Cattle Prices Drop At Auction Ring

Cattle prices were down sharply at the two sales at the Sig Faircloth Auction Ring in Eastland this week, following a nationwide trend.

With an uncertain market, buyers appeared reluctant to bid, and top bids on some choice animals were \$8 to \$10 a hundred pounds under the bids on similar animals two or three weeks ago.

A mass movement of animals to market as the result of dry weather and falling pastures was given as a major cause of the price break. Many Eastland County herds have been sold off or shipped elsewhere to pasture.

Monday night, C. M. McCain and Johnny Aaron shipped a large number of cattle and sheep to irrigated wheat pasture near Lockney, east of Lubbock.

Meanwhile, weather forecasters in this area were giving no promise of rain.

Bar Group Splits On Pension Motion

A resolution pledging the Eastland County Bar Association to fight against a state constitutional amendment permitting pensions for appeals court and district court judges of the state was beaten by a tie vote at a meeting of the association Thursday afternoon.

The resolution, introduced by N. E. Grisham, would have pledged the association to collect funds for an active campaign against the amendment. The amendment would permit the Legislature to vote pensions to the jurists, based on length of service, age, and other factors.

Vote on the matter was six to six. Members then decided, on motion of Cyrus B. Frost, that each member should follow his own course on the question, as his conscience dictates.

Grisham called the measure "class legislation" in opposing it.

Shallow Test Set For Quinn Property

Jack Chamberlain this week announced he would begin drilling a shallow oil test about two miles east of Eastland as soon as he can get a Railroad Commission permit and get a new truck-mounted shallow rotary rig in from Oklahoma.

The rig he had parked in Eastland last week was taken to Oklahoma City this week to be put on exhibition at an oil show, and Chamberlain was to receive delivery on another one with a more powerful truck motor.

The location he is to drill is on Guy Quinn's acreage, located 330 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the west line of Section 6, Block 6, T&P Railroad Survey. It is between U.S. 80 and the T. & P. Railway track, and about two miles from old shallow production.

Chamberlain said he and others are financing the effort. In the past, two oil pays have been found in the area above 2000 feet, he said.

Two Youngsters To Show At Fair

Guy E. Warden, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Warden of Eastland, and Carol Sue Tidwell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. Tidwell of Desdemona will represent the Eastland County 4-H Clubs at the Texas State Fair at Dallas which will open Saturday.

Guy will exhibit his 1,200-pound steer, "Bulldog", which was shown at both the Ranger and Cisco shows last spring, while Miss Tidwell will exhibit a total of 20 bronze baby beef type turkeys. Ten of the turkeys will be toms and the others will be hens.

Billy Brashier Gets Good Notices As Future Varsity Quarterback At NTSC

Billy Brashier, who was a star on Eastland High's football team couple of years ago and now that he is a college man is called Bill, left Tuesday with the North Texas State College Eagles for Reno, Nev., where the Eagles will play the University of Nevada Saturday afternoon.

Brashier was praised as a coming varsity quarterback in a release from the college publicity department this week. The release said Brashier is the mainstay of the college's B team this year—but wait a year or so!

"Brashier was the whole show against the NTAC club when the Eagles' club played the Arlington club recently," the release said. "He ran the T formation like a veteran, (Coach Odie) Mitchell said, and his choice of plays was excellent. Not merely a passer but a fine kicker, Brashier has continued to amaze spectators with booming 70-yard kicks in daily practice sessions. He got off an 80-yard kick—in the air, not counting the bounce—last week. It was one of the longest ever booted on the Eagle field."

Brashier, a sophomore in the Denton school, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Brashier of Eastland.

Sign Promoting U. S. 80 Projected

Chambers of Commerce from Ranger to Pecos along U.S. Highway 80 were asked this week to contribute to a fund for erecting a large sign between Weatherford and Fort Worth urging westbound tourists to "Stay on U.S. Highway 80—Fastest Route to El Paso and the West Coast."

Letters sent out to chambers of commerce in Pecos, Monahans, Odessa, Midland, Big Spring, Colorado City, Sweetwater, Abilene and Baird this week by Eastland Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner said that a committee would call on their towns next week to discuss the project.

The letter pointed out that signs recently erected between Fort Worth and Weatherford urge the use of Highway 180, which travels west through Mineral Wells, Breckenridge, Albany and other towns to the north of U.S. 80, and that some tourist court owners say the signs are having an effect on travel on U.S. 80.

The moves were decided at a meeting Monday night at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce attended by representatives from Ranger and Eastland. It was said that Eastland, Ranger and Cisco each had pledged \$100 toward the sign, which would be visible at night and would cost about \$600.

Gorman Boy Wins Honors With Pig

Donald Lee Joiner, 4-H Club boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Joiner of Gorman, took first place in the county and second place in the district Sears swine show at Abilene last Saturday, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Donald Lee, with eight other 4-H Club boys in the county, received registered Duroc-Jersey pigs last spring from the Sears Foundation.

Pigs from Eastland, Callahan, Taylor, Jones and Haskell Counties were entered in the show.

Gerald Williamson, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Williamson of Morton Valley, won third place in the district show for boar pigs.

Clyde Douglas Herring, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam W. Herring, with his gilt won second place in the county showing. His pig, unfortunately, died from injuries received when the trailer became unhitched and bounced off in a ditch this side of Clyde Saturday afternoon on the way home. He will receive another pig next spring, said Cooper.

The last sessions of the association were held in Eastland. Conventions are alternated between Ranger, Eastland and Cisco.

Cornelius Buys Hotel At Cisco

Victor Cornelius of Eastland, who parlayed an advertising idea into a large commercial printing business, this week announced purchase of the Laguna Hotel in Cisco from William Seipel of San Antonio, with Guy Patterson of Eastland handling details of the transaction for Cornelius.

Included in the sale are several business buildings in the same block.

The Laguna was completed in 1929 at a cost of about \$500,000, and has 100 rooms in eight stories. It is Cornelius' first venture into the hotel business, although he once owned the Exchange Building in Eastland, and now owns much business and apartment property here, as well as recently acquired oil holdings near Cisco.

Cornelius announced that he planned a thorough renovation of the hotel, which he said he considered a good business venture because of the steadily expanding oil and gas industry in the Cisco-Eastland area.

More Peanuts Coming To Market

More peanuts came to southwest markets this week as warm, dry weather favored digging in nearly all areas, reports the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

These later fields showed smaller yields per acre and lower quality. During the past week most farmers' stock graded around 67 per cent average.

Farmers received mostly government support prices for their offerings. Heavy supplies went to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Demand for shelled goods continued slow at southwest markets. Occasional sales of Number 1 Spanish brought 16 3/4 cents per pound.

Unfavorable weather for curing and picking peanuts restricted operations along the Atlantic coast this week. Digging was estimated to be about 50 to 60 per cent completed in the Virginia-Carolina district. It is feared that undug peanuts may shed heavily when digging is resumed. Also, peanuts in stacks may suffer from rains.

Market for new crop peanuts from the Atlantic coast for November-December shipment was slightly weaker and prices were substantially below prices for old crop for prompt shipment.

Peanut meal market was slightly weaker.

Court To Decide Monday On Details Of Beverage Ballot

Eastland County's first post-war beer election in all probability will be held Nov. 2, in conjunction with the general election of that date, it was learned Thursday.

A petition turned over to County Clerk Virgil Love two weeks ago has been checked for signers, and the count Thursday had been run up to a total of 680 valid signatures. Only 596 were needed to force the Commissioners Court to call an election.

County Judge P. L. Crossley said Thursday that in his opinion the court Monday will set the election for Nov. 2, along with the general election.

By holding the elections together, Crossley pointed out, the county can save some \$1500 in pay of election judges and clerks and in other ways, and also, more voters will turn out for both elections.

"If we can get out a big vote, there will be no protest afterward of a victory by a minority," he pointed out.

Love said Thursday that he had spent some hours this week in both Cisco and Ranger with committees of old-time voters, checking names on the beer election petition. He did this to check up on the "overs"—voters who are over 60, and who do not appear on the poll lists of the county, but are legal voters just the same.

Voters will go to the polls all over the county Tuesday, Nov. 2, to vote for candidates from President to precinct constable, but if the beer question is held at the same polling places in Eastland County, one of the largest general election turnouts in history is expected.

The same day, there will be a second beer election in Palo Pinto County, which now has legal sale of the beverage. The Palo Pinto election is being held to settle questions left hanging by a previous vote in which the electorate of the county decided by a few votes to retain legal sale of beer, but on another issue by a few votes decided against the sale of all alcoholic beverages.

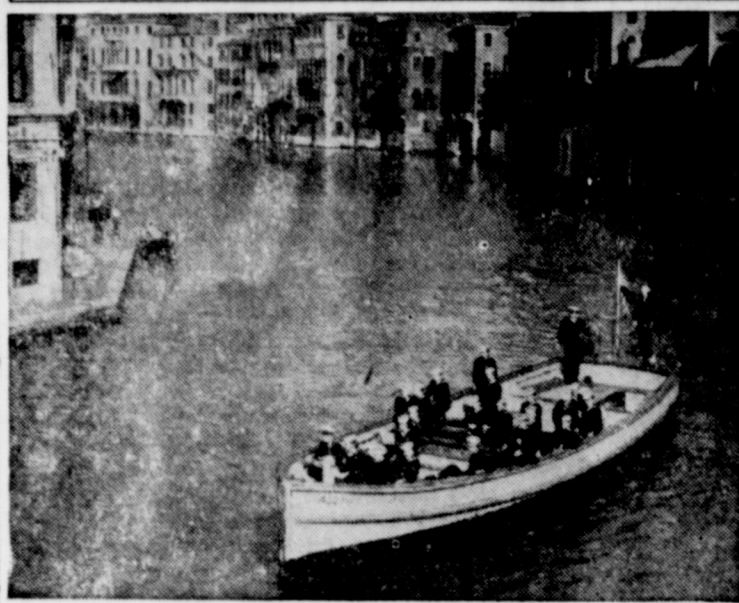

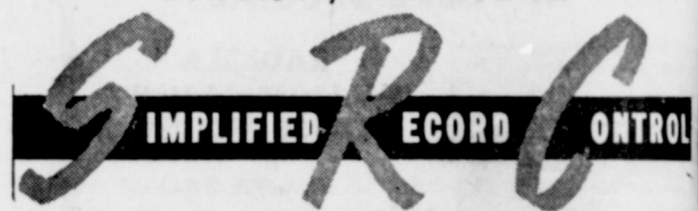
