Questions and Answers about the Telephone Company's Request for Higher Rates in Eastland

Q. Why is the telephone company asking for higher rates in Eastland?

A. Because Eastland rates are too low to bring in enough revenue to pay the cost of furnishing the service.

Q. Is the telephone company operating the Eastland exchange at a loss?

A. Yes. During the last half of 1947, expenses of operating the Eastland exchange were \$3,000 higher than revenues collected for service here.

Q. How about telephone costs? Are they up much?

A. Yes. The cost of everything that goes into furnishing service is higher. Copper is up 105 per cent. Lead is up 240 per cent more than in 1940. A 35-foot pole that cost \$6.30 in 1940 now costs us \$18.11.

Q. How much is the telephone payroll up?

A. The telephone payroll in Eastland is more than four times as high as it was seven years ago. The growth of Eastland has made it necessary that we hire more people to handle the larger volume of calls, and in addition wage rates have gone up.

Q. How long have Eastland's telephone rates been in effect?

A. Present rates for telephone service here were established in 1924. At that time Eastland had 700 telephones as compared with 1,420 today. The scope and value of the service has increased greatly in the past 24 years with no increase in rates.

Q. With so much more business, isn't the company's revenue much higher than it was a few years ago?

A. Telephone revenues have increased, to be sure, but expenses have increased much faster. Since 1941, local telephone revenues have increased 34 per cent, but expenses during the same period have gone up 87 per cent. Despite the fact that we have twice as many telephones as in 1924, and are handling a greater volume of calls than ever, the telephone system here is being operated each month at a loss.

Rates established 24 years ago will not bring in enough revenue to pay present costs of furnishing service.

Q. Would it be possible for the telephone company to cut corners and reduce expenses?

A. The telephone company takes advantage of every possible operating economy to keep rates low without affecting the quality of the service. Through these economies and advances in the telephone art we have been able to furnish more and more telephone service here without increasing rates. The telephone company is proud of its record of not having increased rates during these 24 years, although the number of telephones here has more than doubled and the cost of virtually everything that goes into the furnishing of service has risen sharply.

Q. What does the rate increase amount to?

A. Briefly, for customers with four-party lines, the new rates represent an increase of less than two cents a day, and less than a cent a day for other residence customers. Business telephones will cost less than two cents a day more.

Rural business service will cost about four cents a day more, and rural residence customers will pay less than two cents a day more than at present.

Charges for various auxiliary telephone services will be increased in relation to higher costs of furnishing them.

Q. What are the telephone company's expansion plans for Eastland?

A. The telephone company will continue to enlarge the telephone system here as rapidly as possible to provide telephones for many families who are now waiting for service.

The telephone company is at work on a \$38,000 expansion and improvement program for this year and next. Included in the program are: installation of 240 more subscribers lines next year at a cost of \$15,000. This is in addition to a \$23,000 project completed here last April which added a local switchboard position, two long distance switchboard positions, and 100 more subscribers lines.

The network of outside lines and cables throughout Eastland will be expanded this year and next. Some of the new lines already are in service.

Three new long distance circuits are being added to Eastland this year and next. A new circuit to Dallas is being put in service this year. Next year, new circuits to Abilene and Breckenridge will be added to help speed Eastland's increasing volume of long distance calls.
