astland Auto Parts Contracts Furnish 100 Per Month; Means \$100,000 in New Business

By the terms of a contract just consumated between Eastland Auto Parts of Eastland, of which Milton J. Gaines is owner and opeator, and a nationally known concern, Gaines contracts to furnish 100 or more rebuilt automobile engines per month for twelve months. These engines, which, it is understood, are to be placed in West Texas, will be completely rebuilt with all new parts and will be given the same service guarantee as that given new factory built motors.

The contract, Gaines said, would run about \$100,000 and would require his adding at least three additional men to his force, which at present numbers six men.

Gaines, who came to Eastland from Wichita Falls about ten years ago, has been engaged in the auto parts business for a long time. He served 27 months with the government during World War II as automotive instructor, training 6,000 men. His plant at Eastland, which is housed in a new tile and concrete building 72x100 feet and located at South Seaman and East Olive streets, is considered one of the best and most complete of its kind between Fort Worth and El Paso.

In the past 18 months Gaines has rebuilt and placed in this area more than 1000 motors.




