WEATHERFORD, July 9 (UP) The search for the assassin ci legislative candidate, Eugene Mill er, continued today and authorities were convinced that the attorneypolitician was mistaken in his deathbed statement that "left wingers" shot him.

Sheriff John Young, working with Texas Rangers on the case, said the shooting of a 49-year-old Miller was "more likely the result of a debt or a grudge" than of the candidate's political activity.

PALESTINE **WAR FLARES ANEW TODAY**

CAIRO, July 9 (UP)- T h e Palestine war flared up anew today in outbursts of violent fighting all along the 200-mile broken battlefront when the United Nations truce expired.

The Arab and Jewish armies reported that they were locked in bitter struggles which boiled up on battlefields extending all the way from the Haifa area in the north of the Gaza region in the

Count Folke Bernadotte, the UN mediator, flew on an urgent eleventh hour mission from Rhodes to Amman to confer with King Abdullah. But there was no sign that he had reversed his abandonment of hope that the fighting could be

King Abdullah was appointed commander in chief of all the Arab armies fighting in Palestine and at once pooled the forces for an all-out offensive against the Jews, an Amman dispatch report-

The 26-day truce negotiated by Bernadotte ran out at midnight CST. The Arabs rejected urgent appeals by the mediator and the security council to prolong it, and the waiting armies went into action at the zero hour.

HOUSTON, July 9 (UP)- The Harris County grand jury today indicted 11 Houston meatpackers, ending five weeks of intermittent investigation in an alleged horsemeat scandal.

The indictments were based on 39 separate sales of horsemeat, 20 of them involving meat sold to schools and served to sudents in school cafeterias.

Conviction in each case could result in maximum penalties of \$500 fines for the sale of horse meat and a \$200 fine for each sale of treated meat.

Slum Clearance Found Declining

CHICAGO (UP)- Slum clearance in the United States is virtually at a standstill, a planning official reports.

Walter Blucher, director of the American Society of Planning Officials, blamed the shortage housing.

"Let us not kid ourselves about urban re-development," Blucher said. "We have legislation providing for slum clearance in 24 states but almost nothing has been done

Public housing, financed by cities, states and the federal government, must accompany any reconstruction done by private enterprise, Blucher said.

"The hard fact is," Blucher said, "that many of the laws contemplate rebuilding of blighted areas and that there are no housing facilities available for those who will be displaced from the slums and blighted areas.'


