### Monty To Head Europe Military

LONDON, Oct. 5. (UP)—Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, Britain's top commander in World War II, was named commander-in-chief of the combined military forces of Western Europe today.

Montgomery was designated chairman of the permanent military committee of the five-Bruce pact nations — Britain, France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg — giving him command of 2,000,000 fighting men and potential forces of 12,000,000 or more.

French General Jean De Lattre De Tassigny was named chief of all ground forces.

French Naval Chief of Staff Vice Admiral Robert Jaujard was designated "flag officer of the western union," putting him in charge of port defenses primarily.

British Air Marshall Sir James Robb was appointed chief of the air forces.

### CORNELIUS BUYS CISCO HOSTELRY

Sale of the Laguna Hotel in Cisco to Victor Cornelius of Eastland for an undisclosed consideration was announced here this week. Contract of sale has been executed and transfer of title is expected to be completed within the next few weeks.

The hotel, a 100-room, eight-story steel concrete and brick structure built in 1928 at a cost of approximately half a million dollars is being sold by William Seipel of San Antonio through Edwin Schroeder Co. & Associates of that city. It was purchased by Mr. Seipel from the National Hotel Company of Galveston in 1944. Guy Patterson, Eastland realtor, handled details of the transaction from the sellers.

Included in the sale are several business buildings in the same block.

Purchase of the Laguna is the first substantial venture into hotel property by Mr. Cornelius whose career acquired an Algerian touch some ten or twelve years ago by his almost fabulous success in developing an obscure idea into a theatrical advertising service of nationwide proportions. His firm operates at Eastland one of the largest printing and graphic arts plants in West Texas.

Since building his advertising business, however, Mr. Cornelius has invested heavily in real estate, principally in apartment properties and business houses at Eastland, and in oil holdings, some of which are in the immediate Cisco area.

Purchase of the Laguna, Mr. Cornelius said, was prompted by the steady and widespread oil and gas development in this area and the favorable outlook for new production. He plans a thorough renovation of the property to place it in the top rank of small city hotels.

The Laguna was opened to the public in March, 1929, and was then regarded as one of the best appointed hotels in this section.

It was built by William C. Witt and Associates after a campaign by Cisco Chamber of Commerce and civic leaders who raised \$140,000 as Cisco's contribution toward a cost of nearly \$500,000. During the depression and after a flush East Texas oil field and ten-cent oil had spelled a temporary decline in oil activity in West Central Texas, the hotel suffered the fate of numerous other properties in West Texas and went under the hammer. For several years, however, and since the revival of oil and gas activity here, it has been unable to meet the growing demand for accommodations.

Mr. Cornelius' purchase of the property is hailed with satisfaction by Cisco business and civic leaders as a positive step toward restoring the hotel to its former prestige and necessary service to the community and the public at large.

### Masters Report No Findings In Vote Fraud Probe

FORT WORTH, Tex. Oct. 5. (UP)—Reports from two special masters at law, on file today in the U. S. District Court, said that the investigators of alleged fraudulent election returns in three south Texas counties were "unable to find any facts or arrive at any conclusions of law."

The masters, J. M. Burnett and W. R. Smith, Jr., were appointed by Federal District Judge T. Whitfield Davidson to investigate alleged irregularities in the Aug. 23 primary runoff election for U. S. Senator in Duval, Jim Wells and Zappa counties.

Burnett, in his report, said he was unable to reach any conclusions "due to the fact that said hearing was ordered closed before the same was completed." Smith's report substantially was the same.

The investigation was ordered by Judge Davidson after former Gov. Coke Stevenson asked the federal district court for an injunction prohibiting the Texas secretary of state from placing the name of U. S. Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson on the Nov. 2 general ballot as U. S. Senatorial nominee. Johnson defeated Stevenson by 87 votes.

Judge Davidson ordered the investigation stopped after attorneys for Johnson petitioned Associate Justice Hugo Black of the U. S. Supreme Court to set aside the ruling of the lower court. Justice Black ruled that the federal district court was without jurisdiction.

Stevenson had charged that ballot boxes in the three counties had been stuffed after the polls closed in the Aug. 23 primary runoff.

### VOTE 9 TO 2; SOVIET, UKRAINIAN MINISTERS THREATEN WALKOUT

#### British Protest Red Parachuting

BERLIN, Oct. 5. (UP)—The Russians informed the air safety center today that they would hold practice parachute jumps in the Buckeburg-Berlin air corridor and the British immediately protested on grounds the jumps would violate two four-power safety regulations.

The British charged the Russians with violating the safety provisions banning parachuting in corridors except during emergencies and dropping anything that might interfere with planes.

No time was given for the jumps. But the weather was ideal today, with a bright sun and clear sky offering splendid visibility.

The Russians said the jumps would be made near Etzin, which lies in the corridor within 15 miles of two Soviet Air Fields, Dalgow and Stataen, just beyond the western British city limits of Berlin.

The Russians said the parachutists would be dropped from 2,600 feet.

This would endanger British aerial operations, since the British customarily fly at altitudes of less than 2,000 feet.

#### No Rain Forecast; Weather Unchanged

Yesterday's high was 91 degrees at Childress and Crystal City with Guadalupe Pass' 78 the low maximum; overnight and the minimum was 47 degrees at Lufkin.

PARIS, Oct. 5. (UP)—The United Nations Security Council, over the bitter objections of Russia, voted today by 9 to 2 to give a full public airing of the Berlin dispute. Soviet Delegate Andrei Vishinsky immediately announced that Russia will boycott the council's debate of the issue.

Taking the floor immediately after the vote by which the council agreed to place the Berlin crisis between the Western Powers and Russia on it agenda, Vishinsky said: "The Soviet delegation wishes to state that it will not participate in the deliberations of the Security Council."

I was not immediately clear, however, whether Vishinsky actually would walk out of the council meetings, as Soviet Delegate Andrei Gromyko did in 1946 on the Iranian issue, or would remain in the sessions but refuse to take part in the discussions.

Ukrainian Delegate Dmitri Manulski immediately made an announcement similar to Vishinsky's. The Ukraine had been the only nation which voted with Russia against placing the Berlin question on the agenda.

Both Vishinsky and Manulski remained in their seats after making their announcements, and Argentine Delegate Juan Bramuglia, chairman of the council, immediately adjourned the session until tomorrow morning.

It remained to be seen at that time whether Vishinsky and Manulski and their allies would attend.

Bramuglia had ordered the council to vote on the question of including the Berlin issue on its agenda at 5:20 P. M. (11:20 A. M. EST) and the actual vote came a few moments later.

It was a foregone conclusion. Vishinsky in two speeches of protest against Security Council consideration had been able to elicit no support except from the Ukraine, always a Soviet satellite.

Vishinsky protested that the Security Council had no jurisdiction in the case, that the Western Powers were seeking to wreck the Big Four Council of Foreign Ministers, which he said was adequate to deal with the problem, and that consideration by the council would violate the UN charter, and the Potsdam and Yalta agreements.

But all nine nations of the council except Russia and the Ukraine joined in asking, in effect, why Russia should oppose a Security Council airing of the whole Berlin question unless it were, indeed, creating a threat to peace by its actions there.

The Soviet Union has maintained a surface blockade of the German capital for three and one-half months, forcing the Western Powers to supply the 2,500,000 Germans in their sectors of the city by an air lift which has cost millions of dollars and several lives.

Vishinsky had foreshadowed the Russian boycott of council discussions of the Berlin question in his fiery speech yesterday when he told the council that consideration would be a violation of law.

"The Soviet Union will not not be a party to such violations," Bramuglia did not give Vishinsky and Manulski enough time to stage a walkout today, even if they had desired to do so. No sooner had Manulski finished parroting the words of his Russian leader than the chairman banged his gavel and announced adjournment until tomorrow.

Outside the chamber, Vishinsky brushed off queries from reporters as to whether he and Manulski would attend tomorrow's session by saying: "You will see that tomorrow."

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 5 (UP)—The Fort Worth Cats of the Texas League and Birmingham Barons of the Southern Association renew their Dixie Series rivalry here tonight with the home club's hopes riding on Willard Ramsdell's knuckle-ball and who will catch him.

If Manager-Catcher Bobby Bragan is able to play, the Cats have high hopes of taking a 2-1 edge over their Southern Association foe. Bragan re-injured a split finger on his throwing hand in the second game at Birmingham Sunday and won't know until game time tonight whether it has healed fast enough to permit him to play.

Ramsdell's elusive knuckle-ball is extremely hard to handle behind the plate as well as at the

plate and the Cats hope their experienced manager will be able to handle the chore. If not, young Merv Dornburg will replace him. Dornburg not only lacks the relieving experience of Bragan, but does not have the extra-base power that the manager's presence in the lineup would afford.

Otherwise, both teams appeared in fine condition for the third game of the series, expected to attract 11,000 fans to La Grave Field. Dee Fondy, Cat first baseman who flew home from Birmingham for treatment of an ailment back, appeared to be in good shape.

## Scott Averages More Than Eight Yards Per Carry

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 5 (UP)—Arkansas' Clyde Scott can be counted upon for almost a first down nearly every time he carries the ball for the undefeated Razorbacks.

Statistics released today by James H. Stewart, Southwest Conference secretary, show that the all-conference back has averaged nearly nine yards per carry in the 38 times he has handled the ball on rushing plays in three games.

With Scott, who leads the conference in rushing with a total of 340 yards, and teammate Leon Campbell, alternating at rushing, the Razorbacks could count on an average of 13 yards every two downs, statistics show. Campbell, who ranks behind Scott and Texas Christian's Lindy Berry, has averaged 6.36 yards for 229 yards in 36 attempts. Campbell has gained 268 yards in 63 carries for a 4.28 yard average.

Texas' Paul Campbell paced the passers in yards gained with 235 yards on 13 completions out of 37 attempts, but SMU's Gil Johnson had the best average—11 out of 12 for 223 yards and three touchdowns. Berry ranked third with 180 yards on 16 out of 41.

Ben Proctor, Texas, led the receivers with 10 catches for 141 yards followed by George Bailey, TCU, with eight for 98 yards, and Russ Pritchard, Arkansas, with seven and 94 yards.

Punting honors went to Texas A & M's Bob Goode with a 39-yard average, pressed closely by Gordon Long, Arkansas, at 38.8, and SMU's Doak Walker with 37.3.

Walters led the scorers with 24 points—three touchdowns and six extra points—with six men tied for second with 18 points each.

He took the decision last night before 3,500 fans at the Arena here.

Garcia was in command throughout the entire fight and shook Collins with a right to the jaw in the third. Bleeding freely from the nose from the second round on, Collins fought the last two rounds with a virtually-closed right eye.

## HAAS IS TOP MAN

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5 (UP)—Fred Haas Jr., a lanky golf pro from New Orleans, today reigned as the newest champion of the Portland Open Tournament.

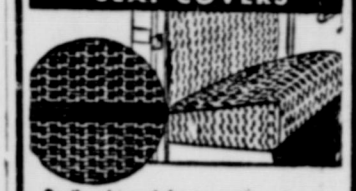
