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On The Farm In Palmer County

With school almost out and most of the college set home or on the way, we are already thinking about that long awaited summer trip, whether it is to Europe or just camping for the weekend or church or band camp or that trip with the Scouts or 4-H. No matter where we're going we like to be prepared for the occasion so here are some packing tips that might help.

Clothes unpacked from a suitcase needn't look like you slept in them.

There's a way to pack that minimizes wrinkles.

The traveler who's carefree, fresh and unrumpled has mastered packing comfortable clothes -- both neatly and sensibly. Good packing begins with planning ahead. You determine all the clothes and accessories needed for the climates and activities your trip will include. Visualize every outfit from head to toe, inside to outside. Also itemize the cosmetics and drugs you usually rely on.

For a greater variety with a minimum of bulk, choose a basic color scheme and garments that serve more than one purpose. Pack clothes that you enjoy wearing and that can "take it." Easy-care fabrics are ideal for travel. These include such materials as jerseys, no-wrinkle synthetics and blends and knits -- garments that are washable as well as packable. Prints that camouflage spots and wrinkles are also good traveling companions.

Whether using the "roll-up" or "fold-it-flat" method, pack tightly, but without crushing clothes. Too much room allows clothes to roll and shift, thus forming unnecessary wrinkles. Pad out needed folds with crumpled tissue paper or soft garments.

Use plastic bags for laundry, damp swimsuits, or anything you want to protect. Tissue paper and plastic bags are the tools of good packing.

Pack heavier items such as shoes and less used garments in the bottom of the suitcase. Lighter, frequently used items should be placed near the top. Carry cosmetics in a separate case. A good method of arranging cosmetics is to pack go-

together individually. For example, put hair setting items together and soaps and cleaning supplies in another area or package.

Plastic bottles and jars make ideal containers because of their light-weightness. Leave room at the top to allow for expansion of liquids; then seal with tape.

Do not forget the many small gadgets on the market that make life easier for the traveler. Consider such things as folding inflatable hangup miniature clotheslines and pins, sewing and repair kits, spot remover, shoe shine pads and plug-in hot cups.

It's wise to make allowances for an unexpected separation of you and your luggage by labeling both inside and outside with your name and address. An unusual decal or strip of colored tape on the outside of your luggage will cut time spent at baggage claim areas to a minimum. The change of someone picking up your bag by mistake will also be reduced.

Planning ahead for your travel needs will give you that extra amount of confidence as you open your luggage for the first time. When miles from home, you'll find that you did bring that oh-so-important item.

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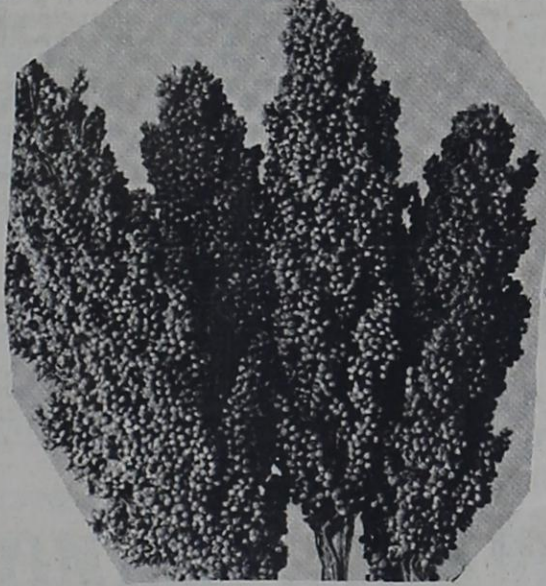

Quick Brazilian Beef

- 2 tablespoons flour
 - 2 tablespoons corn starch
 - 3/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 3/4 pound top round steak, 1 inch thick
 - Corn oil for frying
 - 1 medium onion, sliced
 - 1 (1-pound) can tomatoes
 - 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 - 2 bay (or laurel) leaves
 - 1/2 teaspoon cumin
 - 1 tablespoon water
- Mix together flour, corn starch, salt and pepper. Coat meat with mixture. Reserve remaining corn starch mixture. Pour corn oil into large skillet to depth of 1/4 inch. Heat over medium high heat 3 to 4 minutes. Add meat and cook, turning once, about 25 minutes or until meat has crisp crust on both sides and is medium rare. Remove meat. Drain off all but about 1 tablespoon drippings from skillet. Return meat; add onion and saute 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, parsley, bay leaves and cumin. Stir together 1 tablespoon reserved corn starch mixture and the water; add. Stirring constantly, bring to boil and boil 2 minutes.

Farmers Like Clear Skies

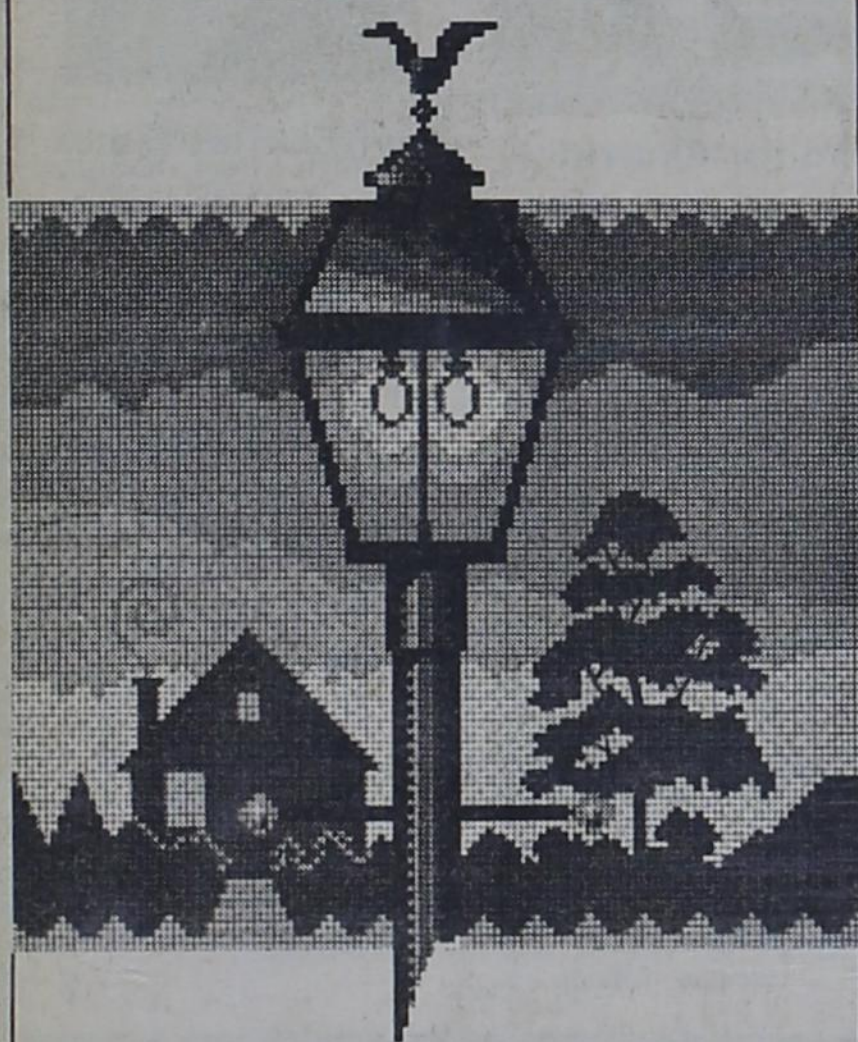
The rainfall was lighter in the Bovina area and north and west than it was south and east. Some two inches were received here during the week.

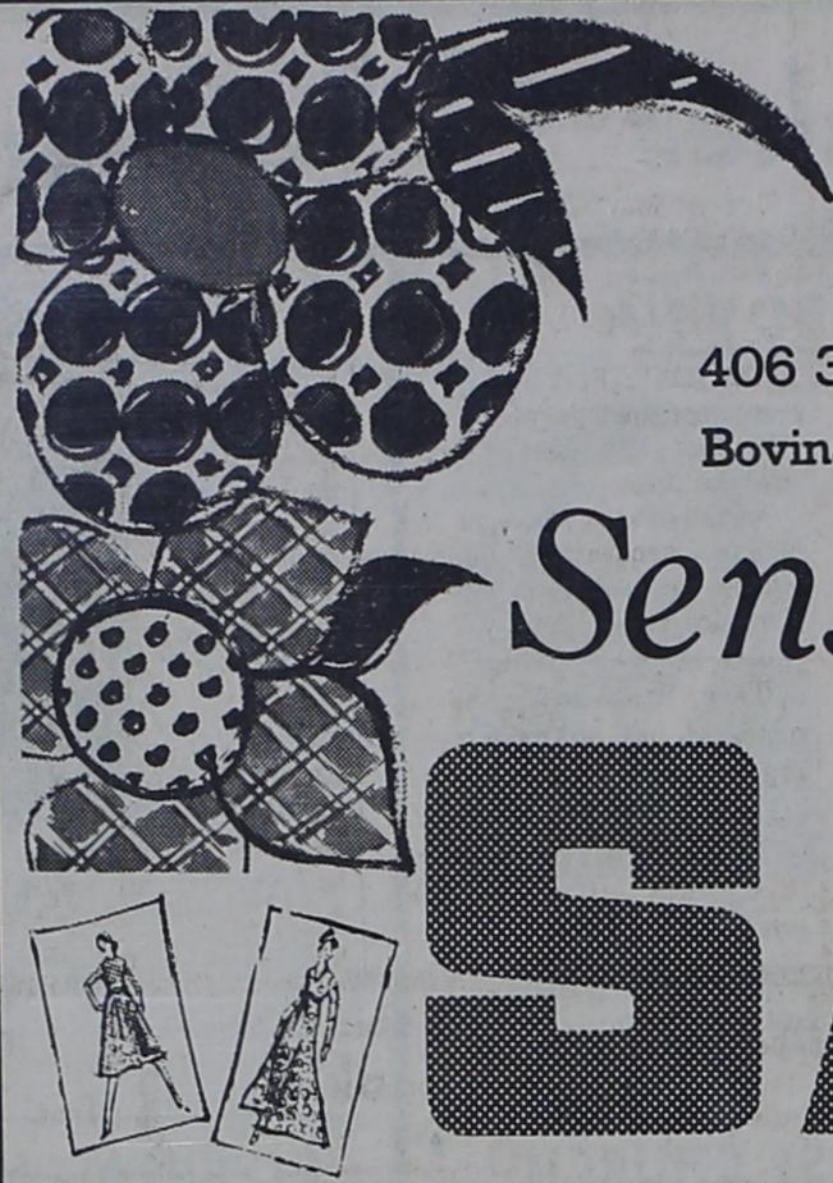

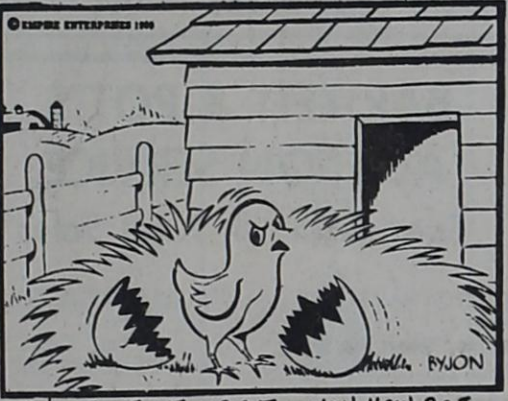

Anderson offered a \$100 cash prize for any participant scoring a hole in one and a \$100 added purse.

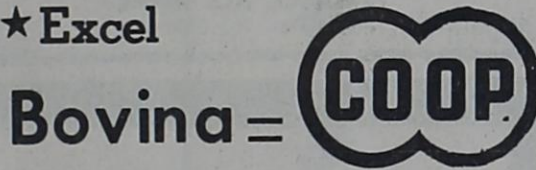

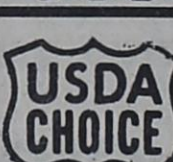

'Ecology' Kick Source Of Interesting Hobby

Mrs. E. J. (Beulah) Hodges of the Pleasant Hill Community is doing her bit for the "ecology" movement.

From a beginning in ceramics about three years ago, she has moved into bottle stretching and now bottle cutting in the past few months.

She can count customers for her unique wares from California, Maryland, Florida, Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico and across the state of Texas.

Mrs. Hodges began her bottle cutting projects with a simple kit purchased in a hobby shop, but when that proved to be unsatisfactory for the amount of work she was doing, she invested in a larger, more customized cutting kit.

Liquor bottles prove to make the most interesting items. They are transformed into sets of stemmed glasses with matching stemmed bowls, fruit bowls, planters, ash trays, candleholders and containers to hold almost anything the imagination will allow.

The first step in the process is to decide what to make of a bottle and where to cut it. From then on, the process is almost routine for Mrs. Hodges. The apparatus used for the cutting is a block of wood that is grooved in several places and has a vise to hold the glass object.

A simple wiring system is attached to the wood and a thin wire is placed around the bottle where the cut is to be made. When the current is activated, the wire becomes hot and will eventually burn almost through the bottle.

The bottle gives off a crackling noise during this process and at just the precise moment,

the current is turned off and the bottle is removed from the apparatus. Then it is tapped lightly, and if all goes according to plan, the bottle will break apart just where the wire was placed around it.

Mrs. Hodges says that very few bottles shatter and when they do, it is no great loss. For a stemmed glass, she glues the top portion of the bottle to the bottom with epoxy and then sands the cut edges to smooth the rough spots and, voila', a stemmed glass. The finished product may be left plain or decorated in any manner desired.

One of her more unique items, with which she just recently experimented and found would work, is a set of glass chimes, made from the top third of beer bottles. About four or five are strung on a knotted length of heavy twine and make a pleasant chime effect when hung outside on a porch or patio.

Mrs. Hodges bought her first kiln about three years ago and was just "dabbling" in ceramics and bottle stretching for a time. All of a sudden, she says, her hobby mushroomed until she had to buy a second kiln to keep up with orders.

She also teaches a ceramics painting class on Tuesdays.

A novelty stretched bottle in her collection is an insulator, such as is used on electric and telephone poles, that is shaped to resemble a cat. With whiskers and other features glued in the appropriate places, it takes on the definite appearance of a cat.

Her ceramic items display a delicate touch with the paints and her home is decorated with many of her finished products. She has also made numerous ceramic figures of athletes, cheerleaders and motorcyclists for gift items. The small figures can be painted in school colors with the desired numbers or lettering for a personalized gift item for any teenager's room.

Mrs. Hodges said her hobbies have afforded her the opportunity to get acquainted with many people, including other hobbyists, over the past three years and she derives a great deal of satisfaction and fulfillment from her ceramics class.

And what could be a more inexpensive hobby, that at the same time goes along with the current ecology fad that most of the country is involved in, as a simple bottle cutting kit.
