks add to the cost of elections; make the primary assessments against county office-seekers almost too heavy to bear. The small boxes make the entire election machinery cumbersome. Are they really needed? Figure it out for yourself—the election precincts were set up in horse and buggy days; now almost every farmer and rancher has a car.

The county commissioners can cut down the number of boxes any August they feel like it; the reason they haven't is that they are afraid they'll lose votes by doing it.

Mavericks Show Lack Of Experience In Scrimmage Play

Eastland High School's football Mavericks proved willing but green in a head-to-head scrimmage Tuesday with the Rising Star Wildcats on Maverick Field.

The scrimmage in no way duplicated game conditions, but found first the Rising Star and then the Eastland team running plays against the opposition from the center of the field.

The inexperienced Mavericks showed their unpreparedness for actual game conditions by allowing the Wildcats to run a number of touchdown plays.

However, they retaliated with some of the same, with Jim Smith looking rather elusive off tackle, and big Jack Kelly looking powerful part of the time in his new role of fullback.

One of the most often used Eastland plays was the fumble.

With the opening game against Coleman due in a week, Coaches Wendell Siebert and James Alexander were trying to attain some sort of polish, and especially some more knowledge of the game, in their team this week. They were working especially on the glaring weaknesses that showed up against Rising Star in the scrimmage plays.

The Coleman game will be there the night of Sept. 10, and on the following Fridays the Mavericks will stay at home to meet Albany and then Winters, before opening the district season here against De Leon October 1.

Desdemona School Session Is Doubtful

Whether there will be school in Desdemona this year will be decided this week, after citizens there started a fund to meet a deficit.

The trouble started when it was found there were only 149 scholars eligible to attend the school, with a minimum of 157 needed under the rural aid program to provide six teachers at the school.

However, the State Education Department waived some requirements to make school possible, if citizens will raise funds to pay the extra teacher. Over \$1600 had been raised this week.

If no school is held in Desdemona, the students will go to Gorman schools by bus. Desdemona School Supt. Claiborne Eldridge has resigned, it was announced.

Butler-Duncan Family Reunion Held Sunday

At the annual reunion of the Butler-Duncan family at Weatherford Sunday, Aug. 29, Carl Butler of Olden was elected president and Mrs. Opal Terrell and Mrs. Annie Clark secretaries.

The last previous reunion was held in August, 1941, and was the 15th in a row until the war.

New Kirk Pool Well Has Big Production

One of the best wells yet, little short of sensational, in the Kirk pool near Gorman was reported this week when a well drilled by E. K. and E. M. Burt of Wichita Falls on the George Bell lease flowed at the rate of 1056 barrels in 24 hours, through half-inch choke.

The well flowed for five hours through 40 perforations at 2794 to 2802 feet. Oil is 42 gravity.

Milk And Haircuts Increase In Price

Recent price increases in two lines brought the increased cost of living home to Eastland residents.

This week, the price of milk jumped a cent a quart here to meet a price rise that began in Dallas.

The new price was 22 cents a quart retail, and was passed on to milk producers in the form of an increase of 35 cents per 100 pounds.

The latest milk price increase, unlike others in recent months, was made in the face of declining dairy feed costs.

Another price rise was in the haircuts obtained in Eastland barber shops. Barbers, after charging 50 cents per haircut here long after those in other towns had gone above that figure, finally lifted the Eastland price to 75 cents per haircut.

Draft Registration Help Called For

Registration for the draft in the Eastland draft office, County Courthouse of the Courthouse, was erratic this week as alternate floods of registrants and lack of any at all were encountered.

As elsewhere over the nation, registrants in the 18-25 year age group paid little attention to the days on which they were supposed to register, and all were taken care of regardless.

Mrs. Jewel Reeves, chief draft clerk, and County Treasurer George Fox, chief registrar, called for volunteers to help with the registration, which is an unpaid job. Anyone with even a few hours a week to spare will be welcomed, they said. The registration will end Sept. 18.

At mid-afternoon Thursday, 105 had been registered in the Eastland office. Registration offices are open also at Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star in Eastland County.

Production Sure In City Lake Well

The Tex Harvey No. 1 City of Eastland oil test near Lake Eastland will make some sort of oil well, operators were assured Thursday.

Just how much production can be obtained awaited tests, which could not be made because the rig broke down after three swabs had been run to get about three or four barrels of oil out of the well.

The well was shot Saturday in the Duffer lime with 25 quarts of nitroglycerine, and after a buckled casing had been straightened, filled with about 100 feet of oil in the hole. Then swabbing was started, and after some trouble, was successful Thursday.

A guess was made that the well would pump about 35 barrels of oil a day, but there was no proof of any sort of production figure. There was little gas in the formation, which lies below the Marble Falls.

The test was considered vital in the oil play near Eastland, since a failure would have dampened the new oil enthusiasm just as it had a good start. It is also vital to the economy of the City of Eastland, which needs the money the oil royalties would bring.

Report Is Given On Dairy Program

President A. Z. Myrick of the Eastland County Dairy Association said Monday night at a meeting of the group in Eastland that about one-fourth enough cows had been signed up in the association's artificial insemination program to get the program under way.

From 250 to 300 cows have been signed up by owners, and from 1000 to 1200 are needed to finance the program, he said. Committees have been working to sign up dairy cow owners, and more owners committed themselves at the meeting Monday.

Myrick said there are owners of large herds in the county who have not yet decided the program would benefit them. They need more educating, he said.

Under the program, services of the best herd bulls in the Southwest would be available to Eastland County dairy cow owners. Most calves being dropped by dairy cows in the county now have been sired by Hereford bulls, and are worthless as dairy stock. However, with meat prices at all-time highs, the dairy herd owners are satisfied, Myrick said, which is a chief cause of the slowness of organizing the artificial insemination program.

Following the meeting Monday, which was attended by 56 dairy farmers, businessmen of the county, and others, the Eastland Chamber of Commerce had a watermelon feed for those present, with melons furnished by Cecil Shults of Rising Star.

The association will meet next on Monday, Sept. 27 in Gorman.

SWIMMING POOL CLOSES FOR SEASON

The Eastland Swimming Pool closed down for the season Monday after operating since June.

It was reported that the pool had extra good business for the first weeks of operation, but that patronage fell off later in the summer, possibly partly because of the polio scare that swept Texas.

Peanut Harvesting Is In Full Swing

Peanut harvesting was in full swing in parts of Eastland County this week as warm dry weather matured the nuts and gave good opportunity to cure them on the ground.

Farmers with late planted peanuts still were hoping for a rain soon to put more nuts on the vines, but a rain now would be harmful to those already plowed up.

Lots of bright green peanut hay was being harvested and sold, but it was reported that the price was well under last season's market, with hay selling for \$20 or thereabouts a ton that brought \$30 this time a year ago.

The market level on peanuts also was reported lower, in line with lower prices on cottonseed and other oil crops.

Additional Beer Petitions Denied

Sponsors of a petition to obtain an election on legalization of beer sales in Eastland County failed Thursday in an effort to obtain more petition forms.

The sponsors, all Cisco men, were in conference with County Clerk Virgil Love and District Attorney N. E. Grisham after Love had told them he would issue the extra forms only if instructed to by Grisham.

Grisham told them that the law did not call for such action, and he would instruct Love to issue the extra forms only if forced to by court action.

The question came up over three months after the petition forms had been issued by Love. The election sponsors asked Love in May to issue them 12 petition forms with four pages each, as specified by law, and he did so. The men Thursday told Love and Grisham that they had enough room on the petitions to obtain the required number of signers, but wanted more room to make the petitions more impressive.

The election sponsors have until Sept. 23 to present the petitions to the Commissioners Court, which then is required to call the election if enough have signed the petitions.

Registration Rules For Students Here Given By Womack

About 800 Eastland school pupils will drop their care-free vacation routines Tuesday when school opens, to begin again the more serious business of getting educated.

In Eastland High School, seniors and juniors will register Tuesday morning, and sophomores and freshmen will register Wednesday morning. High school library fees of 50 cents and typewriter rental fees of \$4.50 are payable in advance, said School Supt. W. G. Womack.

In Junior High School, the eighth grade will register Tuesday morning, and the sixth and seventh grades Tuesday afternoon.

Both South and West Ward Schools and Douglas School will have enrollment at 9 a. m. Tuesday.

Womack stressed that Daugherty Street is the dividing line for school attendance, with pupils living east of that street reporting to South Ward, and those living west of Daugherty reporting to West Ward.

Pupils entering local schools for the first time, he said, will be expected to present a statement that they have been vaccinated for smallpox.

School cafeterias will open Thursday, Sept. 9, with lunches for high school and junior high students 30 cents, and for ward school pupils 25 cents. Students were urged to pay for lunches at least a week in advance, and meal tickets for 20 meals will be sold.

Public school music will be offered in every grade of the elementary schools this year, Womack announced.

He urged school patrons to visit their schools at any time.

Business Houses To Close For Holiday

Almost all business houses in Eastland will be closed Monday in their annual observance of Labor Day, a holiday by agreement through the Chamber of Commerce.

Remaining open will be restaurants, filling stations, the drug stores for at least part of the day, and other businesses that observe holidays rarely if at all. Closed will be mercantile stores, offices, public buildings, most food stores, and various other firms.
