WASHINGTON, June 8 (UP)-The Senate Finance Committee today voted 8 to 5 to extend the Reciprocal Trade Act for one year after knocking out of the House-approved bill a provision to give Congress a veto over any

new tariff cuts. Chairman Eugene D. 



Executive Body Picks Chairmen For Convention

Barkley Named Keynoter, Rayburn Commended

In recognition of their long and valiant service to the Demo-eratic Party and to the nation as a whole, Senator Alben W.
