## DEATH TOLL FOR WEEK-END NEARS 300

By United Press

The toll of perosns killed in ac cidents over the long Memorial Day week-end climbed steadily toward 300 today as millions of tourists folded their fishing rods and bathing suits for the trip home. Highways were crowded with cars this morning as many of the week end vacationers hit the roads early to avoid the big rush this af-

At least 19 Texans had died in week-end violence, but the state was enjoying a comparatively sane holiday on the highways.

A survey today showed that only three persons had died in highway mishaps. Drownings killed 5 persons, three of them in the Colorado River, near Austin.

Plane crashes cost four more lives, and a variety of other violence killed seven other persons.

Across the nation 281 persons had died due to accidents since Friday night. Of the total, 147 died on the highways, 38 drowned, and 96 died in airplane crashes, fires and miscellaneous mishaps.

California led the states with the greatest number of fatalities. The state had 25 violent deaths, field after Marberry had walked. 18 of them in traffic accidents. Illinois was second with a total of York State 18, Ohio 16, Pennsyl vania 15, West Virginia 15, Michigan 15 and Florida 11.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31, (UP) -The 33 fastest racing cars in the nation began a battle with death promptly at 10 A. M. today in the 32nd renewal of the annual Ind ianapolis speedway 500 nile Memorial Day auto race.

The three cars in the first tow of the 11 rows which started, driven by Rex Mays, Bill Holtand and Mauri Rose, were exactly even as they crossed the starting line, less than 100 yards behind the pacemaker car which led them around the track for the first turn of the track.

More than 150,000 spectators jammed the grounds surrounding the two and one half mile brick and asphalt track, attracted by the ever-present danger of accidents

Senate Judiciary Committee on the controversial Mundt-Nixon control bill, Robeson refused to tell Sen Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., whether he is "an American Comm

"That question is the very basis of the struggle for American civil liberties," Robeson said.

The Mundt-Nixon Bill, he said is "part of the hysteria to break the civil liberties" of the American people.

"Communism," Robeson said, "stand, as far as I can see, for the complete equality of Negro people in America."

The Iraq attack toward the coast launched late last week, was reported Saturday to have reached within six miles of the coast in the area of Natanya, Jewish diamond cutting center 17 miles north of Tel Aviv.

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
