

Eastland Well Been Producing 26 Years

Less than a mile south of the city limits of Eastland, there is a well which is producing from the Ellenburger - and it has been for 26 years, declares Frank Day veteran oil man.

But it took the recent finding of oil in the Ellenburger by the Hunter well on the Blackwell, halfway between Carbon and Gorman, to focus attention on the W. A. Martin No. 1 which like "Gid Faithful," has been productive since 1922.

This well came in for about 115. barrels and was the discovery well of the Martin pool. It was followed by numerous large wells, one of which flowed over 2,000 barrels a day. A lease in the Martin pool, after several years pro-duction had skimmed the cream, sold for a consideration understood to be in excess of \$400,000 and the property, after all these

PARIS, Sept. 20, (UP) - The assassinated Count Folke Bernadotte urged the United Nations in his last report to recognize the existence of the Jewish state of Israel and to force both the Arabs and the Jews to proclaim formal peace in Palestine.

The final report of the UN mediator for Palestine to the UN was made public today on the eve of the General Assembly meeting. Bernadotte warned that the assembly must act at once and decisively to replace the uneasy Palestine truce with a permanent settlement.

Bernadotte said he was convinced that peace in Palestine was possible if the Assembly talked to the Arabs and Jews in language that is strong and backed by most of the 58 United Nations.

The 160-page report was completed only a few hours before Bernadotte was shot to death in Jerusalem last Friday. In it he advised the assembly that it must make the Jews and Arabs face the unpalatable facts, holding over both the threat of Security Council penalties if they renewed hostilities.
