Wallace Makes Bid For Support In Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS — Henry A. Wallace makes his first direct appeal today to the farmers and laborers of Minnesota for support of his Third Party candidacy for president. Wallace will spend three days in Minnesota making speeches and conferring with farm and labor groups. Wallace still has a chance to win the endorsement of the coalition of Democrats and the once-powerful farm-labor party in Minnesota. Former Gov. Elmer Benson is national chairman of the Wallace party and he may be able to swing the D-F-L to Wallace despite a major setback last week. If Wallace succeeded in winning the support of the party, President Truman would be forced to run as an independent in Minnesota.

Former County Newspaper Man Is A Visitor

W. E. Reid of Dallas and a former Eastland county newspaper man, was an Eastland visitor today. Reid, a longtime friend of Frank A. Jones of the Eastland Telegram, has over a period of years owned and operated newspapers at Carbon, Knox City, Spur, Ladonia and other Texas points. He was employed for 16 years on the Colorado City paper. He is now a traveling representative of the Western Newspaper Union of Dallas.

MAN KILLED, WOMAN HURT IN TORNADO NEAR RANGER

Chris Pace, about 47, who resided at Oakley near Frankell and about 11 miles north of Ranger, was killed last night about 10:30 o'clock when the home in which he resided with his mother, Mrs. Susie Pace, was destroyed by a tornado. Mrs. Pace is in the West Texas Hospital in Ranger where it was reported that she is in a critical condition. It was stated that she has a punctured lung and broken collar bone. The 82 year old woman is also suffering from shock and exposure, having lain out in the open from the time of the storm until sun-up this morning when she was discovered by neighbors.

Wind and Rain Does Damages In Eastland Area

Wind and rain caused an interruption in electric power services in Eastland and surrounding areas for an hour or more last night. At Gorman a two-room house, located between the Dallas Jobe home and downtown Gorman, was blown across a Texas Electric power line. Rain fall at Eastland was .85 of an inch. W. B. Picken, Eastland Assistant manager for the Electric company told the Eastland Telegram this morning that the company's crews were out most of last night. They received various reports of trouble along their lines, one to the effect that Morton Valley had been blown away. A trouble shooting crew was sent to Morton Valley. Crews were also sent to other points upon failure to get reports from them in due time. Reports in Eastland this morning was that considerable damage was done at Breckenridge. On the O. L. Duckett farm west of Eastland on the Eastland-Cisco Highway, or rather just off the highway, wind blew the garage roof in, damaging Duckett's car. Roofs from some cow sheds and chicken houses on Duckett's place were also blown off. At the consolidated booster plant, not far from the Duckett farm, a 75 barrel capacity oil tank was lifted from its foundation and blown for some distance. At Morton Valley, a filling station was demolished.

Wanted Man Freed CHICAGO (UP)—Paul Dillon, St. Louis attorney and politician sought for weeks for questioning in a congressional investigation of federal paroles granted four Capone hoodlums, has been located in Massachusetts, federal officials disclosed today.

Mr. Pace was blown from the house, a mattress blown on top of him, the mother on top of the mattress and a wall of the house on top of them. A house across the road was not damaged, but the roof of a barn on that farm was blown off and a chicken house demolished, according to reports. Mrs. R. W. Langford of the Oakley community is in Ranger with her mother.

Wide Area Swept By Tornadoic Winds Last Night

Tornadoic winds ripped into scattered communities throughout North Central and West-Central Texas last night and early today, inflicting thousands of dollars in property damage and causing at least one death. A Denton county woman, Mrs. Sam Patterson of the Bartonville community, was burned to death when her wind-wrecked home caught fire before she could be extricated from the debris. The high winds also lashed at Comanche, Itasca, Brownwood, Ballinger and the Woodson community of Throckmorton county, all of which reported heavy property damage but no fatalities. Meanwhile, the trinity river continued to spread over lowlands along its northern branches and closed the highway between Dallas and Grapevine. At Woodson, probably the worst hit of the stricken areas, some 25 homes were wrecked and two persons injured. Damage was unofficially estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000 there.

Last rites for Mrs. Nancy E. Weaver of Ranger were conducted Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Killingsworth Chapel in Ranger with Dr. Claud P. Jones, pastor of the First Methodist church and Rev. David C. Ham, pastor of the First Baptist church officiating. Interment was in Evergreen cemetery. Mrs. Weaver who was born in Tennessee on Jan. 19, 1862, died at her home in Ranger Thursday noon. She had been in ill health for a long while. She had resided here 22 years and was a member of the Methodist church. Survivors are three sons, Pickens Weaver, Jess Weaver and J. W. Weaver, all of Ranger. Ten grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren and three great great grandchildren also survive. Pallbearers were T. C. Weaver, Everett Weaver, Dale Weaver, Ellis Weaver, all of Ranger and all grandsons, J. D. Weaver of Fort Worth, a grandson, and J. C. Weaver, a great grandson, of Big Spring.

Police School Closes; Nine Get Certificates

The Police School taught in Eastland by Wallace Beasley under the direction of the Texas A & M College in co-operation with the Texas State Board of Vocational Education, closed Thursday. It was a three week school, but due to a death in Mr. Wallace's family, the classes were carried over into the fourth week. The school was for all Eastland County peace officers and was similar to those being taught throughout the State. Joseph C. Marsh Killed In Cisco Auto Accident

Joseph C. Marsh, 78, was fatally injured last night in Cisco when struck by an automobile as he was crossing the street at the intersection of 14th street and Avenue D. The accident occurred during the rain and wind storm about 9:15 p.m. Philip Zeissel, patrolman for Texas Department of Public Safety who investigated the accident, stated that the car that struck Marsh was being driven by Brady T. Leverage, who, accompanied by his wife, was driving to his home. Leverage, Zeissel said, was not making very great speed and apparently the accident was unavoidable. Leverage stopped, called a taxi and had the injured man rushed to a hospital. Marsh died upon arrival at the hospital.

Senate Group For Anti-Poll Tax Legislation

WASHINGTON (UP)—A Senate rules subcommittee voted 3 to 0 today to approve an anti-poll tax bill. The proposed legislation is one of the main planks in President Truman's civil rights program which has resulted in the revolt of Southern Democrats. The House approved the anti-poll tax bill last session. Subcommittee Chairman William E. Jenner, R., Ind., said he is confident the full rules committee also will approve the measure. But if the bill gets on the Senate floor it would be certain to run into a southern filibuster.

Wage Increase Accepted NEW YORK (UP)—A 6.3 per cent cost of living wage increase for the 90,000 members of the National Maritime Union (CIO) was agreed upon today by the union and 40 Atlantic and Gulf coast ship operators.

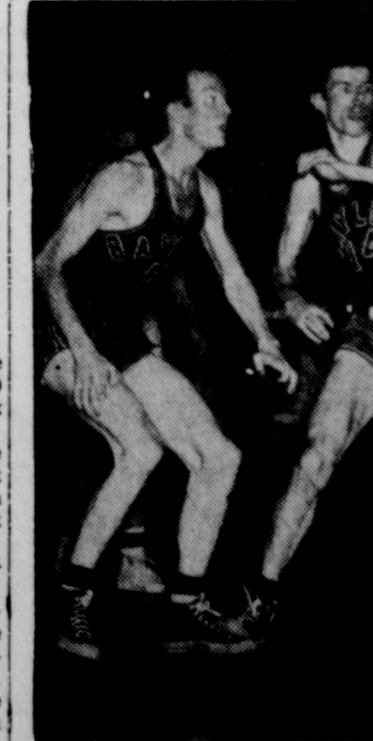

New Well Near Cisco Flowing 100 Barrels

Lone Star Gas Company's J. G. Boggs No. 1, one-half mile north of Cisco was turned into flow tanks first of the week estimated good for at least 100 barrels high gravity oil daily after perforating pipe and acidizing with 2,500 gallons in the upper Mississippi. Production is from 3922 to 3940 feet. The boggs, located 2,000 feet west of the same company's Kincaid—like the Boggs, deepened from the Lake sand to the Mississippi and rated one of the best wells to be brought in north of the Hickox City of Cisco No. 1, a gasser scheduled for deepening, and a west offset of the Hickox Kleiner No. 1, which has rated several hundred barrels daily potential from the Ranger after being deepened. The Boggs is 216 feet from the the lake sand, in which it had south and east lines of the Boggs lease in section 83, Block 4, H&T C survey. Elevation is 1547 feet. The Boggs was deepened from long been a gasser, to a total depth of 4157 feet, bottomed in the lower Mississippi. After testing the lower zone of the Mississippi, which responded for about eight barrels a day, operators came back up hole to the upper zone, perforated 3922 to 3940 and ran 2,000 gallons of acid. Swabbing and cleaning was started Monday and around noon Tuesday practically all water had been swabbed off and the flow was turned into tanks. Gravity of the oil is around 42 degrees. Good showings for future production were found in both the Ranger and Duffer zones. Two and a half miles west of the Boggs and Kleiner wells, the Lone Star Ward No. 6, new operation, was making drill stem tests of what was reported to be perhaps the biggest Ellenburger section cut in this area. Six tests had been run to Tuesday, the last between 3830 and 3859. The well was showing very favorable. Gravity of the oil is 42 degrees or better. Total depth is 3936 feet.

Work Due To Start Soon On Deep Cut For New Highway

Work is expected to start momentarily on a new stretch of U. S. Highway 80 between Baird and Mexia Creek, a few miles east of Baird, for which contract was recently let to Harry Campbell for \$485,000. The highway will require unusual excavation east of here. A cut 58 feet deep will be made through the high hill east of town where the highway width will be 720 feet. Much of the cost of the new construction will be on this steep hill. At present U. S. 80 makes a southward swing in east Baird to the T&P high bridge, then gradually ascends on a long curve the hill on the other side. The contract for completion of U. S. 80 from Mexia Creek to the Eastland county boundary is being delayed due to removal of a large brick building at putnam. HARRIMAN SAYS REDS GREATER THREAT THAN ADOLPH HITLER

WASHINGTON—Secretary of Commerce W. Averell Harriman has warned Congress that Russian aggression is "a greater menace than Hitler," it was revealed today. The disclosure was made by the House appropriations committee as it voted \$503,420,263 to run the state, commerce and justice departments and the federal courts during the fiscal year starting July 1. This is a net cut of \$35,417,168 from President Truman's budget requests. The committee also demanded that the justice department step up its anti-monopoly work, particularly in the fields of food, clothing and housing. It gave the department additional money for the work. Harriman former ambassador to Moscow, said at a committee hearing that unless Communism is stopped in Western Europe, "we will face a situation that we cannot deal with, and the balance of power, which now is predominately in our favor, will be against us." He was one of several top American officials, including secretary of State George C. Marshall, who criticized Soviet policy during the hearings. Their testimony was released only today. Marshall said the United States is "basically friendly" to the Russian people. But he said Soviet officials are "very slow to agree, rather difficult in negotiation, and I would say generally suspicious of our motives." Harriman's statement was sparked by an observation by Rep. Cliff Cleveland, R. O. The congressman said he is not much worried over Red expansion in Europe as he is over the chance the United States will go bankrupt.

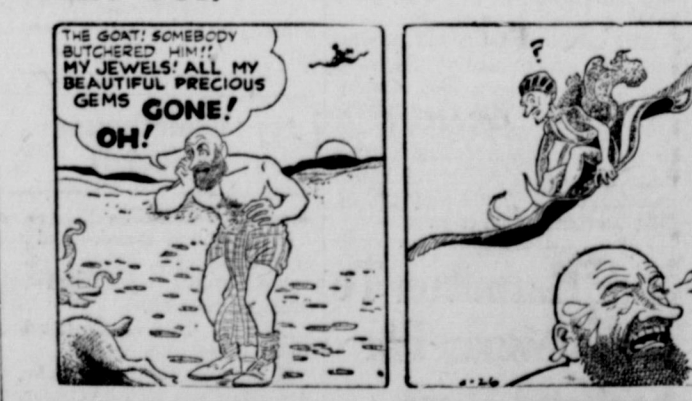

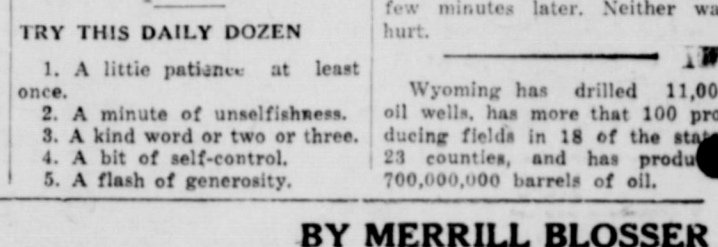

War Victim's Coins May Be Key To Happiness

NEW YORK (UP)— Abraham Reicher hopes that the coins he has gathered during years of wandering through Europe will pay his family's passage from Belgium to the United States.
Reicher, a war refugee now in this country, has collected thousands of coins. They range from a Julius Caesar "denarius" to a Roosevelt dime. Many were given to him as a boy by customers in his father's restaurant in Antwerp.

Reicher says his family settled in Belgium after fleeing Russia during the pogrom of 1905. After crossing the border by bribing Tsarist guards, the Reichers went to Vienna and then to Brussels. Star Found Burning Without Any Hydrogen

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Astronomers known only 1 star among the countless millions in the universe which has no hydrogen—as the fuel which keep astral bodies "burning."

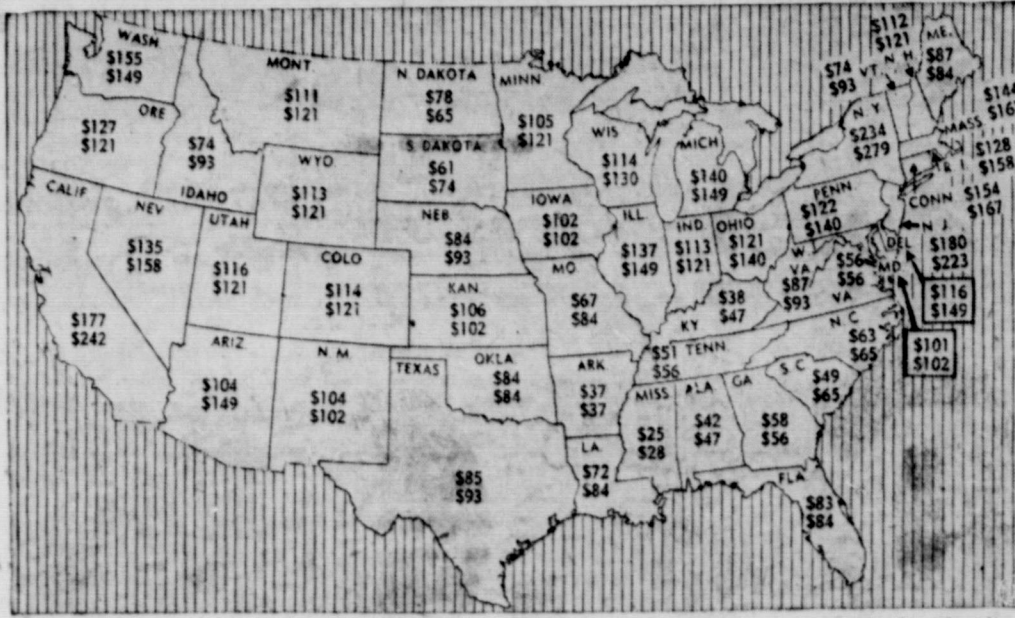
The star is known as HD 124448 according to Dr. Fred M. Popper, assistant professor of astronomy at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Too faint to be seen with the naked eye, the star has been photographed several times in the last 40 years and the plates never have revealed the presence of a hydrogen line.

"The star is unique," Popper said, "because hydrogen is the most abundant chemical element in the stars and the universe as a whole."

Popper, theorized HD 124448 shows no hydrogen because it was formed at a time and place when the supply of hydrogen. He said it also was possible the apparent lack was only a surface condition and hydrogen may be present inside the star.

America's Educational Expenses Still Not Enough



Here is a state-by-state breakdown of what America spends, per pupil per year, on educating its children. The top figure for each state indicates the 1946-47 expense. Below that is the figure which, according to the National Education Association, must be reached, because of the dollar's lessened purchasing power, before educational standards can regain prewar levels. The national average was \$99 per pupil in 1946-47, with \$112 the recommended outlay for today.

U. S. Plans Fish Census Off Of The East Coast

BOSTON (UP)—Fish swimming in North Atlantic waters are about to be tabbed by Uncle Sam. The government is going to take a census of them for the first time.

There will be no fibbing about ages or other matters when the U. S. Fish and Wild Life Service starts its census about April 1.

"We'll count the fish by age groups," said Capt. Marvin G. Rice of Gloucester, skipper of the census-taking ship Albatross. "We have a positive means of ascertaining the age by microscopic projection of fish scales."

"This will tell us the age of the fish in much the same way as ridges determine the age of a tree."

The Albatross, with Rice and a 22-man crew, will take several years to complete a "fairly accurate census" of haddock, cod, flounder, halibut and other food fish on Georges Bank, the Gulf of Maine and off Nova Scotia.

Federal authorities, faced with the loss of haddock and other fish from the great feeding grounds of the North Atlantic, hope to obtain statistics that will aid in solving the mystery of disappearing fish.

A large otter type trawl will accompany the Albatross and will be used to catch the fish.

Skipper Rice hopes to obtain the secretary of interior's permission "to sell the fish we catch in Bos-

Army Uses Reducing Diet To Cure Sore Feet

FORT LEWIS, Wash (UP)—The overweight soldiers at this Army base are going in for the "new look" by subscribing to a diet consisting principally of lettuce, salads and leafy vegetables.

The Army explained the mass reducing followed discovery that of the 25 men who reported on sick call with sore feet, each was

about 50 pounds overweight. Army officials said the reducing plan was guaranteed to take off from four to six pounds a week.

Jones never once has been tardy or absent. Now 61 years old, he is the only one of the school's first instructors still teaching there.

Six planes dropped more than two tons of corn into dense cover. Operating as the Aero-Feed Club, the group carried on its errands of mercy even to the risk of landing on fields covered with nearly a half foot of snow.

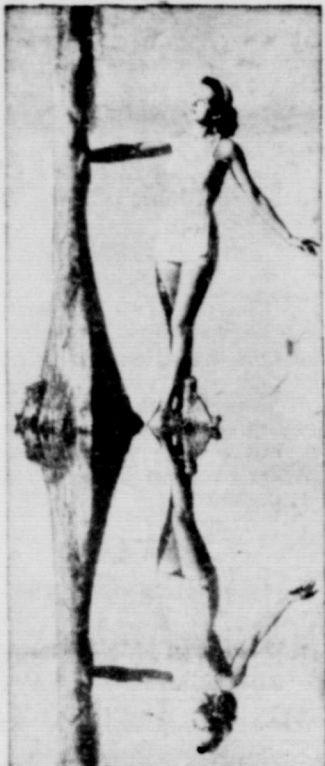

While the Army gave no exact details, informed quarters said 12 St. Louis employees have been fired and that 26 other suspected cases there have been turned over to the FBI for further study.

One person close to the situation said the St. Louis center had become a "beehive" of subversive activity through Communist infiltration. He said the subversives were engaged in destroying records of Communists and fellow
