ARE THERE TOO MANY PEOPLE?

The Rural New Yorker, one of the outstanding farm publications of the country, recently took issue with certain sociologists and economists who take the position that, because there is hunger in many lands, there are too many people in the world.

It was just 150 years ago that Thomas R. Malthus, an English writer on political economy, brought out his "Essay on the Principle of Population," in which he held that population, unless held back by "prudential checks", has a tendency to outrun the means of subsistence.

It is interesting to reflect that when the Malthusian theory was launched the population of the globe, according to the most reliable estimates, was about one billion. Today the population of the world is placed at 2,250,000,000. Before the ravages and dislocations of World War II, this vast increase in population was being lived on a much higher scale than that which characterized the civilization of a century and a half ago.

"The Rural New Yorker" concludes that there are not too many people in the world. It declares there are too many people in the wrong places throughout the world, "along with some others who have grown soft and lazy and dependent."

One effective way to stop, or at least slow this trend, in the opinion of the writer of the editorial in question, would be to embark on an educational program calling for decentralization, with smaller cities, smaller businesses, smaller farms, and smaller governments, but with bigger and more productive individual people.

Be that as it may, it is proper to say that if the people of the earth would learn to live and let live, forsaking war and turning to the arts of peace, all fears about population outstripping the means of subsistence would speedily be dissipated.

HOW TAXATION WORKS:

The per capita of taxation, representing the average amount that each man, woman and child pays toward the support of government, national, state and local, is approaching \$400 per year. While the American people spend only 19 cents out of every dollar for food, it costs them 31 cents out of every dollar they get for taxes. Patience with such a situation can scarcely be considered a virtue.

Peanut Sellers Awaiting Army Contracts

Shelled peanut prices held firm in the southwest this week despite slow trading, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sellers showed a tendency to wait for contracts to be let for Army purchases, but a few lots sold for February and March delivery at 16 1-2 to 16 3-4 cents a pound for No. 1 Spanish.

All major peanut producing regions had about completed picking. A little farmers' stock still moved, mostly at support prices, although good quality Virginias brought a slight premium. Many grower-held peanuts are reported to be of poor quality.

Peanut meal picked up some strength. Small lots sold in the southwest at \$98 to \$100 per ton. Peanut oil weakened, as southwestern mills quoted prime crude of five per cent refining loss at 27 to 27 1-2 cents a pound in tank car lots.

Lewis B. Taylor, executive secretary of the state Agriculture Teachers' Association, has been extended an invitation by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, to establish his headquarters in Ranger.

SUB-FREEZING WEATHER IN MOST OF STATE

Old man winter roared back across Texas today after a brief respite from frigid temperatures, bringing sub-freezing readings to most of the state and scattered snowfall through the east and west central portions of the state.

The mercury plummeted from mild readings of yesterday as the cold wave swept across the state accompanied by 20-25 mile per hour winds and the U. S. Weather Bureau forecast the lowest readings of the season for many points tonight.

At mid-morning, snow was falling at Luckin for the first time in several years as the front passed deep into southeast Texas, and at College Station, San Angelo, Wink, Guadalupe Pass, Junction and Rock Springs. Junction, in the hill country reported an inch and a half of snow on the ground.

A great mass of frigid air engulfed the nation from the Rocky Mountains to the Atlantic Coast. Temperatures dropped in the Midwest to the lowest point this winter.

The cold zone took the shape of a rough triangle extending from the Canadian border southward 1,000 miles into north Texas, and from there 2,000 miles diagonally across the continent to New England.

GOP SENATORS CHARGED WITH PLAYING POLITICS

WASHINGTON — Democrats heatedly charged Republican senators today with playing politics in an investigation of Harold E. Stassen's charges that government officials rolled up huge profits in commodity trading with "inside" information.

The charges of politics were made at the beginning of a hearing that brought Stassen and Edwin W. Pauley face to face for a showdown on the allegations against the millionaire California oil man and special assistant to the secretary of army. Stassen says that Pauley made almost \$1,000,000 profits since the war in commodity speculation through "inside" information. Pauley admitted the profits, but said he had no secret information.

Sen. Millard E. Tydings, D., Mr. interrupted Stassen's testimony to "register a protest against the conduct" of Chairman Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., and other Republican members of the Senate appropriations subcommittee investigating commodity speculations.

Ferguson reported that this was the first subcommittee hearing Tydings had attended. The Chairman added that Tydings seemed to be interested in side issues rather than getting at the facts about commodity speculating.

When Stassen referred to a telegram he had sent the subcommittee, Green and Tydings both said they had never seen or heard of it.

Tydings then brought up the matter of Pauley's letter and charged the Republicans were conducting a "political hearing" rather than performing "an overall public service."

Churchill Gives Grave Warning Before Commons

LONDON — Winston Churchill warned Commons today that the international situation is deteriorating, and urged the western powers to seek a settlement with Russia before the Soviet union gets the atom bomb.

Churchill spoke on the second day of foreign affairs debate in the House of Commons. Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin had started it with a charge that Russia was pushing toward war by seeking to dominate all of Europe.

The invention of the atom bomb gave the west a "breathing space" of three or four years, Churchill said, and two years of it already has passed.

"The best chance of avoiding war is, in accord with other western democracies, to bring matters to a head with the Soviet government and to arrive at a lasting settlement," Churchill said.

"I cannot believe any serious discussion it may be necessary to have with the Soviet Union would be more likely to reach a favorable conclusion if we wait until they have got the atom bomb too."

Area Officers Looking For The Barker Brothers

Officers of this area, as well as the entire state of Texas, are on the lookout for Paul Dean and Houston Barker, believed to be operating in this area.

The two men are believed to be the pair that terrorized a part of California recently with a series of burglaries and the shooting and wounding of a deputy sheriff. They are believed to have been connected with the robbing of a couple of liquor stores last week in San Angelo. Texas Rangers trailed the pair to the vicinity of Cisco where an abandoned car was found. In the car was evidence of the San Angelo job. The same day a light 1941 Chevrolet sedan was stolen in Cisco.

CLAIMS HE COULD NOT ACCEPT IT IF TENDERED

WASHINGTON — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Army chief of staff, said today "I could not accept the (presidential) nomination even under the remote circumstances that it were tendered me."

Eisenhower stated his position in a letter to Leonard V. Funder, publisher of the Manchester, N. H., Union Leader.

A state of delegates pledged to vote for Eisenhower in the Republican national convention has been entered in the New Hampshire primary.

The army said the letter was being released to the press "because Gen. Eisenhower hopes through this means to inform every interested person or group that he is not in politics and that he would refuse nomination even if offered."

Eisenhower said his decision to remove himself completely from the political scene is "definite and positive."

Eisenhower's statement was almost as unconditional as that once uttered by Gen. William T. Sherman of Civil War fame in turning down proffered offers for the presidency. Sherman said — "if nominated, I will not accept. If elected, I will not serve."

"I know you will not object to my making this letter public to inform all interested persons that I could not accept nomination even under the remote circumstance that it were tendered me."

He said he hoped Funder would understand that his conclusions were not only sound but were arrived at objectively.

He said he had heretofore with held a bald statement that he would not accept the nomination because he considered that it would "smack of effrontery."

"It is my conviction that the necessary and wise subordination of the military to civil power will be best sustained," Eisenhower said, "... when lifelong professional soldiers ... abstain from seeking high political office."

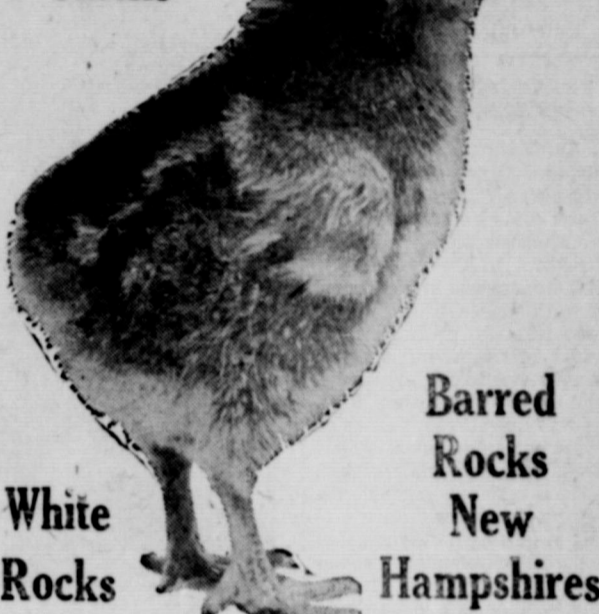

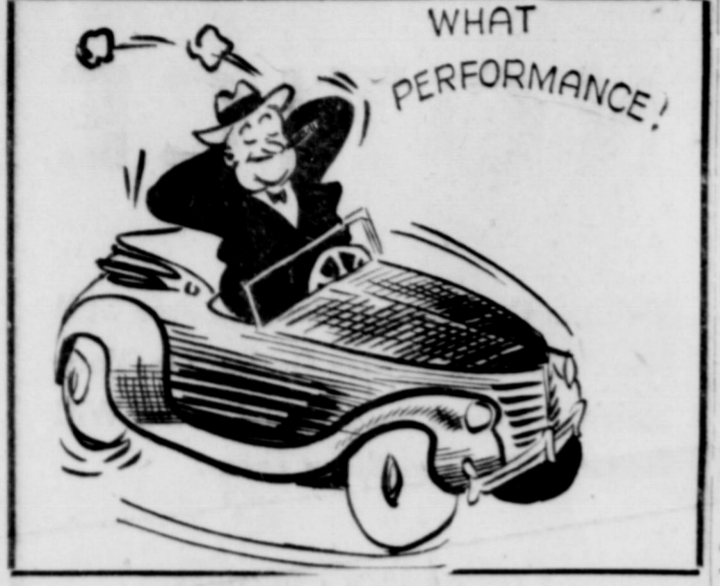

Eastland County Have Fish Rodeo In Year 1948

Thursday night, Jan. 22, the Possum Kingdom Game and Fish Ass'n. held its monthly directors meeting at Mineral Wells at which time a new district was authorized consisting of Eastland and Ranger areas. Cecil Holifield of Eastland formerly represented the Breckenridge District for two years before moving to Eastland. A new District was also formed to be known as Possum Kingdom area and to be represented by a member of the PK Boat and Dock Owners Ass'n. Plans are under way to hold another Mammoth Fishing Contest beginning around March 1st. Final plans will be approved at a meeting in Breckenridge on February 5th.

As a result of last years Rodeo the PK membership jumped from 600 to over 7,000 members. Special Lake License, from a previous high of 19,000. The money derived from the Lake License is put in a special fund for PK Lake use

only and handled by the Texas State Game Fish and Oyster Commission. This money is to be used on a hatchery located just below the PK Dam. Final plans are under way now to get this hatchery started.

Money derived from sale of Membership in the PK Game and Fish Ass'n. is used to pay expenses in handling the Rodeo, Game and Fish Conservation Programs and an annual Barbecue and Fish Fry held in August each year on the East Side of PK State Park. Membership is open to all comers at \$1 each and is necessary to participate in the prizes given during Rodeo.

Possum Kingdom is known throughout the world of fishermen. Letters were received from all over the world last year as a result of the publicity of the Rodeo and catches reported in newspapers and outdoor publications. In its short life it has become known as the number one vacation and fishing spot in Texas. The towns subscribing to, its program have materially benefited by the influx of visitors from over the country. It is estimated
