U. S. Air Force Procurement Team **To Be In Abilene**

Among the most successful op-erators in the Kirk pool, along the Eastland and Comanche boundary, are J. W. Baldwin of Wichia Falls and Sam Harmon of Gainesville, who have seven producing wells, one drilling and room for eight more locations. Some of their wells are capable

of producing 1,600 barrels a day or more each but are throttled lown because of the allowable. These producers are flowing hrough a choke which is reduced to 5-64ths of an inch, an opening about as thick as the big black lead in a pencil that a newspaper editor uses. Even through an opening that tiny, a well will produce

50 barrels a day. It is considered better to have he wells flowing 24 hours a day than to have them make thier allowable in less time and then shut them down.

The casing shortage which is afflicting the oil industry has resulted in an arrangement which is proving successful. Some of the wells in the Kirk pool are using old drill pipe for casing. This is V. M. Williams

OBEY TRAFFIC REGULATIONS-CHIEF LANEY

Bicycles ridden on Eastland streeets, must in the future, display a red reflector on the rear and a white light in front. The operator must have a license and must obey all other rules and traffic regulations that apply to cars, Police Chief R a y Laney stated this morning. "Traffic on Eastland streets is

coming so heavy that the enforcement of driving rules and regulations must be enforced as to bicycle operators the same as operators of motor vehicles else choke. ey become a threat to the safety

of the public," Chief Laney said. Laney said that within a few days riders of bicycles who did not have their license and who were not displaying the proper lights on their machines and otherwise complying with driving regulations, would be given tick-

Chief Laney also stated that hereafter all pedestrains, bicycle riders and operators of motor vehicles of all kinds must obey all traffic regulations or they would be given tickets if apprehended. "This is absolutely necessary if we are going to prevent accidents and expedite the movement of cars, trucks, etc., through the city streets," Laney said.

Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith, British Envoy Frank Roberts and French Ambassador Yves Chataigneau spent hours and 45 minutes with Stalin and Foreign V. M. Molotov at the Kremlin last night and early today

Authoritized sources said at least one additional but probably more joint meetings may be expected as a result of the recordbreaking meeting with Stalin last night.

Smith, Roberts and Chataigneau conferred at the American embassy for more than two hours early this morning after returning from the Kremlin.

Roberts and Smith left at 4 A. M. But Smith remained with his stall, preparing reports for Washington, until 5:30 a. m. He then went to his residence for a briel nap and returned to his office later in the morning.

It is expected that new instructions from the western capital: will take a day or two arrive. Then the western envoys will ask the Kremlin to fix another ap pointment.

British and American roit squads across a vaguely defined frontier in the heart of Berlins bomb-battered business district. The recommendation was that German police of the three main sectors be permitted to patrol the border areas without the super-vision or assistance of military police of the occuupying powers.

Says Communist **Regime Not One** For World Peace

AMSTERDAM Aug. 24 (UP)-The Soviet Communist regime 'i not a regime of peace" and it confronts "thos who seek peace with a difficult problem," Republican Foreign Policy Adviser John Fos-ter Dulles told the World Council of Churches today.


This problem "cannot be solved by trying to crush Communism by force," Dulles said. "The solu-solution is for those who have faith to expert themselves more vigorously to translate their faith into works."



Bloomin' Nice People Run Own **Boiler Factory Newspaper** In "Atomic" City

TUESDAY, AUGUST, 24 1948.

By Fred J. Green United Press Staff Correspondent RICHLAND, Wash. (UP)-In this government-owned "atomic" city there is a newspaper as unus ual as the community itself.

The newspaper is owned and operated by a corporation composed of all the people of the city, and city-wide elections are held to choose members of the board of directors who make policies and direct the business of the paper. The name of the corporation is "Villagers, Inc." and the newspaper is the Richland Villager. Before the war, Richland was a tiny farming community on the Columbia River with a population

of 300. Then came the "Manhattan" project and the United States government in 1943 bought the land where Richland stood and much more, too.

Atomic plants arose on the vast sagebrush lands around Hanford to the north and Richland became the living center for thousands employed on the project. Richland is still expanding and its 1949 population is expected to reach 26,000. Newspapers spring up just as naturally in an American community as blue grass does in Kentucky and quickly the weekly Richland Villager came into existence as a spontaneous creation of the entire community. Now, like its community, it is
