

County Favors Briscoe For Governor

Parmer Voters Lukewarm About Run-Offs

Only 1300 Citizens Go To Polls

Voters in Parmer County, Democrats and Republicans, favored three of five state-wide winners in Saturday's run-off primaries.

Interest in the run-off voting, which featured four races on the Demo slate and one on the GOP ballot, was only lukewarm. Just over 1300 voted out of a potential of some three times that many.

The Democrats gave an overwhelming majority to Dolph Briscoe, the South Texas rancher-banker, who was the state-wide winner over Frances "Sissy" Farenthold of Corpus Christi. Briscoe's total was 988 while Mrs. Farenthold, a state representative who upset the odds to earn a run-off berth in last month's first primary, received 256.

Parmer Countians also favored Barefoot Sanders, Dallas lawyer, over former Senator Ralph Yarborough, 816 to 418, a margin of two to one. Sanders was the winner across the state in a major upset. Yarborough came within a few hundred votes of winning the nomination in the first primary without a run-off. Sanders will go against Republican incumbent Senator John Tower in the general election in November.

In this county, Yarborough came close to winning only three of the six boxes, Bovina, Lazbuddie and Oklahoma Lane. The former senator trailed 106 to 101 in Bovina, 59 to 52 in Lazbuddie and 54 to 35 at Oklahoma Lane, Sanders carried by large margins at Friona, Farwell and Lakeview.

Parmer Democrats were out of step with the state's voters in the lieutenant governors' race. Here State Senator Wayne Connally was a 3-1 choice over Bill Hobby, Houston newspaper executive who was the overall winner. Connally received 923 votes to Hobby's 311.

Parmer's vote for the state

office of comptroller of public accounts agreed with the rest of the state as veteran incumbent

Robert S. Calvert was given a lead over the challenger, James (Jim) Wilson, 664 to 548.

Prospects Not Bright --

Farmers On Brink Of Wheat Harvest

With a minimum of enthusiasm, this area is on the brink of wheat harvest---1972.

Wheat, once a major crop in Parmer County, has slipped in importance in recent years. This is especially true from the standpoint of wheat which is harvested.

This year's harvested crops expected to be down considerably from last year --- possibly as much as 50 per cent or even more.

Reduced government allot-

ments for wheat is one reason for the decrease in the number of acres which will be harvested.

Another reason is that farmers were permitted to "graze out" some of their wheat acres with cattle this year and many elected to take advantage of this change in the government program.

Elevator people here expect wheat harvest to get into full swing the latter part of next week. Some dryland will be

brought to elevators in the meantime, but not much, they predict.

Sherley Grain Co. received its first load of wheat Monday. It was dryland from J. T. Hammonds' place northwest of town.

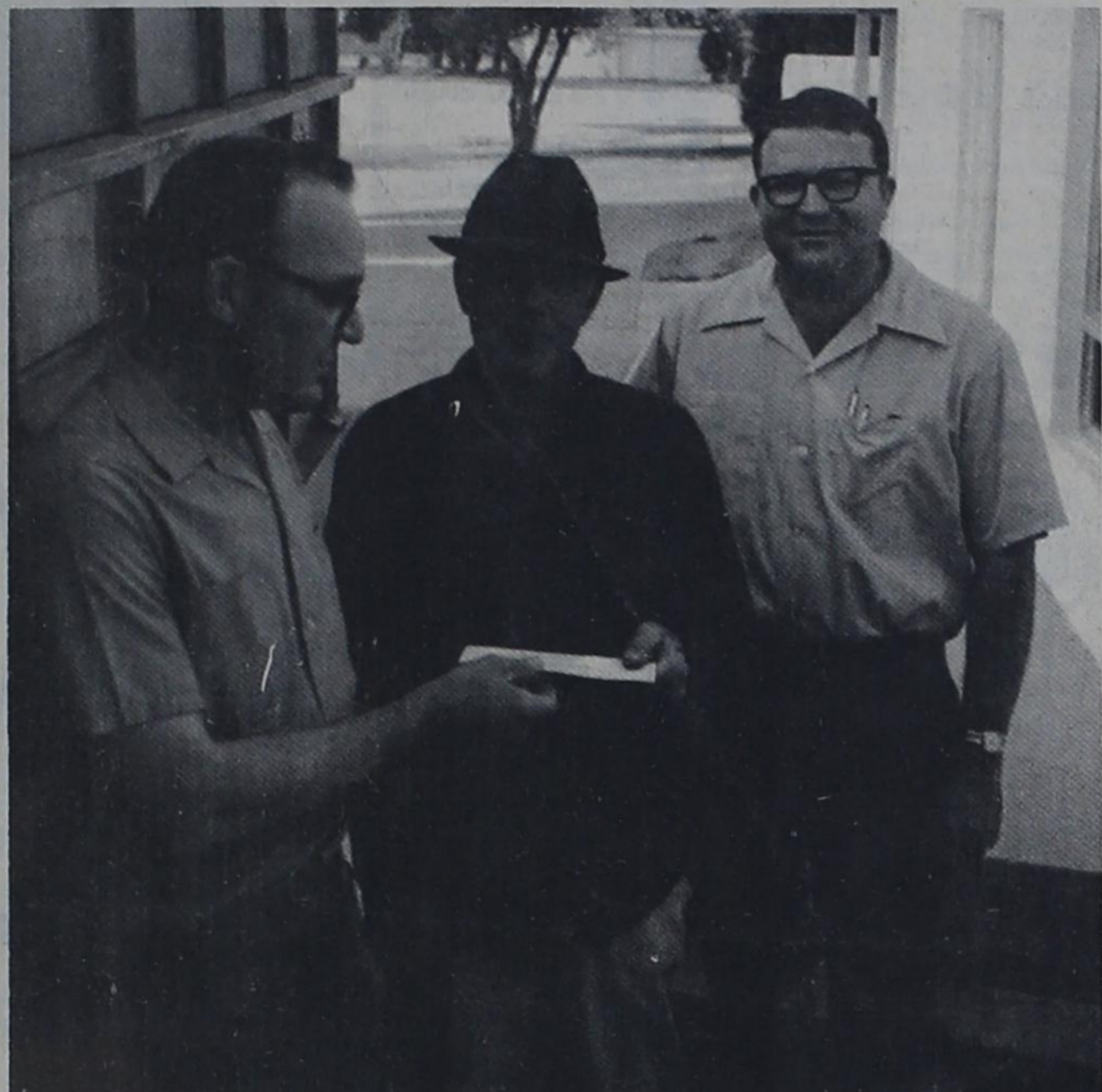
Bedford Caldwell had the first load of '72 barley. It was delivered to the elevator Saturday afternoon.

Both first loads were dry --- in the neighborhood of 12 per cent moisture.

wheat acreage is the discouraging attitude that yields this year won't break any records.

There's a possibility of some freeze damage, for instance, and the low price of the crop doesn't offer encouragement to farmers to go all out to make the top yields.

The price this season is expected to be in the \$1.25 per bushel range. This is down from 15 or 20 cents over last year's price.

Art Linkletter made a television show about the things kids say. And he might have been on the right track.

While umpiring a Little League baseball game recently, we were between innings and eager to get the next frame underway.

With possibly just a hint of impatience in our voice, we asked the 11-year-old catcher if he wanted to make the customary practice throw to second base before the batter stepped up and play began.

"Now, that's all right, I can't get it there, anyway. Let's start playing," he answered.

The surprising answer held up the game a few more seconds, however. We had to turn away from the frank-speaking catcher and smile to ourselves before we were ready for the game to continue.

Dolph Briscoe, who will be the next governor of Texas barring some unforeseen happening, like a Republican win in November, was accused by his opposition back before Saturday's run-off primary of working wet-backs on his South Texas ranch.

This was meant to be a slam at the successful politician at the time it was brought up. However, we doubt that the charge, whether it was right or wrong, lost him many votes. Too many people have done or are doing or will do the same thing under similar circumstances.

However, one explanation was that the workers weren't "wet" at all; they'd just lost their papers while chasing Briscoe's oows through the South Texas brush.

Could be.

The same informant who told about the lost papers says he has an acquaintance who lives here on a part-time basis but calls a South Texas county home.

In a conversation about voting, the part-time resident here said he always voted in South Texas. "You should vote here. That's too far to go to vote when you could cast your ballot locally," he was told.

"Oh, I don't have to go," was the answer. "They vote for me down there."

We guess it would be nice to have buddies who would be so helpful at election-time when you were away.

Recent statistics compiled and published by the Agricultural Development Department of Southwestern Public Service Company, which Sam A. Thomas heads, shows that Parmer County has seven cattle feedlots with a total capacity of 194,000 head.

That appears to make Our County second only to Deaf Smith, our neighbor to the north. Deaf Smith's capacity is in the neighborhood of 250,000 head.

According to the SWPS brochure's figures, Parmer County fed 380,300 cattle in '71.

With most feedlots filled to near capacity now, more cattle will probably be fed in the county this year than last. That makes a demand for a heap of grain sorghum.

It's no longer a secret, of course, but this area in particular and the High Plains of Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and a small part of Kansas in general is where the cattle-feeding action is.

The packing plant people, realizing this, have come into the area. A total of 15 packing plants are now located in the aforementioned area, the electric company's publication points out.

Total annual capacity of the 15 packing plants is roughly 2.25 million. That's less than the number of cattle fed in the area last year. That figure was almost four million.

The fast growth of the cattle feeding industry in the past six years is pointed out in the publication.

The capacity of feedlots in the area in '66 was 565,000. The capacity now is 2,160,250. That means the industry has multiplied by four in the six-year period.

That's fast. And it's a great thing for the area.

Winners in the contest will be determined on the total points earned in the events of pitching, hitting and throwing.

A total of 41 boys entered the contest last year, an increase of about 20 over the first year the contest was held here.

Steven Stone, David Merrill, David Murphy and Tommy Serina were the winners last year in the nine, 10, 11 and 12 age group categories, respectively. Runners-up were Jon Cox, Eddie Isaac, Bruce Filippot and Rocky Bartlett in those categories.

Phillips 66 Dealers and the National and American Baseball Leagues are sponsoring the event nationally.

Spectators are invited to attend the competition, Charles says.

SIX YEARS AGO

Wheat harvest, 1966 version, is expected to get underway in the Parmer County area in a week to two weeks.

This year's crop is expected to be every bit as good and possibly better than the 1965 wheat. The county average was 52 bushels per acre last year, according to County Agent Joe Van-Zandt.

By a margin of just-less than 2-1, Wilbur Charles was winner of the Democratic nomination for Justice of the Peace of Parmer County Precinct No. 3 over Lucille Killough, the incumbent, in Saturday's second primary election.

Twenty-three students had enrolled for Project Headstart by Tuesday morning at the Bovina Schools; more are expected to enroll this week.

"Just what the farmer ordered." This is an appropriate description of the kind of rain which fell here Tuesday and Wednesday nights of last week.

The overall total for both nights in the Bovina area was 2.25 inches, with approximately half falling each of the nights.

Jack McCracken has resigned as manager of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

McCracken was one of the founders of the organization in 1960 and has served as manager-secretary on a part-time basis since that time.

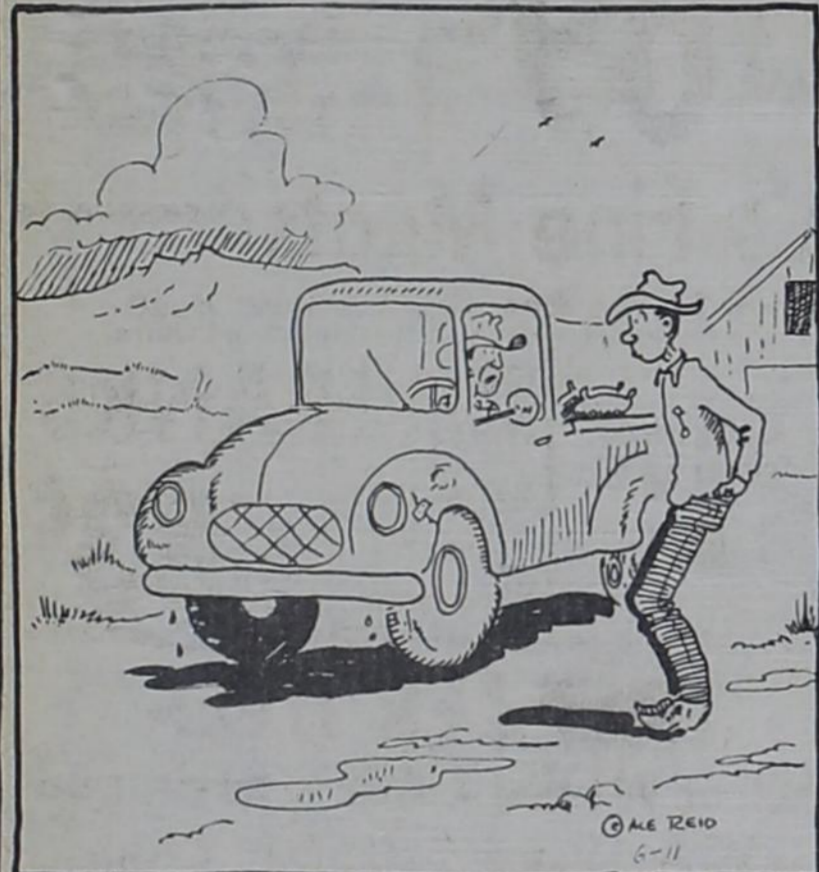

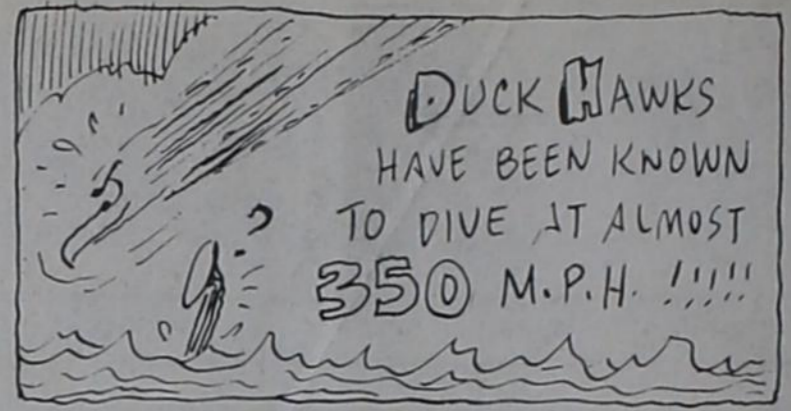
Club To Ride In Clovis Parade

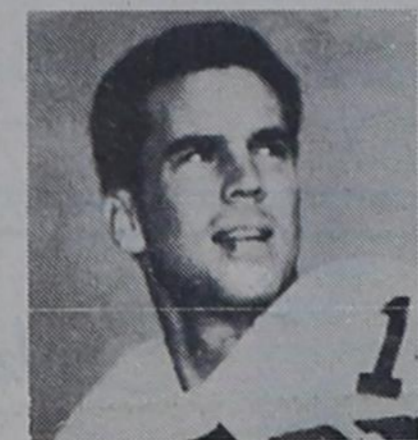
Carson, Gober To Attend --

3 c. milk

Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils. Boil one minute. Remove from heat. Gradually stir hot mixture into

3 egg yolks, slightly beaten. Boil one minute more, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, blend in 1 T. butter and 1 1/2 t. vanilla. Make meringue with egg whites. Pour pie filling into cooled baked pie shell. Top with meringue and brown.

PINEAPPLE CHESS PIE
5 eggs
2 2/3 c. sugar
2 T. flour
1 stick oleo, melted
1 large can crushed pineapple (do not drain)
2 t. vanilla

Mix ingredients together and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Bonnie says this recipe will make one-9 inch pie and a smaller pie.

ICEBOX SALAD
2 heads cabbage
3 T. salt
4 c. sugar
2 c. vinegar
1 c. water

1 large stalk celery, chopped
2 large Bell peppers
2 large red sweet peppers or pimento
1 t. celery seed
1 t. mustard seed

Shred cabbage and put in large container. Sprinkle with the salt and let set for 2 hours.

Boil sugar, vinegar and water together for three minutes. Let stand until completely cold.

Squeeze all water out of cabbage. Mix all other ingredients with cabbage. Pour cold syrup over mixture and place in tightly sealed container. Will keep several days in refrigerator.

SPAGHETTI SAUCE
2 cans tomato sauce
4 cans water
1 T. sugar
1 t. oregano
sprinkle of nutmeg and allspice
garlic
salt and pepper
Mix together and simmer for 2 hours.

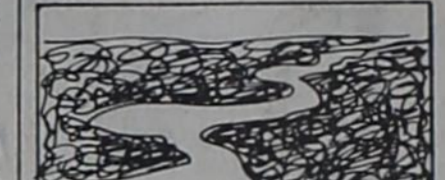
Mrs. Virginia Rhodes of Bovina has been named to the spring semester Honor Roll at West Texas State University at Canyon.

At Home In Palmer County

Bouncy, playful and energetic children dot the playgrounds as summer weather rolls in.

Because children are happy and free, young mothers will want to provide their offspring with clothing that helps them enjoy their freedom.

Summer clothing should encourage the growth of children.

Independence may be developed by selecting clothes that have self-help features. A child wants his clothes to be easy to manipulate. Children become impatient if dressing takes too long

or if they have to obtain help in dressing.

The ability to dress himself gives a child the feeling of independence and self confidence.

Choose dresses and shirts with front openings -- snaps, decorative zippers or large buttons. Pullovers that easily slip over the head are helpful.

Avoid back openings, back tying sashes and small buttons. According to the specialist, poor fit is why most young children don't wear certain clothes. Comfortable clothes allow free-

dom. On the other hand, loosely fitting garments bought for a child to grow into are just as disturbing as those that are too tight.

To allow for growth, look for clothing designs that may adapt themselves easily to growth, rather than buying garments which are too large.

Features that allow some growth include undefined waistlines, raglan or kimono sleeves, deep hems or cuffs, long tails on shirts and blouses and knit or stretch fabrics. Deep-cut armholes, comfortable cuffs and necklines also allow freedom of movement.

A well-dressed child is better mannered, more self confident and less rowdy than a poorly dressed one.

As children approach school age and enter a world of playmates and classrooms, their dress should suit the activities they'll take part in. Simple, uncluttered lines are compatible with a child's active life. Consider the number and size

of pockets. Children are collectors and enjoy using large pockets. Younger children prefer bright colors and often want to express their choice.

Suitable clothes can make childhood a delightful period. They may contribute to the developing social character of the child. Carefully chosen clothes encourage independence, self confidence and freedom of activity.

Although some of our local 4-H'ers may still seem to be children, we have some handy little nine, 10 and 11 year old beginning seamstresses.

And for the 4-H girls in the county we are planning a Seminar on June 14 at 2 p.m. in the Friona High School Auditorium. This is co-sponsored by Castro and Deaf Smith Counties. The program will include tips for the girls on grooming, fashion and modeling to prepare them for the County Dress Revue on July 25.

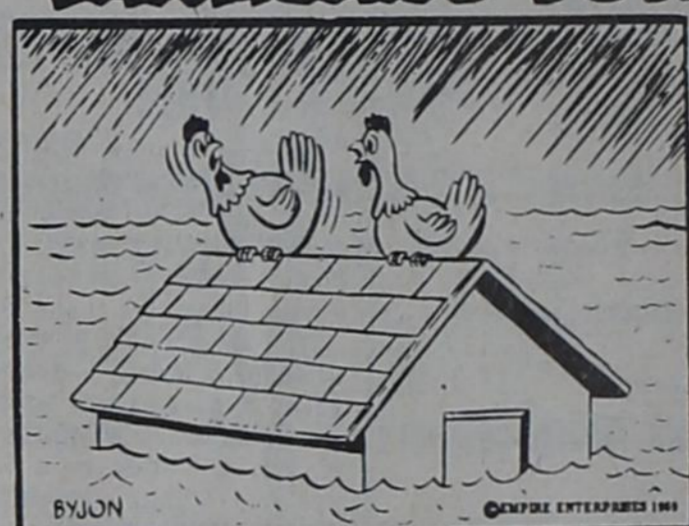

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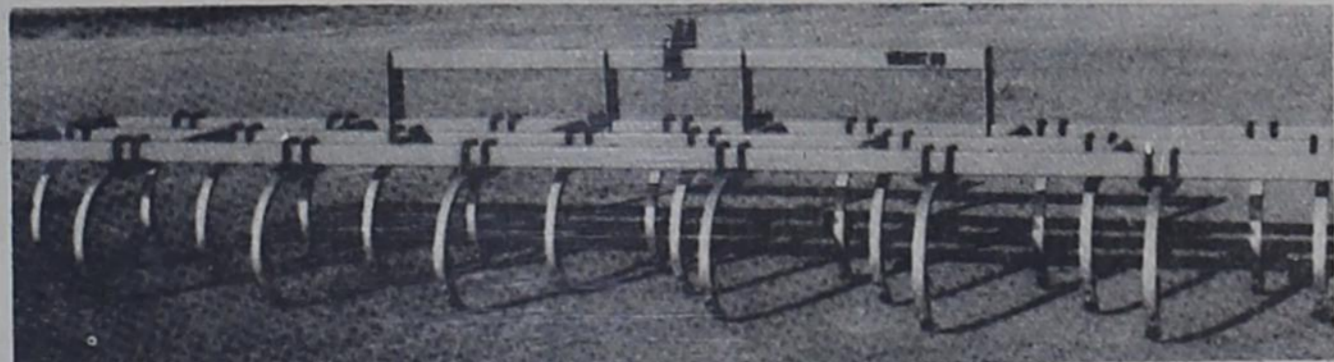
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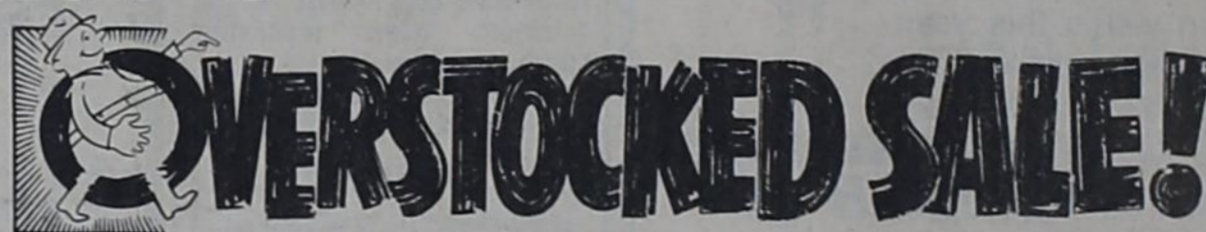
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
