Two Home Building Projects Possible In Eastland

Mavericks Are Set For Albany After Loss To Coleman

Wiser but not discouraged after their 14 to 0 loss to Coleman in the opening game last week, the Eastland High Mavericks will take on Albany in another non-conference game on Maverick Field at 8 p. m. Friday.

Albany, after a 72 to 0 romp over Moran last week, will be somewhat favored, but largely on the basis of the fact that Eastland showed almost no offensive ability against Coleman.

A message to The Record from Albany Thursday recalled a game 21 years ago for which Albany came to Eastland, and lost 88 to 0.

"The message from Albany to Eastland is," the dispatch went on, "Please Be Kind to Our Boys," and "Do Not Do Us That Way Again."

Albany reportedly has eight or nine of last year's starters back this year, and is favored in its district.

Eastland's Coaches Wendell Siebert and James Alexander, pleased that their charges fought as well as they did against Coleman, are working on offensive formations this week. They discovered that several players had missed signals a good deal of the time in the Coleman game to mess up the Mavericks' offense, and were trying to straighten out assignments in the minds of the inexperienced backs.

The Eastland linemen looked extra good in much of the Coleman game, but penalties hurt the Bluecats also, with a 75-yard deficit in this department, while Eastland was not penalized once.

Two all-the-way touchdown passes beat the Mavericks. In both, White, an end, got behind the Maverick backfield to take the passes and go over. One came in the opening minutes and the other in the fourth quarter.

The Mavericks got rolling only once, in the fourth quarter after Coleman put its second team in. Eastland took the ball on downs on its own 32-yard line, and Colonel Don Brashier passed to Jim Smith on the 43. The Coleman first team promptly came back in, but Margil Wadley rambled to the Coleman 44 for another first down, and Jack Kelley and Smith plunged on to the 38. Wadley then bounced to the 35, lost the ball on a fumble, and ended the drive.

Brashier, once thought to have a heart condition that would not stand the stresses and strains of football, was playing his first actual game, but looked wonderfully cool as he connected on the only two passes he threw, and punted in an excellent fashion.

Siebert said Kelley called the plays at Coleman, but that he intended to let Brashier try his hand at quarterbacking in the next game or two.

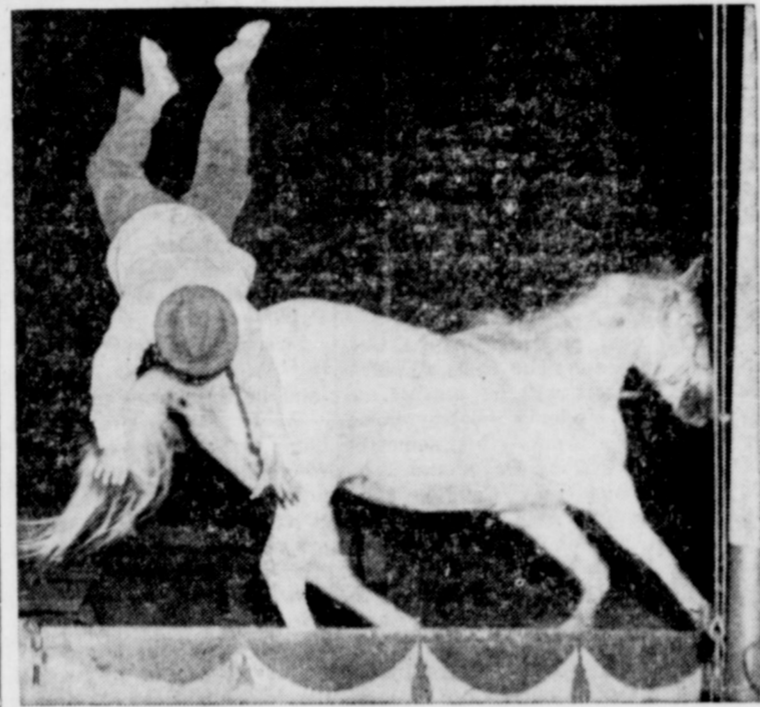
Leonard Quarles, tackle, hurt his knee slightly in the Coleman game, and may not start against Albany, but Siebert said the other starters likely will be the same.

Oil Test Activity Keeps Good Pace

Activity continued this week at oil tests near Eastland, as interest continued to pick up in the county's post-war oil play.

At the Tex Harvey City of Eastland well, operators were reported drilling out a cement plug Thursday afternoon after an acidizing operation in the Duffer sand had failed. In fact, it was reported the acid had killed the oil that had been found. After that, the well was drilled deeper and casing set.

On the 4-M Oil Company test between Eastland and Cisco, being drilled by Jesse McKee of Eastland and associates, plans were to shoot in the Marble Falls with 75 quarts of nitroglycerine. A 25-quart shot Tuesday had resulted in a small showing of oil.

Operators were preparing to acidize on the Johnnie Aaron test southwest of Eastland, and had high hopes of bringing in a well in the Duffer.

Leroy Menzing, oil editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, is to be in Eastland Tuesday to write a series of articles on the new oil developments in Eastland County, he informed H. J. Tanner, secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Options Taken On Two Tracts Here By Different Firms

Two housing projects for Eastland were in the negotiation stage this week as two groups of contractors held options on two tracts of city property.

Jim Horton during the past week gave an option on 36 acres between the Connellee and Chastain Additions to the V-W Construction Company of Fort Worth. W. R. Watkins, Jr., and other officials of the firm said in Eastland recently that they planned to build perhaps 75 Haydite block houses on the tract, if they can get plans for the project approved by the FHA.

Watkins and his partners plan to build small homes in the lowest-price bracket, perhaps to sell for \$5500 or less. The method they propose is building a concrete slab floor and foundation, then build Haydite block walls, stucco the outside with a special \$15,000 "gun" and plaster the inside walls.

Ray Saunders, whose construction firm has been building a housing project in Brownwood, earlier had obtained an option from Victor Cornelius on about 12½ acres just south of Sadosa Street, in the southwestern part of town.

Saunders' firm, if plans go through, will build about 25 conventional construction frame houses on the tract, also to be sold in the low-priced field.

Although new homes have been needed in Eastland for some while, building proponents here say, the oil development in the county has made new construction urgent.

Both groups now holding options here came to Eastland as the result of work done by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, from which a delegation went to Fort Worth to see if builders could be interested in coming here.
