CONGRESSMAN KENT HANCE is completing his first year as congressman from the 19th district (and a good first year, from all reports). Hance said this week that his opinion of Washington had changed somewhat since he was elected to his position.

Hance, who is only the second congressman ever to serve the 19th District, said he was shocked to discover the size and the power exerted by the bureaucracy. He knew that the federal bureaucracy was bad, he said, but didn't have any idea it was as extensive as it is.

Another factor which is surprising, Hance said, was the extent that special interest groups lobby in Washington to get favorable legislation passed. Some congressmen get so obligated to these special interests that they cannot cast an otherwise objective vote, Hance said.

Hance says he feels as though he has accomplished what he set out to do—build a base and become known. He was able to secure some important committee appointments, in spite of being a newcomer.

We personally salute Congressman Hance for a job well done. Like his predecessor, George Mahon, we commend him for listening to your problem and being sympathetic.

When he was a student at Dimmitt High School, it is said that Hance had an ambition to meet Congressman George Mahon. Hance not only realized his ambition, but when the veteran congressman decided to retire, Hance won election to replace him in congress.

**THE ECONOMIC BAROMETERS** seem to be looking better for our country. The prime interest rate, which had hit an all-time high, and had virtually shut down the building industry, has begun to come down somewhat.

Reactions to the easing of interest rates has been good. Folks in the home building industry have a more positive attitude, as some loan money is beginning to be made available.

The automotive industry, which had seen its sales slump considerably on the national level, may also begin to recoup some of its losses, as the interest situation gets better.

Thursday's Amarillo Daily News even had a headline proclaiming that the end of the recession was in sight. This is also a step in the right direction. The national news media needs to follow suit, since they had a big hand in "talking the nation" into its economic slowdown.

Nothing responds to the daily news, rolls and falls with the tide, like the nation's economy. Wall Street goes up and down each day in relation to how the nation fares on the news front.

That's why we say it's time for the national news media to put on a "good news blitz."

## Democratic Runoff Set

The Democratic runoff election will be held on Saturday, June 7, with all of the county's 16 polling places to be open.

Three state races will appear on the ballot. For the Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1, J.P. (Jim) Wallace and John C. Phillips are opposing.

For the Court of Criminal Appeals, W.T. Phillips and Mike McCormick are candidates for the Place 2 position. Tom Davis and Edith Roberts are candidates for the Place 3 spot on the court.

In Parmer County, Max Crim and Archie Tarter meet for the county commissioner's spot for Precinct 3 (Farwell-Lariat-Oklahoma Lane area).

## Jim Little Resigns As Band Director

Jim Little, Director of Bands for Bovina Independent School District for the past four years, has announced his resignation from the school system.

He has accepted an appointment as Director of Bands at Perryton High School, and Coordinator of Instrumental Music for Perryton I.S.D. Little came to Bovina in June of 1976. He had previously taught band and choir in the Gaston County, North Carolina schools.

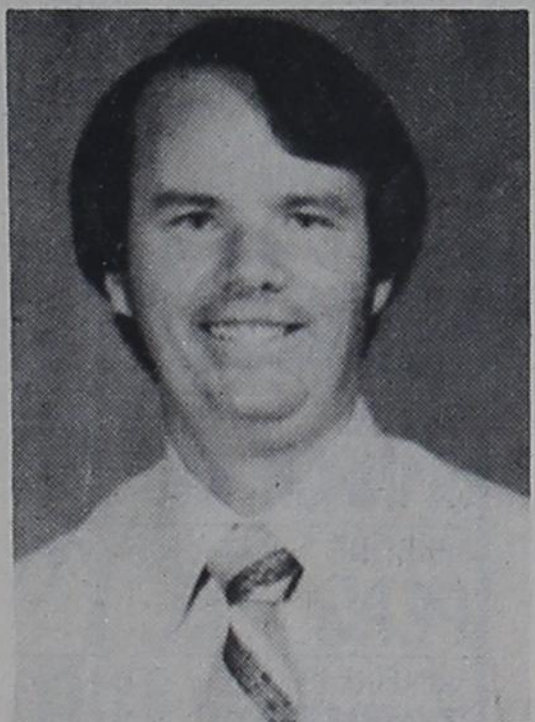
The past four years have seen a steady growth in the elementary and junior high band program in Bovina, with an annual enrollment of more than twenty students in each class in grades 5-8.

"It is always a saddening experience to leave those students and staff members with whom you have worked in such a close relationship," said Little. "But I have been offered a professional promotion and a challenge, and I feel that it is time to move on. I have enjoyed my work and the friendships which have developed over the past four years. I would challenge the students and their parents to work hard to keep the Bovina band program growing," Little said.

In addition to his new teaching position Little has accepted a two year appointment as Texas State Chairman of the National Band Association and editor of the NBA State/Division Chairman Newsletter. He will be responsible for coordinating communications efforts among the various state and division chairmen and the NBA Executive Committee.

Little plans to attend Eastern New Mexico University this summer to complete the final nine hours of courses required for an Education Specialist Degree. He is a post-graduate student in the School of Education and Technology where he is majoring in educational supervision.

Following completion of his work at Portales, Little, his wife Barbara, and their three children will report to Perryton for their new assignment.

## Tax Appraisal Board Discusses Office Bid

Interviewing prospects for the position of chief appraiser, and a decision on the proposal for a location were the main items when the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board met Monday night in Bovina.

The City of Bovina has offered to build a 30x40 foot building for the appraisal board's county office. The appraisal board would make payments on the building, and at the end of 20 years (or the payment term), the building would become the property of the board.

## E.M.T. Class Registration Still Open

The Emergency Medical Technician school which began Tuesday night at the Methodist Church Fellowship Hall will accept late registrations Thursday night beginning at 8 p.m.

All local and area persons interested in taking this course in emergency medicine are urged to be present at that time.

Arrangements have been made for taping lectures and extra scheduling of skills practice for those who are unable to attend during wheat harvest or other necessary interruptions.

The course which has been approved by the Texas Department of Health will include eighty hours of classroom training plus forty hours of observation and practice at the Clovis High Plains Hospital. A fee of \$20 is being charged to cover supplies and expenses.

Dick Richards, class coordinator stated, "I believe we have planned a very worthwhile course, one in which the students will learn enough emergency medicine to give them confidence to respond with skill when called upon. We will have Dr. Bolch and Dr. Albertson from Muleshoe teaching some classes, along with several other experts in their field of emergency medicine. We want these students to know what they're doing because we might have to depend on them to save our lives some day." The class is sponsored by the Bovina Ambulance Service.

## Routine Business For Commissioners

Renewing of certificates of deposit, plus final action in purchasing an automobile for the deputy sheriff was the main items of business for the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday.

A certificate of deposit for \$20,000 for Precinct 2, and one in the amount of \$30,000 for Precinct 4 were renewed for a short period.

The bill from Friona Ford Sales, for the new deputy sheriff's car, was approved in the amount of \$6,031, trade difference.

A bill from Amarillo Laboratory of Pathology, for \$332.50, representing an autopsy on Celestino Galicia, ordered by justice of the peace Frances Euler was approved for payment.

A motion was passed to advertise for bids for a tractor and shredder for Precinct 3.

A resolution was adopted and sent

to the National Association of Counties, asking that the funding of the Legal Services Corporation not be renewed.

Motion was passed to pay \$40 to help defray expenses of the Anthony Kirbys, foster parents of Dora Fields, who have made several trips to Lubbock to see the doctor with the foster child.

The court approved easements to Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative across two county roads, for the laying of underground cable.

County Agent Seth Ralston reported that there would be a plant clinic at Farwell this week. He stated that all test plots for this year soon will be planted.

Ralston is to leave soon to buy show lambs for 4-H members.

## Wind Adds To Damage

The Bovina area was hard hit by a hailstorm last Wednesday evening, May 28. The storm caused considerable crop damage in the area, and property damage in the city.

The hailstorm started over in New Mexico, and cut a path approximately two miles wide, east to west, across Parmer County, and in fact across the entire Texas Panhandle, getting at least as far as Oklahoma.

The storm system was the same which spawned a tornado at Tulia shortly before 9 p.m. that evening, doing a lot of property damage, and a funnel cloud which did considerable damage in the community of Nazareth in Castro County.

The hailstorm moved into Bovina just before 6:30 p.m., and the cloud was a most unlikely one for hail, according to observers, but in spite of its looks, it pelted the area with marble to golf-ball sized hail.

Hail damage was reported throughout the area, but the worst damage was reported near Highway 86 eastward, and near highway 1731 to the west.

A wheat field belonging to Prentis Pruitt, and a barley field belonging to Oakley Stevenson, were virtually destroyed by the storm, both being in the path of the worst destruction. Stevenson was said to have sustained damage to crops in other locations as well.

Other farmers who reported damage were Vernon Willard, whose corn was battered, Harry Johnson, who said he had to "spot replant" his cotton, A.L. Nuttall, whose wheat took a beating and Kenneth Pryor, whose barley on the Big Nick Treinen place was damaged.

Others included Leon Ware and Bedford Caldwell, who had damage to young crops. Lawrence Jamerson, who farms east of town, said he lost 25 per cent of his wheat on his home place, and also had hail on land he farms farther east.

Where the hail was lighter, farmers received mainly a good rain. Jimmie Cockerham, three miles north, said he received around two inches of rain, and very little hail damage.

It appeared that there was no hail damage farther south than Parmer County Cattle Company. Farmers in the Hub area and northward sustained some bad crop damage, and farther east, the city of Dimmitt also took a pounding. But the Lazbuddie and Clay's Corner area didn't even get a sprinkle, nor did the Rhea community.

In town, several residents apparently lost windows. These included Terry Sherrill, who had been in the process of repainting. The storm knocked out several windows at his place, which also sustained roof damage.

One resident, Billy Harbison, in addition to losing a window, sustained bruises due to riding through the storm on a motorcycle.

Horn-Clayton Insurance Company said early this week that the company had had over 100 claims turned in related to the hailstorm. A number of roofs and windows were damaged. Trees also lost a lot of leaves. Most yards were covered with a mixture of hail and leaves when the storm ended.

The worst of the storm lasted about 15 minutes.

A resident of Friona, Darrell Thompson, reported seeing a funnel try to form out of the cloud system, southeast of Friona.

Sunday afternoon, June 1, the area was buffeted by high wind and sand which resembled an early spring day.

The wind caused more crop damage, as some of the young crops were blasted by the sand. A number of farmers took to their fields Sunday afternoon with plows, in an effort to keep their farmland from blowing.

Temperatures have been in the high 80s during the past week, and topped the 90-degree mark on Monday afternoon, June 2.

As we consider these words let us not forget the apostle Paul's words in Romans 10:17, "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God." If we are to have a strong faith let us study and apply the knowledge we gain to our lives.

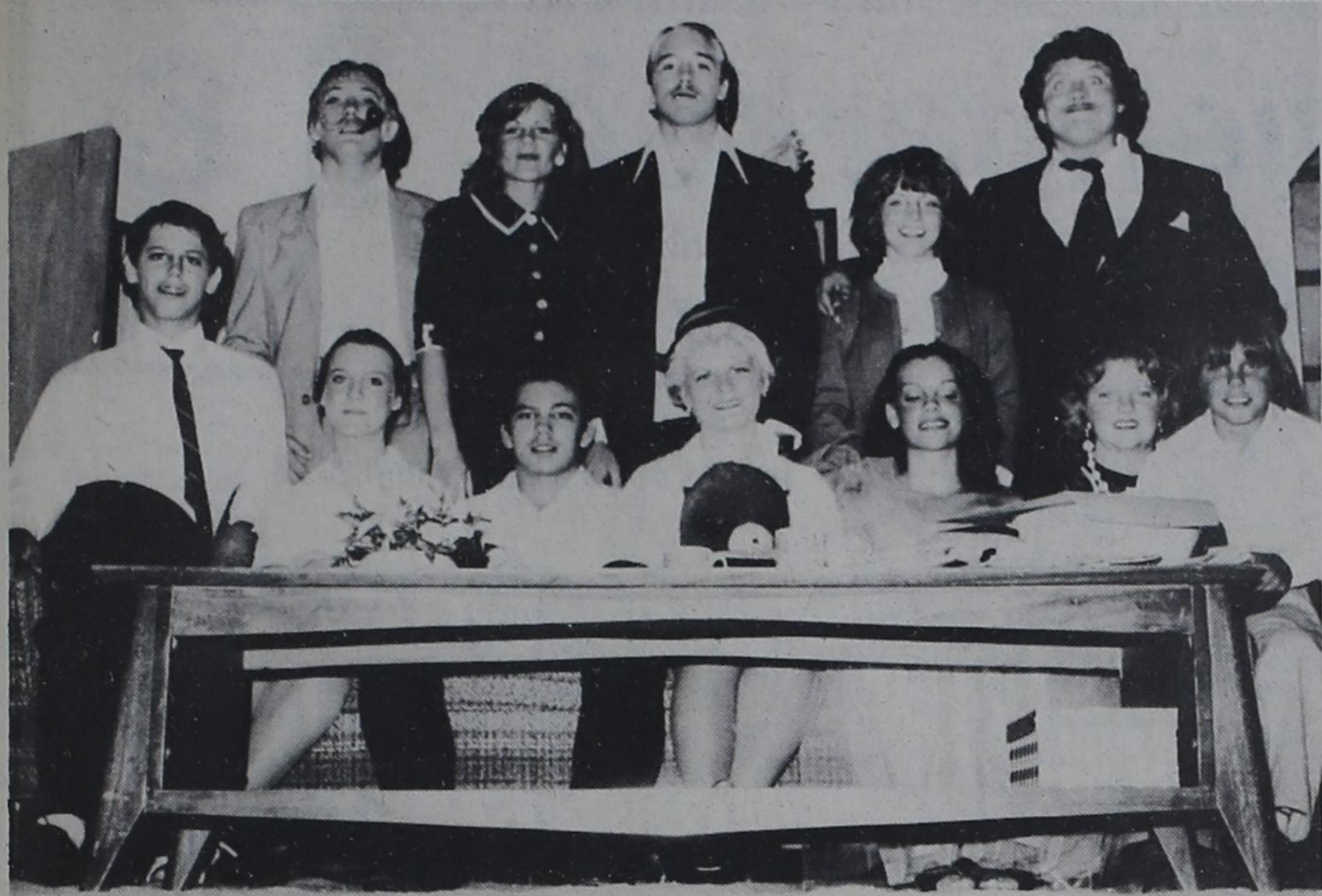

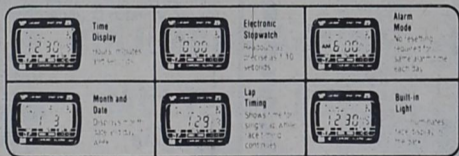
