# Russians Arrest 15 Alleged German Spies

## Area OIL News

**GORMAN AREA Sept. 9-10.**  
Wrather Penn and Walters No. 4 Dornay perforated Tuesday using 72 shots on a 12 foot streak of pay from 2834 to 2846. They have a good showing of both gas and oil in this operation.  
Wrather Penn and Walters No. 3 Dornay have set surface pipe and are WOC. They drilled their No. 4 location out of turn, and are now back to their No. 3. They may drill a fifth well before leaving the lease this time.  
Wrather Penn and Walters are running a drill stem test on the Dave Roche et al, No. 1, Grisham in the Marble Falls at 2870 to 2880.

Commercial Production No. 2 J. A. Hirst will be perforated some time Wednesday afternoon.  
Commercial Production No. 3 J. A. Hirst are drilling at 1320 feet. Coast Oil Corporation have made application to drill their No. 4 Della Graham location. This will really be their 6th drilling operation on this lease, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, and now No. 4. This is certainly a profitable lease, every well has been better than the one before.  
Gillespie No. 1 Waller drilling at 3080.

J. W. Baldwin No. 3 J. N. Watson acidized Tuesday afternoon. It is flowing and shows it will be a strong well.  
J. A. Baldwin No. 2 J. A. Watson will set pipe Wednesday afternoon. They bottomed this well at 2840.

W. B. Johnson No. 5 Ireland Watsons set pipe Tuesday night.  
J. R. Hunter et al, No. 1 Choate drilling at approximately 800 feet.  
W. B. Johnson moving to their No. 6 Ireland Watson from their No. 5 location on the same tract. The outfit is Mr. Gidchrist from Wichita Falls.  
J. R. Hunter et al, No. 1 Blackwell will acidize Wednesday afternoon, at 3278 feet.  
Gregg, Glass and Taylor et al, are moving in and rigging up on their No. 1 J. E. Foster, this week.

**SEPTEMBER 10:**  
Coast Oil No. 8 Della Graham drilling at 1450 feet.  
Coast Oil No. 1 Richardson acidized Wednesday. This well has already had a potential run and it gauged 226 bbls. through a 1-4 inch choke.  
Coast Oil No. 4 Della Graham drilling at 1800 feet.  
W. B. Johnson No. 5 Ireland Watson WOC at 2855 feet.  
W. B. Johnson have dug the pits and are in the process of rigging up on their No. 6 Ireland Watson, Mr. Gidchrist who has just leased office space in the Petroleum Building in Eastland will have his outfit in charge of drill operations.  
Wrather Penn and Walters will acidize their No. 4 Dornay Thursday afternoon.

Commercial Production will acidize their No. 2 J. A. Hirst either Thursday afternoon or night.  
J. R. Hunter No. 1 Blackwell acidized Wednesday afternoon using only 500 gallons of acid. The results were all right for the amount of acid used. The well is making 5 bbls per hour but is capable of making much more, if they decide to increase the treatment.

## Texas First In Record Crude Oil Production

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10, (UP) — The country's petroleum refining capacity rose last year to an all-time high of 6,034,252 (m) barrels of crude oil a day, according to the Interior Department.  
Texas ranked first in refinery output with 1,722,200 (m) barrels of crude processed in 50 refineries daily. California was second with 1,093,700 (m) barrels daily from 61 refineries.

## ELEVEN TEXANS DIE THURSDAY IN ACCIDENTS

At least 11 persons died in Texas automobile accidents Thursday, as a mid-week flurry of highway mishaps sent the death toll soaring.  
A Tyler negro, was killed when a train struck him at a grade crossing.  
A single accident near San Marcos last night claimed the lives of three persons.  
They were, Mr. and Mrs. James Lung, both 52, of Austin, and Earl William Peck, 42, also of Austin.  
Highway patrolmen said they were killed instantly when two cars collided on wet, slippery pavement six miles north of San Marcos.

Three other persons were injured in the accident.  
Two Royce City youths were killed near Rowlett last night when the motorcycle they were riding collided head-on with a passenger car.  
They were Becton Jenkins and Marvin Douglas, Jr., both about 19. They were on their way to attend a football game at Garland when the accident occurred.  
The occupants of the automobile, Vernon Drake, 28, and Miss Georgia Reynolds, 20, were treated for minor injuries in a Dallas hospital.

Travis E. Epps, 30, was killed near Lufkin in a three-car collision early Thursday.  
Laverne Thornton, 19, was killed near Abilene when the car driven by the man she was to marry within a few days smashed into a bridge abutment.  
Two separate accidents near Weatherford resulted in the deaths of Mrs. J. W. Shoemaker, 75, and Billy John Hardin, 13.  
A head-on collision was blamed for the death of Mrs. Grady P. Borwn, 42, of Houston, who died en route to a Seguin hospital last night.  
The accident occurred 15 miles east of Seguin.

## Axis Sally Indicted On Treason Charges

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (UP) — A federal grand jury today indicted Mildred Elizabeth Gillars, the Nazi radio's "Axis Sally", on charges of treason.  
The 47-year-old spinster was returned to this country two weeks ago from Germany under Army escort. A formal charge of treason was placed against her at that time pending grand jury action.  
Miss Gillars, a native of Portland, Me., was accused of fomenting discontent among American troops through her broadcasts for the Nazi radio.  
The indictment was returned by the grand jury to U. S. District Judge Jennings Bailey.

## STEVENSON CONTINUES PROBE OF JIM WELLS COUNTY VOTING

ALICE, Tex., Sept. 10 (UP) — Former Gov. Coke R. Stevenson, accompanied by a one-time Texas Ranger, arrived there this morning to press an investigation into Jim Wells county voting in the U. S. Senatorial race.  
With Stevenson, apparently an unsuccessful candidate for the senate place, were Frank Hamer, the one-time Ranger captain, and Stevenson's campaign manager in Bexar County, former FBI agent Kiehlis Dibrell.  
Hamer is now an investigator for a major oil company.  
The three met with Tom Donald, who retired as secretary of the Jim Wells county democratic executive committee last Saturday.  
Donald showed them election tallies, but refused to let them remove the papers from his office.  
Donald said he explained to Stevenson that the tallies were part of the records of Clarence Martin, who retired as chairman of the county committee last week and were the basis for Martin's certification of official returns in the Aug. 28 primary.  
Stevenson was silent, but presumably he came here to inquire about the wide variance in unofficial and official returns from the county. Jim Wells county, in Texas election bureau not official returns on Aug. 28, showed 765 votes for Lyndon B. Johnson and 60 for Stevenson, the official certification, however, showed Johnson with 967 votes, Stevenson with 61.  
Meanwhile, it was reported that the county democratic committee met Wednesday night at the home of its new chairman, H.L. Adams. Nine members were present, but eight others, all Johnson supporters, claimed they were not notified of the session.  
Reports on the session said the committee adopted a resolution asking that Donald turn over the certification of votes to the new executive committee.  
There were predictions also that the new committee would ask the state democratic executive committee at its Monday meeting in

Fort Worth to permit a re-certification of the Jim Wells county vote.  
DALLAS, Tex., Sept. 10 (UP) — Returns from Dallas county had been certified to Austin today for one Dallas precinct uncounted previously, which benefited U. S. Senatorial Candidate Coke R. Stevenson by a net of 40 votes.  
Arthur Stevenson, chairman of the Dallas County Democratic Executive committee, checked to the state committee the question of whether the newly-found votes would be counted.  
The ballots came from precinct 131, where three voting machines were used in the Aug. 28 runoff primary. During a recheck of the voting for a county election, it was found that totals from only two machines had been submitted.  
The returns from the third machine gave Stevenson 113 votes and Lyndon B. Johnson 73.

## Queuille Asks French Support

PARIS, Sept. 10, (UP) — Henri Queuille demanded of the National Assembly today that it ratify his appointment as premier and warned that failure to do so might touch off riots and bloodshed.  
Powerful forces of armed French police and Security Guards were thrown about the National Assembly in preparation for a vital vote of confidence on premier-designate Henri Queuille at 5 p. m. (noon ED).  
Two days of sporadic Communist attempts to march on government buildings and stage demonstrations in the streets have followed the Communist manifesto calling on workers to impose a Communist-dominated government for France by force.

## Benes Buried In Garden At Home

PRAGUE, Sept. 10 (UP) — Former President Eduard Benes of Czechoslovakia was buried at noon today in the garden of his summer home at Sezimovo Usti, south of Prague.  
The public was not admitted to the interment services, but scores filed through the garden later to view the grave which is at the point where Protestant Martyr Jan Hus once preached, five centuries ago.  
A brief ceremony was held on the veranda of Benes' home, conducted by Archbishop Josef Beran of Prague. Dr. B. Bednar, a Protestant leader, also made a brief address. The former president's widow, Mrs. Hana Benes, other relatives and small delegations of the diplomatic corps, the cabinet, and other organizations attended.

## British Cabinet Discusses Berlin

LONDON, Sept. 10, (UP) — The British cabinet held a full dress meeting for the first time in six weeks today to consider the Berlin crisis.  
Prime Minister Clement Attlee, suffering from duodenal ulcer and eczema of the feet, left his hospital bed to preside.  
But the spotlight was focused on portly Ernest Bevin, the foreign secretary, who gave a lengthy and grim report on the unsuccessful summer negotiations with the Russians and recent incidents in Berlin. Bevin emphasized yesterday's shooting fray in which Russian troops fired into an anti-Communist crowd that tore down the Soviet flag.  
Jim Woods said to be sinking.

Word has been received that Jim Woods who is a patient in a Stephenville Hospital is in a critical condition and said to be "sinking fast."  
Little hope for his recovery was held according to word received by Mrs. W. A. Anderson, this morning.

### South Texas Gets Rains; Mercury Due To Rise

Heavy rains were reported over much of South Texas today as cool weather continued to blanket all but the extreme coastal areas.  
Skies were clearing in the Panhandle and Western Plains, cloudy to partly cloudy in north, central and East Texas this morning, but rain still was falling in areas which received up to 3 1/2 inches of rain yesterday and last night.  
Temperatures this morning ranged from the 40's to 74 at Brownsville.  
Dalhart was the coolest spot with 45 degrees, while Miami had 46, Quanah 48, Snyder, Spur, Muleshoe and Plainview 49, Amarillo and Clarendon 50, Lubbock, 52, Guadalupe Pass 35, Big Spring and Fort Worth 58, Abilene 59 and Dallas 60.  
Yesterday's maximums varied widely from 90 at Mission and 84 at Brownsville, Beaumont and Laredo down to 63, at Stockton, at Van Horn and 68 at Wink, Junction and Kerrville.  
Rising temperatures were forecast over the north and northwest sections for today and tonight.  
Sample rainfall figures included 3.51 inches at Crystal City 3.37 at Corpus Christi, 2.53 at Galveston, 2.17 at Houston, 1.03 at Beaumont, 1.95 at Brownsville, .98 at San Antonio, .57 at Del Rio, .87 at Victoria, .18 at Laredo, .15 at Austin, .18, Beeville 40, Cuero 72, Dilley 1.17, Falfurrias 1.97, Hondo 1.07, Kerrville .50, Lampasas 1.1, Llano .14, Luling 1.91, Mission 1.02, San Marcos 1.05, Taylor .39, Uvalde 1.92, Columbus 1.20, Port Arthur 1.03 and Nacogdoches .44.

## Retail Food Prices Expected To Drop Lower

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10, (UP) — Three major farm organizations said today that lower retail food prices "are on their way as a result of record farm production this year."  
They noted that on-farm prices have already declined 10 per cent from the 1948 high. This drop, they predicted, will have its effect on consumer prices as soon as the products reach the market.  
But they warned that meats may trail other foods in seeking lower price levels. Because livestock herds were cut sharply in recent years, the farm group said, ranchers may prefer to build them up for a while before sending increased supplies to the nation's meat counters.  
The three organizations making the optimistic price forecast were the National Grange, The American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives.

## Rebel Elector's Telegram To Go To Committee

HILLSBORO, Tex. Sept. 9 (UP) — State Democratic Chairman R. W. Calvert has announced that a telegram from a Democratic elector who declined to answer his poll "will be submitted to the proper committee for the proper action at the proper time."  
The elector was William D. Morris of Fort Worth who challenged the right of Calvert to make a "loyalty poll" of electors on whether they plan to support the Truman-Barkley ticket.  
He said he knew no law, of either state or party, which authorized the state chairman to make such a poll and when required to answer.  
Meanwhile 17 of the 23 electors have assured Calvert of their intentions of supporting Truman and Barkley. The remainder had not yet answered the poll.

## Rev. Vernon White Drowns In Cistern

WACO, Tex. Sept. 10 (UP) — Rev. Vernon White, 30, pastor of the Lakeview Methodist Church near Waco, drowned yesterday in an abandoned cistern while on a hunting trip.  
His hunting companion, D. M. Nolen of Lakeview, launched a searching party after missing the pastor, when he started home at the end of the hunt.  
Justice Ben Thompson returned a verdict of accidental death by falling into an open cistern.

BERLIN, Sept. 10 (UP) — The Russians announced tonight the arrest of 15 Germans alleged to be members of an anti-Soviet spy ring operating with American and British support in the Russian occupation zone.  
Earlier Soviet authorities made a new assault on the Anglo-American airlift by demanding that American Air Force headquarters provided full details of every flight along the air corridors to Berlin.  
American quarters said the Soviet demands raised impossible conditions. A prompt American rejection was handed to Soviet authorities, they said.  
The American rejection pointed out that the United States Air Force was operating and would continue to operate its aircraft according to "established procedures agreed upon on a Four-Power basis."  
The Soviet demands were contained in a formal letter delivered at the Four-Power Air Safety control center as a squadron or more of Soviet bombers maneuvered over the building.  
The letter said Soviet authorities wanted full information, down to the pilot's name and exact time of takeoff, for each plane entering the air corridors.  
This information, the Russians said, must be given "not less than one hour before the takeoff or from Berlin."  
One air force officer said the Soviet demand involved "an impossible fund of useless information." It was considered another attempt to interfere with the Anglo-American Airlift, similar to the recent Soviet announcement that large scale Soviet air maneuvers would be carried out in the air corridors until Sept. 15.  
Latest reports showed that one German was killed and several wounded when Soviet troops and police fired into an anti-Communist demonstration in the British sector yesterday.

## Charges Union Clause Violates Taft-Hartley Act

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (UP) — Robert N. Denham, National Labor Relations Board Counsel, charged today that the union shop clause of John L. Lewis' coal contract with 18 steel companies violates the Taft-Hartley Act.  
Denham filed the charges in a final brief before the board which is to make a decision on the case. The charges reiterated Denham's previous charges made last July when he issued a complaint against the United Mine Workers.  
Denham said that Lewis and his union officials must sign non-Communist affidavits and hold a union election on the union shop provision before the contract with the steel companies would be legal.  
The steel companies operate so-called "captive" coal mines.  
The union shop clause touched off a week's strike in the nation's "captive" coal mines last July, after which the steel companies agreed to sign the contract with a union shop clause.  
The steel companies however, filed charges of unfair labor practices against the union and Denham issued his complaint.  
Denham said that the union and its officers are "in complete and obdurate disregard of the law of the land."

## Truman Asked To Stop At Dallas

DALLAS, Tex. Sept. 10 (UP) — President Truman was invited today by Dallas loyal Democrats to stop here on his return trip from the west coast to Washington.  
Harry L. Seay, a leader of the pro-Truman Democrats, sent the president the following telegram today:  
"The itinerary announced for your western trips makes it evident that your return route might take you through or near Dallas. At the request of loyal Democrats here I want to urge that you stop in Dallas where we assure you a rousing reception by thousands of your loyal friends."  
There are no counties in Louisiana, there are parishes instead.

The Albuquerque Dukes were all square with the Pampa Oilers today in their first-round Shaughnessy playoff series for the West Texas-New Mexico League championship.

The Dukes, who bowed to the Oilers in the opening game, came back last night to pound out a 12-hit, 6-3 victory over the Oilers after the visitors took a 3-0 lead. Amarillo started early and rolled up a comfortable margin over the Lubbock Hubbers for an 8-2 victory in their delayed opening game of the first round playoff. Budny limited the Hubbers to four hits.

The Dukes and Oilers now shift to Pampa for the next three games of their series, while Lubbock stays in Amarillo.

STRIKE SITUATION TAKES SLIGHT TURN FOR BETTER

By United Press The flurry of labor troubles which have idled 110,000 workers across the nation today took a slight but definite turn for the better.

A federal conciliator succeeded in working out an agreement to a dispute which threatened to pinch off the flow of grain eastward over the Great Lakes at the height of the shipping season.

And a state conciliator, trying to mediate the seven-day-old strike by 15,000 CIO oil workers in California he was "optimistic." But the strikes by New York drivers, West Coast maritime workers, and Detroit auto plant workers seemed further than ever from settlement.

Federal Mediator Carl Carlgren announced early today that representatives of 500 AFL terminal grain elevator workers had called off strike plans, set for a secret date, against 10 large elevator firms at the world's largest inland port of Duluth-Superior. California State Conciliator Glenn Bowers, meanwhile, said he felt "more optimistic than otherwise" about the oil workers strike for a 21-cent hourly pay boost from six petroleum firms. Gasoline shortages were increasing in the west, particularly around Los Angeles and in Northern Nevada.

Five thousand more drivers threatened to join the strike by 13,000 AFL truckers in the New York area today. Members of local 282, international brotherhood of teamsters, said they might quit to support local 807's demand for a 25-cent hourly pay hike and other benefits. At Seattle, striking longshoremen voted against an employer demand that their CIO leaders sign non-Communist affidavits. Los Angeles longshoremen have already turned down the demand and it appeared that unionists up and down the west coast would follow suit.

At Detroit, 50,000 auto workers were idled for their day as result of a strike by 170 guards at the Briggs body plant. Briggs production workers refused to cross the guards' picket lines resulting in body shortages which caused layoffs at several big automobile plants. The striking guards seek more "make ready" time.

Newspaper Poll Favors Dewey

NEW YORK, Sept. 10 (UP) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey Republican candidate for president, has the support of 58.63 per cent of the country's daily newspapers comprising 70.4 per cent of the total daily circulation, a preliminary survey by the trade journal Editor & Publisher showed today. In volume of support by dailies, Dewey led all other candidates and was ahead of President Truman, the Democratic nominee, four to one, the survey showed. Mr. Truman had the backing of 16.16 per cent of the papers accounting for 13.99 per cent of the circulation.

Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, candidate of the State's Rights party, was supported by 3.87 per cent of the papers; with 1.33 per cent of the circulation, while Henry A. Wallace, Progressive Party candidate, had 2.33 per cent of the papers with 245 per cent of the circulation, the survey revealed. Editor & Publisher's quadrennial survey in 1944 showed that Dewey had the support of 69.1 per cent of the dailies with 68.5 per cent of the circulation, while the late President Roosevelt had 22 per cent of the dailies with 17.7 per cent of the circulation.

Those newspapers maintaining an independent attitude toward the candidates, or which are undecided or have not yet announced, account for 10.91 per cent of the total and 13.82 per cent of the circulation the survey showed.

GOP Warned To Return Senators

By United Press Republican party workers were warned today not to make the mistake of overlooking GOP senatorial candidates in their efforts to elect the Dewey-Warren ticket.

The GOP now holds six of these seats. Brownell called for a determined effort to keep them from going Democratic.

"This is our year," he said, "and we must make the most of it."

A similar position was taken by Hugh Scott, chairman of the Republican National Committee. In a statement warning against GOP over-confidence, he asked party workers not to relax their efforts to put over the entire Republican slate.
