Mavericks, DeLeon Play First District Game Here Friday

Green has been assistant manager of the North Main Street A & P Store in Dallas, and has been with the A & P system since 1928. He is a native of Merrill, Wis.

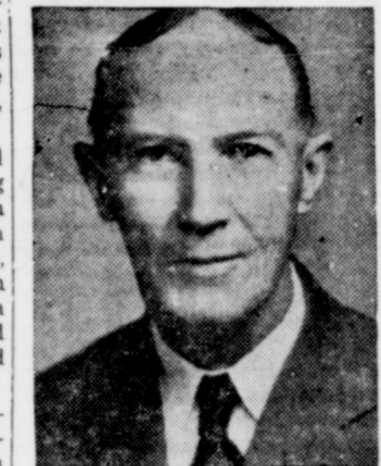

Beer Petition Signers Being Checked By County Officials

County Attorney Virgil Love and his assistants who were checking signers of the Eastland County beer election petition said this week that it appeared the petition carried the names of enough legal voters to require calling an election on legalizing beer, but that it was too early to tell yet.

The petition carries the names of about 750 persons, and to require calling the beer election, it must be found that 597 or more of these persons are legally qualified voters of Eastland County.

Checking the names of the signers against poll lists has been completed, it was said, but then began the difficult task of checking the "overs"—those who are qualified to vote by being over 60 years of age. There is no poll list of such voters in this county.

If the 597 qualified signers are found, the petition will be presented to the Commissioners Court at its regular meeting Oct. 13, and the court then will be required to call the election.

Rail Work Payroll Has Impact Here

Eastland merchants this week felt the impact of a large payroll from a new industry, but it won't last long.

The new industry is the project for relaying the Texas & Pacific Railway tracks with new and heavier rails. Working on the project in the city limits now are over 150 laborers and bosses. They are living in railway work cars stationed at Eastland.

Local Agent E. A. Hatten said the gangs will be located here another two weeks or more.

Being laid are 132-pound rails to replace 110-pound rails that were re put down in 1928. The heavier new rails will give a much smoother ride on the new fast "Texas Eagle" streamlined trains recently put into operation by the railroad.

The work crews get their pay on the first and 29th of each month, so one of the pay days fell this week.

Their next stop will be in Ranger, Hatten said, since they are working eastward. Other crews are doing the same work at various other points between Fort Worth and El Paso, he said.

Lack Of Rain At Right Time Cuts Crop 50 Per Cent

Eastland County peanut growers were working early and late this week harvesting a crop that gave promise of bringing them in the neighborhood of a million and three-quarters dollars.

Farmers and others familiar with the picture said the cash return will be only about half what it would have been had a good rain soaked the county in mid-August.

About 53,000 acres were planted in peanuts in the county this year, estimated Emmitt Powell, manager of the P. M. A. office in Eastland. This was about 10,000 acres less than were devoted to the crop a year ago, and some 250 farms regularly planted to peanuts in the county had none at all planted on them this year.

Early planted peanuts made, on the whole, excellent yields, but the later the planting, the poorer the yield.

Those peanuts planted extra late might as well stay in the ground, farmers said.

Returns from nuts harvested so far ran all the way from five to 30 bushels per acre. An average yield of about 10 bushels per acre would result in the over-all total county return of about a million and three-quarter dollars, based on the federal support price of \$3.15 per bushel.

Most peanuts harvested so far have been of good grade, it was said.

With the season too far gone for rain to hold any hope for the peanut growers, moisture was needed acutely for ranchers and farmers who plan to plant winter cover crops.

Powell said that all of the federal money assigned to his office to help farmers buy phosphate fertilizers has been spent, about \$18,000 in all, and that about \$20,000 has gone to help farmers buy winter legume seed such as vetch and Austrian peas, and \$10,000 toward buying rye for winter growing.

It was said that this year's peanut crop was only slightly better than last year's very short crop, and that if next spring's hairy vetch crop is no better than this spring's, there will be some very disillusioned farmers in the Eastland County vetch growing area.

Eastland Navy Man In Pacific Maneuvers

Charles F. Swindell, engineer, second class, USN, son of Mrs. W. F. Bomey of Eastland, is serving aboard the submarine USS Char, which is participating in amphibious training exercises in Southern California, according to a U. S. Navy release.

About 19,000 Navy and Marine Corps personnel, 56 ships, and 320 planes are engaged in the exercises.
