Benes Buried In **Garden At Home**

PRAGUE, Sept. 10 (UP)--Former President Eduard Benes of Czechoslovakia was buried at noon today in the garden of his Retail Food summer home at Sezimovo Usti,

south of Prague. The public was not admitted to the interment services, but scores filed through the garden later to view the grave which is at the point where Protestant Martyr Jan Hus once preached, five cen-

turies ago. A brief ceremony was held on the veranda of Benes' home, conducted by Archbishop Josef Beran of Prague. Dr. B. Bednar, a protestant leader, also made a brief address. The former president's widow, Mrs. Hana Benes, other relatives and small delegations of the diplomatic corps, the cabinet, and other organizations attended.

production this year." They noted that on-the-farm prices have already declined 10 per cent from the 1948 high. This drop, they predicted, will have its effect on consumer prices as soon as the products reach the mar-

But they warned that ments may trail other foods in seeking lower price levels. Because livestock herds were cut sharply in recent years, the farm group said, ranchers may prefer to built them up for a while before sending mcreased supplies to the nation's
