Mavericks To Meet Cisco Friday Night On Home Gridiron

The Eastland Mavericks, who have beaten the Cisco Loboes only twice in history in football, according to the old timers, will have another try at their jinx opponents in their last game of the 1948 season on Maverick Field at 7:30 p. m. Friday.

Having won five games and lost four, the Mavericks already are assured of an even break or better for the season. And that is a lot better record than almost anyone was predicting for them back in the dark (football) days of September.

On the other side of the page, the Cisco team has yet to win a single game, although the Loboes have played consistenly good football and have lost usually by narrow margins. The Loboes will be plagued

somewhat by injuries, while the Mavericks will be in first-class condition, barring last-minute hurts. However, since the Loboes have considerably more depth in reserves, they can stand injuries bet-

Weather conditions Thursday indicated that Friday night's game will be played under unpleasant climatic influences, and that may mitigate against the Mavericks, who have tended to fumble pretty badly on cold nights.

Over 1000 Papers To Be Served On **Persons Named**

One hundred twenty-nine additional delinquent property tax suits were filed in 91st District Court Wednesday by Horace Walker, who has the contract for collecting delinquent taxes in Eastland County.

Sheriff J. B. Williams, who has the large job of serving citations on all the defendants in the suits, estimated there were 1200 to 1500 persons named.

This is so because almost all the suits are against groups of defendants supposed to own different tracts of land named in the suit. This is the method Walker has used in filing all of his many tax suits in Eastland County.

Washington, D. C .- An allmedia national advertising campaign for a better understanding of the American economic system has been launched today by the Advertising Council.

"This campaign is, to us, the soundest information campaign against Communism yet devised -and I thing it is noteworthy that it scarcely mentions the word," said Charles G. Mortimer, Jr., vice president of General Foods Corporation and chairman of the Advertising Council.

"To the best of our knowledge, this is the first time in history that representatives of all segments of society-management labor, education, religion, social service, agriculture-have gotten together on an economic credo."

All of the Advertising Council's facilities, which include every major medium of advertisingnewspapers, magazines, car cards, outdoor, radio-will be used in this year-long information cam-

The project is based on a 10point platform unanimously endorsed by members of the Council's public policy committee which emphasizes the principle of expanding productivity as a national necessity. A series of 11 advertisements, signed by Paul G. Hoffman, (formerly president, Studebaker Corp.) representing management; Boris Shishkin, American Federation of Labor East Main on Highway economist, representing and Evans Clark, executive Director of the Twentieth Century Fund, representing the public, have been prepared for magazines and

newspapers. More than 200 advertisements were submitted by the volunteer Batten. advertising agencies-Barton, Durstine & Osborn; Mc-Cann-Erickson; J. Walter Thompson; and Young & Rubicam-before eleven were selected. welfth is in preparation.

Included in each advertisement is a write-in offer for a booklet, "The Miracle of America," pared with the cooperation of the Twentieth Century Fund. This booklet explains in the language of the laymen what makes the American economic system work.

National advertisers have been asked to devote as much of their advertising allotments as possible to the "Miracle of America" campaign. General Foods and General Electric have already pledged \$100,000 worth of advertising space to the campaign and other companies have also given assurance of support.

Colds Are Spread Easily, Is Warning

changes in the weather during the fall months often result in chilling, which in turn is usually followed by wide-spread incidence of the common cold. This disease always spreads rapidly because of the fact that very few people can live isolated lives and in any group or crowd of people, coughing, sneezing and spitting will scatter millions of cold germs among susceptible persons.

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, says that there are countless ways of spreading a cold other than by coughing, sneezing and spitting. "For instance" the doctor said, "if a member of your family has a cold and the other members share a common drinking glass with him, you may expect the whole family to pick up the germs he leaves on the glass. Sometimes a person with a cold thoughtlessly touches his mouth or nostrils with his hand, and then shakes hands with another person. That person can, and very likely will contaminate his own mouth or nostrils with his hand, and the germs are transmitted into his system. A child with a cold may contaminate his tovs, and the next child that picks them up and plays with them will certainly obtain he cold germs, along with the toys.'

Children, as well as adults, who are suffering from a cold should be put to bed, and if complete rest, light food, and plenty of liquids do not improve his condition in a short time, the family physician should be called. Dr. Cox further advised that dressing properly for the weather, sensible eating, plenty of rest, and avoiding persons with colds can be helpful in preventing your own infection. Colds are costly in time, health, and money, the doctor said, and added, "Prevent them if possible."

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
