# Possibility Of Solution Seen In Talks

## TALK WITH MOLOTOV SCHEDULED TO FOLLOW THE ONE WITH STALIN

MOSCOW, AUG. 3, (UP) — Another meeting of western envoys with Premier Josef Stalin or at least with Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov was regarded as almost certain today after the renewal of high level talks between the east and the west.

Diplomats of the United States, Great Britain and France talked for two hours with Stalin at the Kremlin last night in the first contact at such a level since Secretary of State George C. Marshall was here a year ago last spring.

The more optimistic observers saw a possibility of some quick solution of the deadlock in Germanw, or at least an early solution of the Berlin crisis.

## Taft Concedes Defeat In Halt Of Filibuster

WASHINGTON Aug. 3 (UP)— Sen. Robert A. Taft, R. O., conceded today that it would be "absolutely impossible" to break the Southern anti-poll tax filibuster. But Republican Senate leaders shooting for Saturday adjournment of the special session, scheduled a Senate meeting tonight to dispose of other items.

Taft told reporters after a meeting of the GOP policy committee that it would be impossible to smash the "dixiecrat" talkathon without amending Senate rules. That would be impossible until next year, he said.

But the GOP leaders said the Senate will be held in session until 10 o'clock tonight in an effort to clear the decks for limited action on high prices and housing.

The Republican policy leaders called a conference of all GOP Senators tomorrow to discuss their tentative plans to tighten up on credit inflation, pass a modified long-range housing bill and adjourn for the year on Saturday.

The conference tomorrow, he said, will consider action on a constitutional amendment outlawing the poll tax as a voting requisite in federal elections.

## W. P. Weatherall Dies While At Lake Fishing

W. P. Weatherall, 87, for many years a resident of Olden, died this (Tuesday) morning about 9:30 while fishing at Lake Eastland.

The deceased, accompanied by J. J. Hammett of Olden, had gone to the lake to fish. Weatherall, Hammett told Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood of Eastland who is conducting an inquest, was out in the water picking up muscle shells for bait. He saw him straighten up from a stooping position and immediately fall backward in the water.

Hammett got Weatherall out of the water and notified the authorities at Eastland.

The body was removed to the Hamner Undertaking Company in Eastland. Justice Wood told the Eastland Telegram that he was awaiting information from the undertaker before rendering his verdict in the case. A further examination he thought, would show whether Weatherall died from a heart attack while standing in the water or if he was stricken, fell into the water and drowned.

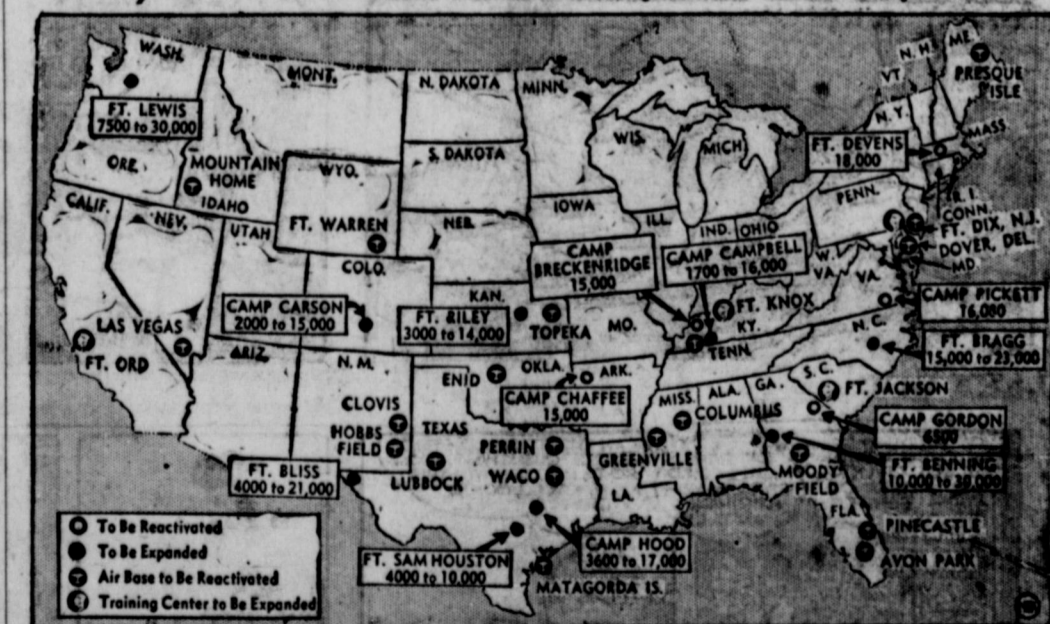

## Bridges Emerges as Victor From Foreign Aid Bill Fight

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—President Truman's signing of the \$6,000,000 foreign aid bill is a peg on which to hang the untold story of the big fight between Senate and House Appropriations Committee conferees before they reached agreement on Marshall Plan funds. This was undoubtedly one of the longest and hardest conference battles ever fought on Capitol Hill.

Leader on the one side was Congressman John Taber of New York. On the other side was Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire. Bridges finally came out the hero and the winner. But at times he was the only one of the six senators and eight representatives in favor of passing the Senate-approved bill more or less as Secretary of State Marshall, Economic Co-operation Administrator Paul Hoffman and Sen. Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan wanted it, with the full amount available for spending in the first 12 months ending next April 2, instead of in 15 months ending June 30, 1949, as the House demanded.

Conferees to reconcile differences between Senate and House foreign aid bills began on Thursday of the final week Congress was in session. There were three sessions on Friday, running far into the night, two on Saturday. Some sessions ran five hours non-stop.

THE conferees began with several long and bitter speeches by Chairman Taber of the House Appropriations Committee. Some of them lasted a full hour. They covered such subjects as President Truman, Secretary of State Marshall, and Administrator Hoffman.

Senator Bridges, as chairman of the conferees, sat out these diatribes and let Taber have his say. The House Republican conferees, besides Bridges, were Wigglesworth of Massachusetts, Engel of Michigan, Stefan of Nebraska, Case of South Dakota, Keeffe of Wisconsin and Democrats Cannon of Missouri, Kerr of North Carolina and Mahon of Texas.

Among these Republicans, only Wigglesworth and Engel were at all sympathetic to the recovery program.

Senate conferees were Republicans Brooks of Illinois, Reed of Kansas and Democrats Hayden of Arizona and Thomas of Oklahoma. Brooks was openly hostile to the Marshall Plan. Reed was interested only in reaching a compromise. He kept pulling various typewritten paragraphs out of his pocket and proposing them for adoption.

Senator Bridges sat tight. As chairman of the conferees, he said openly that he would not put the motion to carry the Reed amendments. For this stubborn stand a storm broke round his head.

FINALLY on Saturday, last day of the session, Bridges pulled out of his pocket a piece of paper carrying the one amendment he said he would approve. It provided that the June 30, 1949, expiration date be stricken out. In its place he proposed that "the entire amount (\$6,000,000,000 plus) may be apportioned for obligation or may be obligated and expended, if the President, after recommendation by the administrator (Paul Hoffman) deems such action necessary to carry out the purposes of said act, during the period ending April 2."

This proposal brought on another big row. Demand was made that Bridges tell where his amendment had come from. He was accused of having received it from Senator Vandenberg, from Administrator Hoffman and Undersecretary of State Robert A. Lovett.

Taber and the others claimed the amendment was meaningless. They said that if this amendment were adopted, immediately after the act was signed Hoffman could recommend to the President that the full amount be appropriated in 12 months instead of 15. They claimed this was a complete surrender to the Truman administration.

Senator Bridges refused to implicate anyone else on authorship of his amendment. He insisted that it was his own offering. And he said he would refuse to put any other motion till it was adopted. Like a poker player with a pat hand, he rode out the bidding and the betting, calling and bluffing them all. And he won.

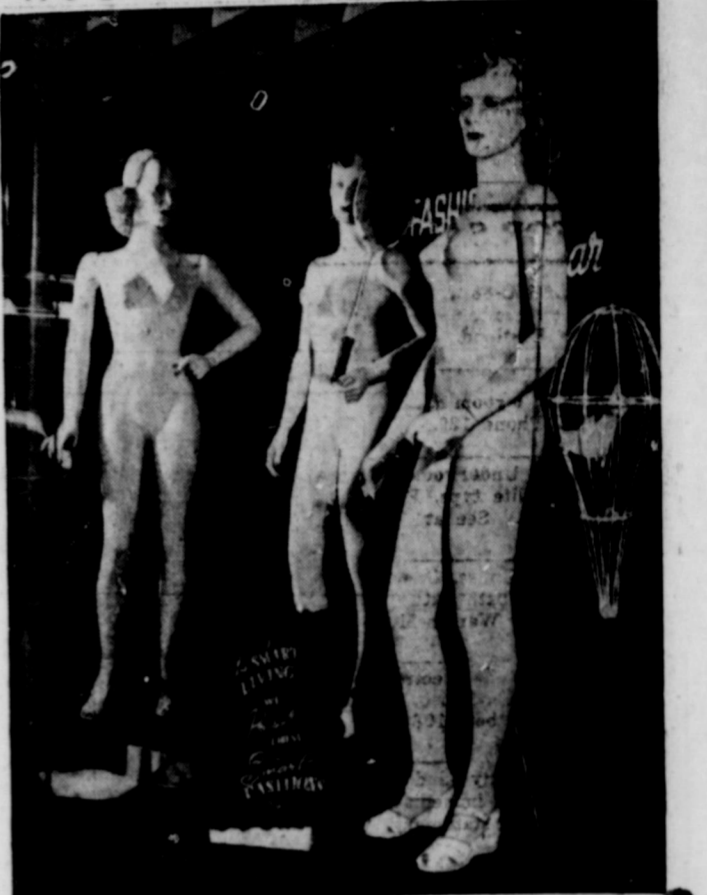

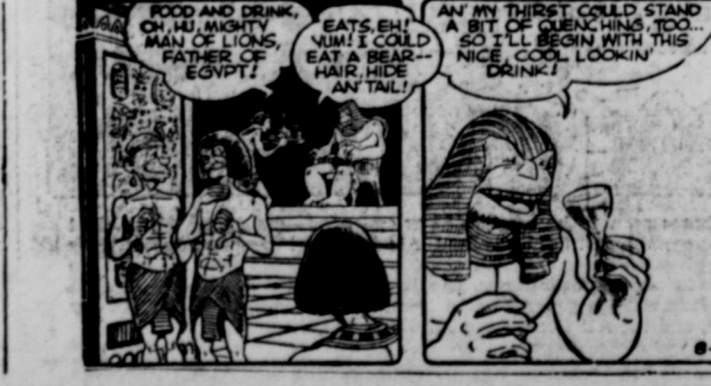
