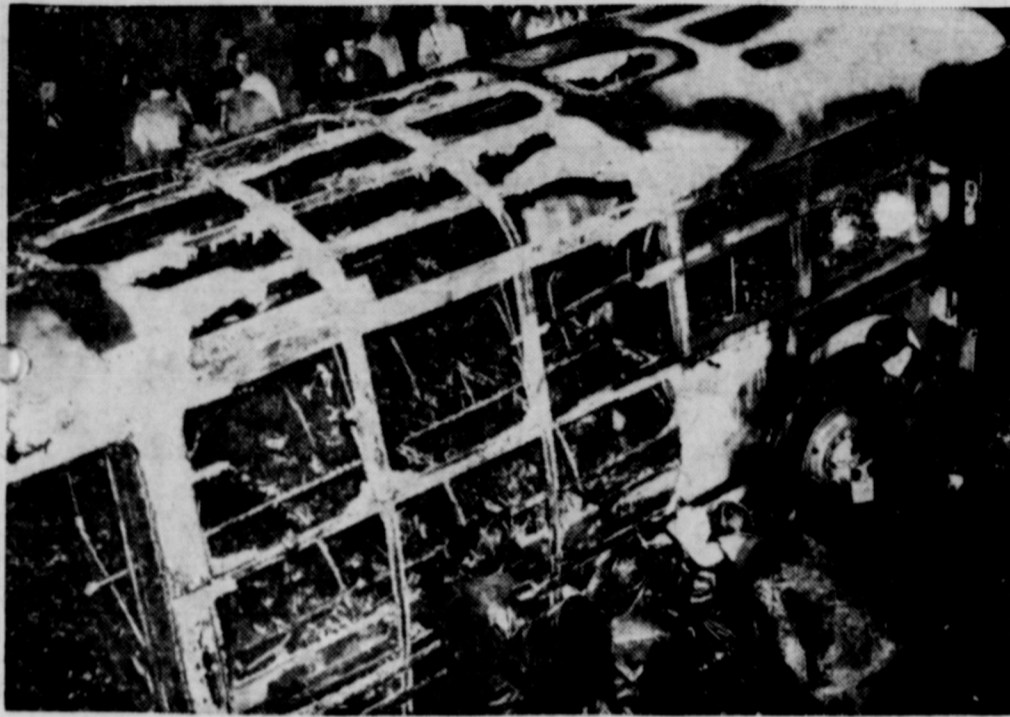

NEW YORK, April 29 (UP)—The 32-day-old strike against the New York Stock Exchange ended today when members of the United Financial Employees, AFL, voted to work.

The decision was made at a membership meeting held early this morning at the request of Mayor William O'Dwyer who asked the strikers to call off the walkout.

The strikers originally had asked for wage increases of from \$9 to \$15 a week, but accepted the stock exchange offer of \$3 to \$5.

Believe Senate To Concur In Oleo Tax Stand

WASHINGTON, April 29 (UP)—Two southern senators predicted today that the Senate will join the House in passing a bill to repeal federal taxes on oleomargarine.

Sen. Johnson, D., S. C., said he believes the repeal bloc will win by "several votes". His South Carolina colleague, Sen. Maybank, said "it looks like we are going to win after this long, long fight."

The measure won House approval late yesterday 250 to 106. The vote was hailed by repeal advocates as "the first step in the emancipation of housewives from their mixing bowls."

Says Enemy Could Take Bases In Alaska, Azores

WASHINGTON, April 29 (UP)—Army Secretary Kenneth Royall said today "an enemy nation" under present conditions could "seize bases in Alaska or the Azores" for an attack on the United States.

"We must not stand idly by and let them do it," he told the Senate appropriations committee. "They do not need a fleet to take bases in Greenland, Iceland or the Azores."

Royall did not name the potential "enemy nation."

Royall said this country cannot rely on "aircraft alone" for defense against a sudden air attack, but "must deny the enemy bases from which to attack."

"The only way to do that is to hold bases in Newfoundland, Alaska, Greenland, Iceland and the Azores," he said. "And the only way to hold those bases is with ground forces."

Believes Strike Of Rail Workers To Be Settled

WASHINGTON, April 29 (UP)—President Truman today made a qualified forecast that the railroad strike scheduled for May 11 will be settled before the deadline.

Mr. Truman told his news conference that the federal mediators are working heroically to get the strike settled.

He added his belief that they will succeed. As an afterthought, he said at least he hoped so.

Arabs Reject UN Proposal

LAKE SUCCESS, April 29 (UP)—The Arab higher committee today rejected the idea of a United Nations volunteer police force for Jerusalem but said that Arabs would "not fire on them" if they were sent to the Holy City.

The Jewish agency endorsed the proposal, but warned that it would require as many as several thousand armed men to protect all Jerusalem and its holy places.

W. S. (Butch) Griffin, about 60, died this morning about 9:00 o'clock from injuries sustained a short time earlier when a Dodge pick-up he was driving was struck by a westbound Texas & Pacific freight train at a railroad crossing just west of the railroad's depot in Eastland. He passed away at the Eastland hospital where he was rushed by Hamner Undertaking Company immediately following the accident. The ambulance was called by Ira Hanna. The truck was virtually demolished.

Griffin, it is understood, had some horses staked on some lots across the railroad in the north part of town and was on his way to look after them when the accident occurred. It was his custom to make the trip each morning.

Funeral arrangements were pending at noon today. The body is at Hamners Undertaking establishment.

The deceased is survived by his widow, who is the former Maliqua Kilborn, Harvey Griffin, a son by a former marriage; his mother, who resides at Robstown, and a stepson, Gordon Taylor of Eastland.

A resident of Eastland for the past 28 years, Griffin had been employed in various lines of work ranging from farming to trucking. He kept a number of horses most of the time.

Senate Group Ready To OK Civil Rights

WASHINGTON, April 29 (UP)—A second Senate committee was ready today to approve civil rights legislation over the objections of Southern Democrats.

On the heels of rules committee approval of anti-poll tax bill, the Senate judiciary committee on an called into session to vote on an anti-lynching bill. Sen. Ferguson R., Mich., chairman of the subcommittee which approved the bill by a 2 to 1 vote, said he expected the full committee to okay it this morning.

Both proposals were included in President Truman's civil rights program which set of a southern revolt in the Democratic party. Outvoted in committees by a coalition of Republicans and northern Democrats, the southerners were depending on filibuster tactics to block the measures when they reach the Senate floor.

MOVING IN ON THREE SIDES OF PORT CITY

JERUSALEM, April 29 (UP)—British light artillery and mortars shelled Jews attacking Jaffa today, but Haganah and Irgun E'vai Leumi forces returned the fire and were advancing.

After a nightlong lull the fierce fighting of the last five days was resumed after dawn. Jews advanced from positions on three sides of the big Arab port city, from which thousands of civilians were fleeing by sea.

British two-pounders and mortars laid down heavy fire into the Irgun Zvai Leumi positions in the Meshiya quarter at the northeast of the city. Irgunists replied with mortar fire and heavy firing from machine guns and other automatic weapons.

Haganah forces also were reported advancing from their positions to the south of Jaffa.

Royal Air Force spitfire fighters, five of which late yesterday attacked Irgun positions with rockets, circled over the Jewish position again today, but did not attack. British authorities said they were for "moral effect."

In the harbor of the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv, just north of Jaffa, two British destroyers stood by as ships were unloaded, making plain that the British blockade against illegal Jewish immigrant and arm imports still exists.

Both Arab and Jews received with joy the news of the United Nations agreement for a truce for the old walled city of Jerusalem. It halted a mass evacuation of Arabs from the Holy City.

MEN OVER 40 CLUB FINDS MANY JOBS FOR OLDSTERS

CHICAGO (UP) "Help Wanted" advertisement don't say so but many jobs are available to men over 40 years of age.

The Men Over Forty Club in Chicago is begging for more members. Its president, T. H. Gilmour, says job offers from employers far outnumber the club membership. That, he says, indicates industry's confidence of continued prosperity.

But the club is choosy about whom it takes into the fold. Only one applicant out of every 10 meets the requirements.

To join the organization a man must have passed 40 and be in good health. He must have earned more than \$4,000 a year (based on the pre-war wage scale) in executive or specialized work.

The club thoroughly checks each applicant's background as to character and ability. One who lost his job through his own negligence never is accepted.

Membership itself is short-lived. Some men are members for one or two days and then are employed. For others, it might take a week or more. They then become alumni.

Every man works regular hours without pay while a member. His work consist of "selling the club" to employers. But the member himself does not apply for any job. Employers submit available positions to the club.

"Our biggest trouble is in lining up the right man with the right job," Gilmour said. "We never try to fill a round hole with a square peg. That would ruin the faith employers now ave in the club."

Experience and salary of each job must fit the man's background. Most members have earned between \$5,000 and \$10,000 Gilmour said, and most get jobs paying about \$6,000. There have been members, however, who made more than twice that amount. The club has been asked to fill positions paying \$40,000.

The jobs mainly are for execu-

tives in industrial and professional fields: salesmen, purchasing agents, accountants, engineers production and advertising men.

"A man over 40 can't do the manual labor he could twenty or even ten years before," Gilmour explained. "But we need men who have good heads and mature judgment. Many in that classification lost their jobs through politics or mergers, or when their firms folded or moved out of town. They are the ones we want to help."

Women, Gilmour said, interfere with the club's work because they don't understand it. Women don't see why their husbands must work at selling the club. Women figure that their men might just as well apply for the jobs themselves.

"Women don't realize what a man 40 years old is bucking. They fail to see what the club worker gets to the presidents of companies and others who hire the high-calibered man. We don't have to fight to get past the receptionist and just hope for a chance to see the personnel manager," he said.

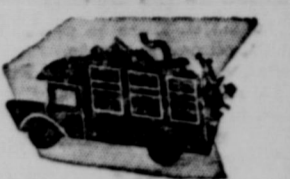

End Of World Not Too Far Off Experts Wonder

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—Scientists at the Fels Planetarium of the Franklin Institute are illustrating ways by which the world might come to an end.

The astronomers show some of the violent possibilities, such as an explosion of the sun which would burn all vestiges of life on earth. Great volcanic eruptions or by sweeping tidal waves.

The scientists coolly admit that the end of the world, due to some unforeseen cataclysm, might happen at any moment.

"Our earth," they say, "is delicately balanced between the too hot and the too cold, the too dry and too wet, for life of the kind we know."

If something should happen to upset the existing conditions most of the higher life on earth would come to an end, they add.

The astronomers point out that other suns have suddenly burst into greatly intensified heat, and they assert it is not impossible that the earth's sun might also do it some day.

They also see no reason for ruling out the possibility of another

Ice Age caused by a great volcanic eruption, because in the history of the world it has happened five times.

They also show how the moon might cause great tidal waves to sweep the continents from shore to shore for hundreds of years—with the gravitational pull of the moon opening up gaping rifts in the earth's crust, followed by gigantic explosions as the sea invades the pools of molten lava.

The astronomers hope most of the possibilities for an end of the world are remote. But they insist that it is possible at any moment for a body as large as the earth or larger to hurtle through space and shatter our planet to bits.

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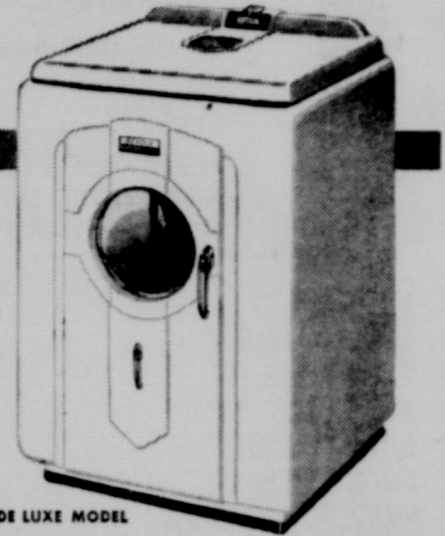
