# Powers Denounce Coup In Czechoslovakia

## LOCAL FIRM TO REBUILD 1,200 MOTORS

Eastland Auto Parts Contracts Furnish 100 Per Month; Means \$100,000 in New Business

By the terms of a contract just consummated between Eastland Auto Parts of Eastland, of which Milton J. Gaines is owner and operator, and a nationally known concern, Gaines contracts to furnish 100 or more rebuilt automobile engines per month for twelve months. These engines, which, it is understood, are to be placed in West Texas, will be completely rebuilt with all new parts and will be given the same service guarantee as that given new factory built motors.

The contract, Gaines said, would run about \$100,000 and would require his adding at least three additional men to his force, which at present numbers six men.

Gaines, who came to Eastland from Wichita Falls about ten years ago, has been engaged in the auto parts business for a long time. He served 27 months with the government during World War II as automotive instructor, training 6,000 men. His plant at Eastland, which is housed in a new tile and concrete building 72x100 feet and located at South Seaman and East Olive streets, is considered one of the best and most complete of its kind between Fort Worth and El Paso.

In the past 18 months Gaines has rebuilt and placed in this area more than 1000 motors.

## Says Truman's Policy Ups Costs Of Flood Control

WASHINGTON — Rep. Albert J. Engel, R., Mich., charged today that President Truman's policies are running up the costs on flood control project.

His statement was made as the house opened debate on the \$606,558,766 Army civil functions bill. The measure provides money for rivers and harbors, flood control, Army cemeteries and the army's other non-military activities.

Engel elaborated on his prepared House statement to a reporter. He said he did not want to inject "politics" in flood control. But he said he felt bound to report the results of Mr. Truman's order "freezing" some \$386,000,000 in flood control projects in July 1946.

## FOUR KILLED WHEN B-29 CRASHES INTO HILLSIDE

FORT WORTH, Tex.—Four crewmen were killed early today when a B-29 Superfortresses crashed into a hillside and exploded near Meridian.

Eight other officers and enlisted men parachuted to safety moments before the four-engined ship ploughed into the ground 12 miles west of Meridian.

A party from Carswell Air Force Base at Fort Worth, where the plane took off on a training flight with 20 other B-29s last night, reported from the scene of the crash that four bodies had been found.

Among the survivors, who parachuted from the plane into rainy darkness shortly after midnight, was Col. Alan D. Clark, commander of the Seventh Bombardment Group of the Eighth Air Force. He was in charge of the 20-plane flight.

The plane exploded when it crashed in the hilly ranch country along the Brazos River in central Texas. Those who parachuted to safety found their way to ranch houses during the night.

Identification of the dead crewmen was being made at the scene by medical officers from the Fort Worth air base. Their names would not be disclosed until next of kin had been notified.

An operations officer at Fort Worth identified the survivors as Col. Clark of Fort Worth, who served as chief of supply and maintenance at the Bikini atom bomb tests in 1946.

## Southwest Peanut Markets Are Quite And Weaker

Southwest peanut markets reported little activity this week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Most mills are still shelling on Commodity Credit Corporation contracts, but a few are now shelling some for edible trade.

Demand for peanuts is very slow, according to reports received by PMA. Average prices indicated a weaker undertone. Number 1 shelled Spanish are quoted at 166 2-3 to 167 7-8 cents per pound.

Farmers' stock prices are generally holding at the Government support levels.

Southeastern markets followed about the same trends as those in the southwest. Prices were about unchanged but the average was lower.

Also, the peanut oil and meal markets are slightly easier this week, especially the oil market. Southwest oil sold generally at 21 to 21 1-2 cents f.o.b. mills and meal of 43 per cent protein content mostly around \$80 per ton.

## Senator Charges Interference In Tidelands Case

WASHINGTON — Sen. Pat McCarran, D., Nev., today accused the administration of attempting to "stymie" legislation which would return oil-rich tidelands to the states.

McCarran indicated the administration was trying to mollify some states by preparing legislation which would amount to a federal "quitclaim" to lands beneath inland waters.

He said the administration proposal is "an admission on the part of the government" that a 1947 Supreme Court decision giving the federal government "paramount powers" over tidelands, "has gone too far."

McCarran said the legislation is "an effort to stymie" the Senate-House judiciary subcommittee which is considering legislation which would establish state title to all so-called tidelands. Some state representatives have told the committee the court decision also casts a cloud on inland water rights.

State Democratic leader Alben W. Barkley, Ky., introduced a bill in the Senate last yesterday which would relinquish any federal claim to submerged lands beneath inland navigable waters.

## Cisco Corporation To Build Housing

Organization of a realty corporation in Cisco to be known as the Oakhurst Development Company, Inc., for the construction of houses in Cisco for rent and for sale, was announced recently.

Approval of FHA financing on the first 35 to 50 houses is being sought.

Organized by Cisco capital, the corporation is the outgrowth of an attack upon the housing problem undertaken by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

## COMMUNISTS ACCUSED OF SETTING UP DICTATORSHIP

WASHINGTON — The United States, Great Britain and France today denounced the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia as establishment of "a disguised dictatorship."

The three power statement charged that events in Czechoslovakia jeopardized "the very existence of the principles of liberty."

The communique was issued here, in London, and in Paris.

The communique said the consequences of the Communist seizure of power could only be "disastrous" for the Czechoslovak people.

The three-power statement was worked out after consultations taken on the initiative of the United States in the past 24 hours.

The communique said the governments of the United States, France and Great Britain note that "by means of a crisis artificially and deliberately instigated the use of certain methods already tested in other places has permitted the suspension of the free exercise of parliamentary institutions and the establishment of a disguised dictatorship of a single party under the cloak of a government of national union."

## Bowed To Avoid Blood Shed

PRAGUE — President Eduard Benes bowed to Communist demands under duress to avoid bloodshed, a high official said today, adding that the President might resign or flee the country to make his position clear.

The official saw Benes yesterday as the Communist coup was being completed. He gave a picture of the President giving in to irresistible pressure because he saw no other course, and still determined to dissipate any impression that he consented freely to the Communist solution of the crisis.

Benes was reported seriously ill. The official who saw him said the strain of incessant work and dispute for three days had broken down his reserve strength and health.

## HISTORY OF MORMON TOWN IN TEXAS IS RELATED

GILMER, Tex. (UP)—The largest settlement of Mormons in East Texas, if not the state, may be found six miles west of Gilmer in the Kelsey community.  
An estimated 500 persons make their home there and have for nearly half a century.  
The story of the founding of the community dates back to 1899 when two brothers, John and Jim Edgar, Alabama residents, started west to seek new lands in Arizona for members of the church to homestead.

## Learning English Becomes Easier

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (UP)—Put a group of Mexican students who can't speak English into a room with a teacher who can't speak Spanish—and they'll learn English faster than in ordinary language classes.  
That's the verdict from Brownsville Junior College, which conducted a unique experimental English class. The college liked the idea so well it has put it in as a permanent classroom procedure.  
Fourteen students, most of them from across the Rio Grande in Mexico, enrolled in the first class with Mrs. G. B. Winstead as instructor.

None of the students spoke English; Mrs. Winstead knew not a word of Spanish.  
Except for a spelling book, no textbooks were used and for the first few days the students progressed haltingly, using gestures and groping for words to express themselves to Mrs. Winstead.  
They discussed their everyday life, talked about the weather, and didn't bother too much about learning a set English vocabulary—but they never uttered a word that wasn't English.  
In the class was a 14 year old Monterrey lad who wanted to learn English so he could handle correspondence for his family's business with United States firms.

Dairying and farming are the principal occupations of the of the Upshur county Mormons. Many live at nearby Enoch community and in Gilmer. The church in East Texas numbers more than 1,000.  
The Mormon farmer is quick to accept progressive ideas. Their homes are neat and they keep tidy milk barns and other farm structures. He has developed the dairy industry to second position in importance in Upshur county, second to sweet potato production.  
Plans now are underway to build a \$30,000 church in Gilmer and an auditorium for recreation programs. Although Mormons oppose the use of tobacco in any form, liquor, tea or coffee, they do not frown on dancing or athletics. Some of Gilmer's outstanding athletes have been Mormon boys.

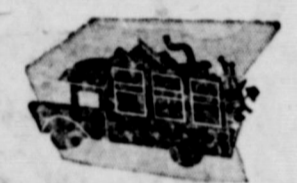

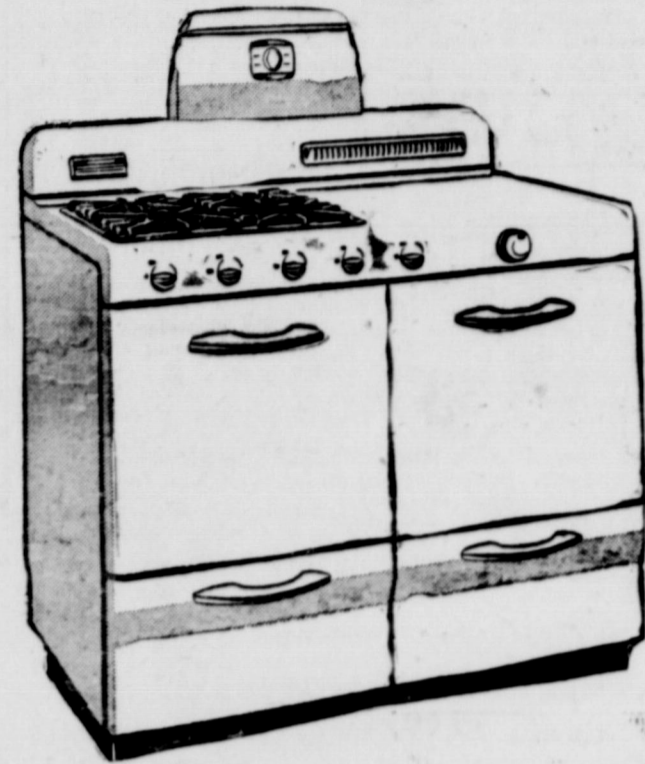

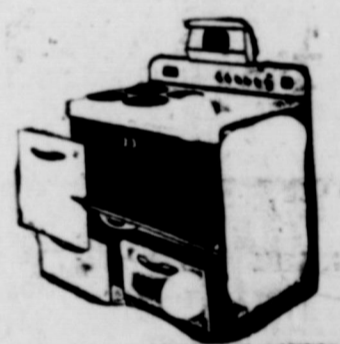

### Pre-Fire Planning Used In Seattle To Cut Loss

SEATTLE (UP) — Seattle firemen don't sit around in their suspenders and play pinocle between fires.

Firemen here work a full eight-hour shift, even if not a single alarm is sounded. They spend time between fires planning how to fight fires. Not just any fire, but fires that might break out in specific buildings through the city.

Fire Chief William Fitzgerald in 1946 began what he calls a "pre-fire planning" system. It is believed to be exclusive with the Seattle fire department. The system means all fire companies not actively fighting a fire, maintaining equipment or drilling are out inspecting buildings and laying plans on how a fire would be fought in the structure. Homes are not inspected.

After each inspection, which takes a full shift of 26 men for an average-sized building, a detailed, 15-page report is made. It tells—among many other things—where the nearest fire outlets are, location of fire escapes, and the order in which companies should arrive at the scene. Also, it contains a floor plan drawn by the firemen.

However, this doesn't end the planning. The companies return to each building at intervals to familiarize them further with the layout. Also, to check any safety regulations which they may have suggested to the owner.

Chief Fitzgerald says the entire system is made possible by one thing, radio.

"Without radio our men would have to stay in quarters when not fighting a fire to be in contact with headquarters at all times," the chief says. "We now have radios in all our main equipment."

Fitzgerald credits "pre-fire planning" for the astoundingly low fire loss in Seattle.

"The year we started the plan our loss was 70 per cent below the national average," Fitzgerald said.

### Pa. Progresses In Clean-Up Job Of River

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UP) — Three million people in Pennsylvania, or about a third of the state's population, depend on the Schuylkill River for their industrial and domestic water supplies.

It is one of the dirtiest rivers in the country. At Pottsville, near its source, it often resembles a river of ink. But largely through the efforts of Gov. James H. Duff, a hard-fighting conservationist, the Delaware River tributary in southeastern Pennsylvania isn't as bad as it used to be.

Duff concentrated the opening attack in a long-range commonwealth clean-up program in the Schuylkill River Valley and along its tributaries. He said he picked the Schuylkill for "the aggressive beginning" because one-third of the population, including the people of Philadelphia, used the water of the medium-sized river at work and in the home.

In a report on the accomplishments of his first year as governor Duff, placing emphasis as usual on the commonwealth's anti-pollution campaign, said 2,000,000 tons of fine anthracite coal and silt had been removed from the Schuylkill.

He added that 32 of the 57 collieries and coal washeries in the river basin placed de-silting works in operation or were near completion of them.

"I am therefore able to report," Duff said in his message to the people, "that the tremendous program for the cleaning up of the silt from this river is no longer in the discussion or the blueprint state—it is in the actual process of accomplishment."

### Atlantic Ice Patrol Starting Thirty-Fifth Yr.

BOSTON (UP) — The 35th year of the international ice patrol established as a result of the sinking of the "unsinkable" Titanic in 1912, will get under way about March 1, according to the Coast Guard.

On ice patrol and weather observation duty for the first 23 days of the season will be the Coast Guard cutter Mendota, which then will be relieved by the cutter Macoma. Assisting the cutters this year will be the buoy tender Evergreen, which will serve as oceanographic vessel.

The patrol was started in 1913 when representatives of various maritime nations met in London. It is now maintained by the United States, with other nations contributing to its upkeep.

On April 15, 1912, the British liner Titanic on its maiden voyage from Southampton to New York struck an iceberg on the Grand Banks off the coast of Newfoundland and sank with loss of 1,517 lives.

The job of the patrol has been to prevent a repetition of such disasters. When giant ice fields and bergs start moving southward about March 1, the Coast Guard is on hand to chart their movements and report them to maritime sources. It usually takes until middle June before the patrol task is completed for another year, but in 1939 the work lasted until Aug. 20.

Already a converted B-17, based at the Coast Guard station in Argentina, Newfoundland, is making preliminary observations.

# Silvery Bells Of Rome Owe Much To Family Making Them 300 Years

ROME (UP)—The Borgo Pio quarter of Rome is poor and squalid. The bell-shaped dome of the Lucenti family is dingy and smoky but you can see the majestic dome of nearby St. Peter's from its doorway.

The Lucentis are happy, for they have been making the most silvery-toned church bells in Italy for more than three centuries.

The interior of the bell foundry looks like an alchemist's laboratory. Those who hear the tones of the Lucenti bells aver it is. The Lucenti artisans have jealously guarded their secret of the perfect bell, a secret of harmonious symmetry of form and thickness which combine to produce the proper tone.

Bell-shaped clay forms twirl under the busy hands of the Lu-

centis who shape the future bell. A great oven, with 80 slits for melted copper and 20 for lead, belches raucously.

That is the bell shop of the Lucentis in 1947, hardly changed since the day Ambrogio Lucenti made a bell for the Church of Regina Pacis in Fiuggi in 1630 and set the family up in a business it cherishes today.

Francesco Lucenti is the present day head of the family. He recalled the family's history, which successfully withstood the threat of another great bell maker a century and a half ago. It was the Blasi family which made the renowned "Campononcino" (The Little Bell) and the "Campanone" (The Huge Bell)—weighing nine and a half tons—for St. Peter's. But the family descendants did not carry on the tradition.

"We have always had good relations with the Vatican," Lucenti

"But there was a time under Pius IX just about a hundred years ago when we had some trouble. Giovanni Lucenti was making the bells then. He was a Liberal and joined the secret society which plotted to overthrow the conservative powers and unify Italy.

"At first, the Pope closed an eye to Giovanni's doings, because despite his radical tendencies, Giovanni was an excellent bell maker. He created the great bell of Santa Maria Maggiore, a beautiful 40 quintals (four tons) of perfect tone. But when he continued with his republican ideas, Pius IX sent him into exile and he died a refugee in Leghorn."

Francesco said that since then the Lucentis have never had political arguments.

"The art of making perfect bells has been perpetuated in our family," he proudly noted, "just like the names of Girolamo, Eugenio, Luigi and Francesco are handed down from generation to generation. Now, one can be as liberal as he wants to—but bells are always bells. Our greatest customer in this business is still the church."

The Lucentis have an honorable tradition to justify today. The Germans took some 18,000 bells from Italian churches during the war and melted them down for scrap. Business will be rushing for some time.

"We will make them again, always perfect," Francesco said. "When they ring, we sing with our bells."

# Left Bank Gaiety Thing of Past In Post-War Paris

PARIS (UP)—In the opinion of experts, Montparnasse, center of pre-war Left Bank gaiety, is dead.

Worse than that, according to artists and writers, it has become "bourgeois." The once-Bohemian district on the edge of the Latin quarter is considered stuffy today.

The Dome, the Rotonde and other famous cafes have changed character. Stolid, middle-aged Parisians and family groups from the country now dine where Ernest Hemingway and bearded painters held court. The one-time crowded terrace of the "Dome" is often empty because of the soaring prices of drinks.

Post-World War II intellectuals have filtered down from Montparnasse and established themselves in a new quarter. The area, nearer the Seine than Montparnasse, is dominated by the church of St. Germain des Pres, with its medieval tower.

Picasso's home and the studio of Raymond Duncan are in the neighborhood. The American writers, Tennessee Williams and Carson McCullers, live nearby.

The pre-war tradition of long hair, beards and corduroy jackets lingers on in the new area, and

"American" is heard as often as French. Conservative residents complain about the influx of followers of two new philosophic and aesthetic movements—existentialism and expressionism.

The expressionists also are talking of setting up a night club and are designing a costume supposed to interpret their doctrine of freedom and lack of inhibitions.

The residents of St. Germain are not impressed and say that the groups make too much noise.

Tourists are having a hard time keeping up with which particular cafe is in vogue among the new Bohemians. Before the war Les Deux Magots was popular with writers and artists.

Then they flocked next door to the Flore, and Les Deux Magots became "bourgeois." Many intellectuals are now moving to a tiny bar a few doors away, the Montana. Everybody knows everybody else and it is more like a club than a public bar.

Tourists flock to one cafe and gape at other tourists, unaware that "the group" has since moved elsewhere.

**Swimming Icy River Merely \$10 Idea**
