He might as well save his efforts and the voters their pencils as to bother with a write-in campaign.

Besides, it probably isn't convenient for voting machines to accept write-in votes. This is just some more of the voting procedure transition.

From the standpoint of counting votes from paper ballots, probably the most troublesome and most meaningless thing is to count the votes for candidates who have no opponent. This is just as time consuming as counting the votes in contested races and not nearly as interesting and does no good whatsoever. If write-ins are not permitted, the lone candidate who was lucky enough to file for that particular office is elected right then and there. Time and expense could be saved in not bothering the voters to make a mark by a man's name who is already elected.

Nobody asked us, but that's the way we see the situation.

Honor students of the 1972 Senior Class, Bovina High School, have been announced by Gary Cox, principal. The top five include three boys and two girls.


Jackie Adams is valedictorian of the class with a four-year grade average of 91.44. Barbara Griffith is salutatorian with 88.44.




Thursday, May 25, at 8 p.m. in school auditorium, 59 eighth graders will receive diplomas ceremonies.

To State Convention --

County Demos Send Uninstructed Reps

Parmer County Democrats adopted three resolutions, one on a split vote, at their bi-annual convention Saturday afternoon in Friona.

Representatives to the county convention from the precinct level went on record as favoring the proposed plan for import-

ing water to West Texas, were against Daylight Saving Time, and voted against the present Electoral College method of electing presidents.

The Parmer Countians were unanimous in agreement on the first two issues. They voted 18-10 as being against the Elec-

toral College after lengthy discussion.

Also, the convention named five delegates from Parmer County to the state Democratic convention which will be in San Antonio in mid-June.

Delegates elected were Chas. W. Flynn and Johnnie Horn of

Bovina, Hugh Moseley of Farwell and Steve Messenger and Richard Collard of Friona.

The meeting was harmonious except for the split vote and the discussion on the Electoral College system.

The delegates to the state convention are uninstructed and uncommitted as far as presidential candidates are concerned.

Presiding at the meeting was Hollis Horton of Friona, recently-elected county Democratic chairman. Horton was named to succeed Nelson Welch, also of Friona, in the May 6 primary election.

County Democrats formally expressed appreciation to Welch, who served as chairman for the past several years, prior to resigning as of May 8.

Based on the number of votes cast for the Democratic candidate for governor in the last general election, Friona was eligible for 21 delegates to the county convention, Bovina 11, Farwell nine, Lazbuddie five, Oklahoma Lane four, and Rhea, Lakeview and Black one each.

The county is allowed one delegate to the state convention for each 300 votes, or major fraction thereof, cast for the Demo governor in the '70 general election. This is the way in which the total of five was arrived at.

Named as alternate delegates were Dolph Moten, Mrs. Hugh Moseley, Mrs. Steve Messenger, Mrs. Richard Collard and Mrs. Johnnie Horn.



On The Farm In Palmer County

With school almost out and most of the college set home or on the way, we are already thinking about that long awaited summer trip, whether it is to Europe or just camping for the weekend or church or band camp or that trip with the Scouts or 4-H. No matter where we're going we like to be prepared for the occasion so here are some packing tips that might help.

Clothes unpacked from a suitcase needn't look like you slept in them.

There's a way to pack that minimizes wrinkles.

The traveler who's carefree, fresh and unrumpled has mastered packing comfortable clothes -- both neatly and sensibly. Good packing begins with planning ahead. You determine all the clothes and accessories needed for the climates and activities your trip will include. Visualize every outfit from head to toe, inside to outside. Also itemize the cosmetics and drugs you usually rely on.

For a greater variety with a minimum of bulk, choose a basic color scheme and garments that serve more than one purpose. Pack clothes that you enjoy wearing and that can "take it." Easy-care fabrics are ideal for travel. These include such materials as jerseys, no-wrinkle synthetics and blends and knits -- garments that are washable as well as packable. Prints that camouflage spots and wrinkles are also good traveling companions.

Whether using the "roll-up" or "fold-it-flat" method, pack tightly, but without crushing clothes. Too much room allows clothes to roll and shift, thus forming unnecessary wrinkles. Pad out needed folds with crumpled tissue paper or soft garments.

Use plastic bags for laundry, damp swimsuits, or anything you want to protect. Tissue paper and plastic bags are the tools of good packing.

Pack heavier items such as shoes and less used garments in the bottom of the suitcase. Lighter, frequently used items should be placed near the top. Carry cosmetics in a separate case. A good method of arranging cosmetics is to pack go-

together individually. For example, put hair setting items together and soaps and cleaning supplies in another area or package.

Plastic bottles and jars make ideal containers because of their light-weightness. Leave room at the top to allow for expansion of liquids; then seal with tape.

Do not forget the many small gadgets on the market that make life easier for the traveler. Consider such things as folding inflatable hangup miniature clotheslines and pins, sewing and repair kits, spot remover, shoe shine pads and plug-in hot cups.

It's wise to make allowances for an unexpected separation of you and your luggage by labeling both inside and outside with your name and address. An unusual decal or strip of colored tape on the outside of your luggage will cut time spent at baggage claim areas to a minimum. The change of someone picking up your bag by mistake will also be reduced.

Planning ahead for your travel needs will give you that extra amount of confidence as you open your luggage for the first time. When miles from home, you'll find that you did bring that oh-so-important item.

- 2 tablespoons flour
 - 2 tablespoons corn starch
 - 3/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 1/2 pound top round steak, 1 inch thick
 - Corn oil for frying
 - 1 medium onion, sliced
 - 1 (1-pound) can tomatoes
 - 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 - 2 bay (or laurel) leaves
 - 1/2 teaspoon cumin
 - 1 tablespoon water
- Mix together flour, corn starch, salt and pepper. Coat meat with mixture. Reserve remaining corn starch mixture. Pour corn oil into large skillet to depth of 1/4 inch. Heat over medium high heat 3 to 4 minutes. Add meat and cook, turning once, about 25 minutes or until meat has crisp crust on both sides and is medium rare. Remove meat. Drain off all but about 1 tablespoon drippings from skillet. Return meat; add onion and saute 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, parsley, bay leaves and cumin. Stir together 1 tablespoon reserved corn starch mixture and the water; add. Stirring constantly, bring to boil and boil 2 minutes.


The rainfall was lighter in the Bovina area and north and west than it was south and east. Some two inches were received here during the week.



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


