## Mavericks Play Strawn Here At 3 Sunday P. M.

The Eastland Mavericks will meet the Strawn Flyers on Firemen's Field here Sunday afternoon determined to win the game after having been on the losing side of all the games so far.

The Eastland club is really a good baseball club; their weakness has been largely in their catching and pitching staffs through circumstances over which they have had no control. It has so happened that arrangements made for pitchers for former games failed to materialize at the last moment.

The management hopes, however, that this will not happen again.

Bob McChesney of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, has been lined up to pitch the game Sunday for Eastland against Strawn. McChesney has an enviable pitching record, having pitched a no run, no hit game for H. S. U. against McMurray and also has a splendid record in other games.

James Jennings, signed by Eastland early in the season, pitched one game and has been out with a sore arm since. He will be here Sunday, however.

H. Farmer, who was listed as a catcher for the Mavericks, but who was ruled ineligible to play elsewhere if he played, has resigned his position with the Heart-O-Texas league and will play the balance of the season with Eastland. He will be here Sunday.

The management of the Eastland club is thankful for the loyal support of the fans at the Eastland games and want it understood that every effort is being made to change the club's losses to wins.

Rev. Lance Webb, now pastor at University Park Methodist Church in Dallas, will receive the honorary Doctor of Divinity conferred by his Alma Mater, McMurry College at Abilene, on the occasion of its 25th annual Commencement, May 25th. In addition he will deliver the Baccalaureate Sermon. Rev. Webb is one of the first alumni to receive the D.D. Degree. While in McMurry, he was assistant director of the McMurray Indian Band and president of the Ministerial Association for one year. He was graduated from McMurry with a B. A. Degree in 1931 as the highest ranking honor student.

He received his Master of Arts Degree from S. M. U. in 1933 and his B. D. in 1934. While in S. M. U. at Perkins School of Theology, he held the position in 1933-34 as president of the Students Association.

He has taken post graduate study for two summers in Union Theological Seminary of Columbia University.

He was pastor of Pampa for three years, at McMurry College one year, Snamrock for four years and at Eastland for one year. At University Park Methodist Church in Dallas for the past seven years, he has received 1700 members.

## Packinghouse Workers To Vote On Strike Action

CHICAGO, May 20 (UP)—Striking CIO United Packinghouse Workers will vote tonight on whether to end the 66-day walkout against the nation's meat packing plants.

Union officials announced yesterday that the 20,000 strikers here would be the first to vote on a settlement offer and that other locals throughout the nation would vote later.

Even though the walkout reportedly was near its end, violence flared at Waterloo, Ia. Approximately 2,000 persons, mostly strikers, rioted for four hours yesterday at the Rath Packing Company plant. One man was killed and a spectator was injured.

The riot broke up after Gov. Robert D. Blue called out the Iowa National Guard and put the troops at the disposal of local authorities.

A decision to halt the prolonged strike, which flared to violence in four states, would mean complete capitulation for the union on the issue of wages.

## Old Rip, The Frog, Entered In Derby At Coalinga, Calif.

A letter from the officials of the Coalinga Horn and Derby, an annual affair held at Coalinga, California, to the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, stated that "Old Rip" the Eastland frog sent there to be entered in the annual races, had arrived in good condition and would be kept in that condition until the day of the races which is Saturday, May 22.

With the letter to the Chamber of Commerce was a photograph showing the Derby officials greeting the frog at the airport. Among the welcoming group was R. S. Bailey, formerly of Eastland, who stated that he was personally looking after "Old Rip."

Funeral services will be conducted today (Thursday) in Fort Worth for Mrs. Jennie C. Scheuber, widow of the late W. F. Scheuber, who died Wednesday morning at the home of her son, W. F. Scheuber, Jr., in Fort Worth. The body will be carried to Marshall where she lived most of her life for interment.

She was a sister-in-law of Mrs. W. A. Cathey of South Daugherty St. Eastland. The late Mr. Scheuber was a brother of Mrs. Cathey. She had been in ill health since January but was stricken early Wednesday and died suddenly. Mrs. Cathey was unable to attend the service.

MONTEREY, Cal. (UP)—Members of the destroyer U.S.S. Thompson anchored in Monterey harbor heard sounds of a joyous party aboard the nearby purse seiner Petrina F. Then they noticed the fishing vessel was adrift.

A boarding party was sent out from the Navy ship to remove the revelers from the Petrina F. But they overlooked the seiner's engineer, doing his celebrating below.

Soon the Petrina F. got under way and began an erratic course around the harbor. The Coast Guard's 83-foot rescue craft got a line aboard to keep the seiner off the beach and then sent the bottle happy engineer ashore.

## Says China Will Be Easy On Japs

NANKING, May 20 (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek said today in his inaugural address as president that China would not make excessive demands against Japan when the peace treaty is signed.

"Within the limits set by Allied powers," he said, "Japan should be allowed to rebuild her economy so her common people may be assured of a means of livelihood."

## Says Russia's War Of Nerves Is Threatening

SCARBROUGH, England, May 20, (UP)—British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin said today that the greatest danger of another world war lies in Russia's present war of nerves.

He stated flatly however, that he was against "any step to carry on aggressive war against Soviet Russia or any other country."

Making a broad review of British foreign policy before the 47th annual Labor Party conference, Bevin also said—

1. Britain was facing the necessity of asking the United States for another loan when Secretary of State George C. Marshall came to his rescue with the European Recovery Plan.

2. Britain is not prepared to sit idly by and see the Communists seize power in Western Europe.
3. Western European union defense talks are not directed against anyone in particular but are designed to give the government the means of life or death for their people in event of attack and enable them to negotiate with others in the proper manner.

4. The council of foreign ministers should agree to convene an immediate peace conference among the 15 or 16 nations which participated in the war against Japan.
5. One lift of a finger "from the place you know" would halt the civil war in Greece.

"I am against any active steps to carry out aggressive war against Russia," Bevin told delegates to the conference.

"I don't believe this war is inevitable. But the danger of war being likely to arise in the hands of Russia. It is a war of nerves Russia is conducting."

## Jews Losing Ground To Arabs In Jerusalem

TEL AVIV May 20 (UP)—Jewish forces defending Jerusalem are under continuing fierce attack by Arab legionnaires and have lost some ground in the city, official reports to this capital of Israel indicated today.

Jewish sources said guns of the Trans-Jordan legion shelled the Hadassah Hospital and the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus, in the northern suburbs of the Holy City, all night.

Arabs were pressing a fierce attack from the north into the city itself, the reports indicated, and bitter fighting in the old walled city was damaging and destroying the most sacred shrines of Christendom.

There was no prospect of Jewish reinforcements reaching Jerusalem through the Arab troops ringing the city.

Reports from Arab front positions, relayed through Amman, held that capture of Jerusalem was a matter of hours, or at most a day or two. Trans Jordan troops of King Abdullah were reported to control the Sheikh Jarrah quarter in the northern part of the city and to be near complete possession of the old walled city.

## Four Injured In Recent Atomic Tests On Atoll

LOS ALAMOS, May 20, (UP)—Four scientists were hospitalized here with limited radiation injuries, suffered while participating in the recent atomic tests at the Pacific atoll of Eniwetok, it was announced officially today. None was from the southwest.

Physicians said their general condition "is excellent." They said the victims show no evidence of generalized radiation injuries. The injuries were compared with soft X-rays which produce local damage to the skin.

## Senate May Delay Action On Red Curb Bill

WASHINGTON May 20 (UP)—Sen. Taft, R., O., doubted today that the Senate will act this year on the House-approved to slap stiff curbs on Communists in this country.

Taft, who is chairman of the powerful Senate Republican policy committee, said he is not satisfied with some provisions of the bill and that it probably will need a "lot" of study by the judiciary committee.

The Senate is faced with a logjam of higher priority bills and Taft held out little hope that it could find time to take up the Communist-control measure before adjournment, now tentatively set for late June.

## German Border Closed By U. S.

FRANKFURT, May 20 (UP)—The United States has closed the border between the American and Russian zones of Germany even to official Soviet missions, it was learned today.

Under an order issued by Maj. Gen. George P. Hays, deputy U.S. military governor for Germany, all Russians henceforth must enter the American zone through a U. S. check-point at Helmstedt, in the British zone.

## PRESIDENTS THREE BIG COMPANIES ARE NAMED

WASHINGTON, May 20 (UP)—John L. Lewis said today that three industrialists "have the power to determine whether we will have peace or war in the coal industry."

Lewis, who raised the threat of a new coal strike by walking out on a new soft coal wage contract conference yesterday, told reporters—

"There is still time to convene a constructive wage conference and negotiate a contract by July 1, if they want to."

The United Mine Workers chief named as the three men who hold the key to coal peace the following—

Benjamin Fairless, president of U. S. Steel Corp., George Humphrey, president of M. A. Hanna Co., and J. B. Francis, president of Island Creek Coal Co.

Lewis met reporters after a 20-minute session of his 200 man wage policy committee.

He sent committee members home and said they had no future meeting planned.

He said the union's executive board will meet tomorrow to discuss the situation.

## Stassen Claims Large Sum Spent For His Defeat

PORTLAND, Ore. May 20 (UP)—Harold E. Stassen charged on the eve of the Oregon primary today that an "eastern combination" of Taft-Dewey forces "had spent \$250,000 to beat him in the state."

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York promptly denied the charge. Both Dewey and Stassen were scheduled to return to Portland today for last minute speeches before Oregon voters cast ballots tomorrow for the states 12 delegates to the GOP national convention.

Stassen, speaking in Astoria last night, charged that Dewey and Sen. Robert A. Taft had combined forces in "an all-out attempt to demonstrate that our more liberal policies, our program for the west, our foreign policy do not have the support of people which the earlier primaries and the national polls showed that we have."







## Girl Gets Job Guiding Airplanes At New Yorks LaGuardia Field

NEW YORK (U.P.) — One of these days pilots who land and take off at LaGuardia Airport are going to get a jolt when they ask the control tower for clearance.

Instead of the usual man's voice coming over the radio into the cockpit, pilots will hear the pleasant but firm voice of an attractive brunette.

The newest addition to the staff of 34 control tower operators at La Guardia tower is a girl. She is 25-year-old Maxine Sheaffer, the first girl to be assigned to LaGuardia tower since the Civil

Aeronautics Administration took over control in October of 1946.

It is no small honor to be the only girl assistant controller in the tower of the world's busiest airport.

Studying Up

That is the job Maxine nopes to have as soon as she finishes what

is known as the familiarization period. Right now her eyes are taking a careful note of all approaches to the airport and she is memorizing all she has to know about the metropolitan area.

When she passes her junior rating, she will have as much right as the male assistant controllers to stand in the glass-enclosed tower and say into a microphone: "T-W-A cleared to runway 22." Or, "Colonial cleared to land."

Recently Maxine, or Max, as the boys in the tower call her, was transferred from the C-A-A tower in Pittsburgh.

She says, "I have always wanted LaGuardia but didn't think I had a chance. So I asked for Newark or Westchester. I was really surprised when I was offered La-

Guardia."

Likes Her Work

Aside from the fact that the Canton, Ohio girl likes New York she also likes to keep busy and she is determined to make good at LaGuardia. She says she will, "If I have to spend 24 hours a day here."

Maxine's love of aviation dates back to her first airplane ride when she was six years old. She decided then she would have a pilot's license by the time she was 21 and she did. She got it at McKinley airport in Canton.

That was during the war and soon after she was accepted by the W-A-S-P-S, the women's auxiliary group which ferried planes from factories to air fields. The day she was to leave home, she received a telegram telling her not to—the W-A-S-P-S had been disbanded.

Trained in Navy

That was in July, 1944. So she joined the W-A-V-E-S, hoping she would be assigned to tower work. After the routine training period at the Navy control tower school in Atlanta, Maxine was made a second class petty officer, specialist in control tower. She was assigned to Quonset Point, Rhode Island, where she worked for 17 months.

While there, Maxine handled an emergency so capably—with the help of a dispatch girl and an operations officer—that the three of them received a presidential commendation.

As for romance, right now Maxine is wedded to her job. She says she's not sure she will marry.

Besides, she has just broken an engagement. She gave the ring back the day she found out she was to be transferred to LaGuardia tower.

She says, "I just couldn't see getting married in June when I had an opportunity like LaGuardia."

His \$310,486 draft and another for \$34,407 in interest were so big he had to deposit them in St. Louis because the cashier of his bank here told him "We don't want that much money."






