Council Called To Study Palestine War

MEDIATOR THREATENS TO CALL ISRAEL TO ACCOUNT BEFORE UN

Coming Events This Week In Eastland

Among the coming events in Eastland County this week are: Eastland county dries will meet Wednesday at the First Baptist church in Eastland to launch a campaign against the beer election to be held November 2. Eastland County Federated club will elect officers at a meeting to be held Saturday at Gorman. The Eastland-Gallahan County Medical Society and its auxiliary meet Tuesday in Eastland. A grand jury for the October term of the 91st district court will be empaneled Tuesday morning at 9:30 by Judge Geo. L. Davenport. Tuesday night the board of directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce will elect new officers for the Chamber of Commerce. Friday night at Maverick Field in Eastland the Eastland Mavericks will meet the Dublin Lions in a conference football game.

PARIS, Oct. 18. (UP) — The United Nations Security Council was summoned today to meet at 10:30 A. M. (3:30 A. M. CST) tomorrow to consider the new outbreak of hostilities in Palestine.

The Security Council had decided Saturday, when the Israeli government rejected a UN demand to stop the fighting, to take up the Palestine issue as soon as possible.

Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, acting UN mediator, threatened to call Israel to account before the council unless its government agreed to the demand for a halt in hostilities.

The mediator said Egypt already had agreed to an armistice in the Negev fighting if Israel will do the same. He expressed considerable alarm at the Negev outbreak of last week and said he would request an emergency session of the Security Council if the fighting was not halted.

Bunche delivered his ultimatum last night in a face-to-face conference with Israel's Foreign Minister Moshe

Shertok who is attending the UN General Assembly here. He reportedly told Shertok that if the Negev fighting was not halted the peace of the entire world might be endangered.

Shertok immediately cabled the Bunche demand to his government in Tel Aviv and Bunche agreed not to ask Security Council action until Israel replied.

Bunche proposed a three-day truce during which both sides would maintain their present positions to allow the UN, Jews and Arabs to "cool off and talk it over."

The reports of the hostilities showed no sign of any inclination anywhere to put into effect a United Nations order to stop the new warfare. Instead it was creeping through Palestine and threatening to set the whole country aflame again.

The Israeli government reported that Israeli artillery shelled Jewish-held Kfar Yavitz, some 10 miles east of Natanya, the coastal diamond center, and along the Arab "dangerous triangle" flanking Tel Aviv to the northeast.

At least 15 shells landed near the town, the communique reported. Iraqi forces based at the edge of the Arab triangle thus showed the first sign of activity on the central front since the fighting broke out a new in the Negev last week.

An Israeli military spokesman also reported the capture of "additional" heights along the supply route used by the Egyptian spearhead aimed through the Negev toward Tel Aviv.

Army sources reported earlier that Israeli troops had scored a big victory by seizing a strategic height. It was not identified, nor were the "additional" heights low reported captured.

The communique said the Israeli air force had bombed Egyptian concentrations at Majdal, Faluja, Beersheba, Gaza and at Ariah.

The points attacked from the air are the main bastions of the Egyptian invasion forces, stretching all the way from the border to the high water mark of their northward push some 30 miles below Tel Aviv.

A banquet and talk by Worth McClure of Seattle, Wash., executive secretary of the American School of Administrators, formally opened the meeting last night.

McClure said the "basic defense" of the county rests on education, and identified the school superintendent as "becoming more and more a social engineering position."

Pre-Pearl Harbor Party Tale Has Moral for War Lords

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—The hitherto untold story of a famous pre-Pearl Harbor, Washington dinner party given by Donald M. Nelson is about to be revealed in full detail with the publication of Bruce Catton's new book, "The War Lords of Washington."

If the story now seems old and out of date, it isn't at all. It has a kicker and a moral for the new war lords of Washington in 1948, who may be facing other Pearl Harbors.

Bruce Catton will be remembered as a former NEA Service editorial writer and columnist. He resigned from active newspaper work to enter government service, ending the war as director of information for the War Production Board. He is now on the staff of Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer.

The Nelson party with which Catton opens his book was held in the North Lounge of Washington's Carlton Hotel, Dec. 4, 1941. There were 24 guests. They were the top men in the defense effort—leaders in government and dollar-a-year men from private industry.

Purpose of the party was to get them all together around a table, prime and feed them well and then in the contented hour that followed, show that New Dealers and Big Businessmen were brothers under the skin, able to make the defense effort click after a couple of fumbling starts.

Nelson began the talking with what Catton describes as something of a Rotarian speech. Good fellowship was going to cure all misunderstandings. There was no reason they couldn't work together. Nelson then introduced Wallace. The vice president, who was also Nelson's boss as head of SPAB—Supply, Priorities and Allocations Board. Wallace rose and stood in awkward, smiling ill-ease, his long and heavy forelock dangling over his brow. He didn't belong in the room with this bunch, and he showed it. He was reminded of a story. It drew a round of polite laughter. Wallace sat down.

Then Bill Knudsen, the production genius, said something about there being a big job to do here. In spite of everything, he thought it was being done pretty well.

NEXT Nelson called upon Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox. After voicing the usual after-dinner pleasantries, Knox said that since he could speak freely to this assemblage, he wanted to warn that war was very close. It could begin at any moment. But whatever happened, Knox wanted them all to know that the Navy was ready. Every ship was at its post, every man at his station.

Then came the event that was to spoil—or to make—the party. There was another misfit present. He was a former newspaperman, Robert W. Horton, then director of information for the Wallace-Nelson-Knudsen SPAB-OPM operations. After Knox spoke, Horton passed a note to Nelson. It read, "How about calling on me?" So Nelson called on Horton.

Horton had been very much interested in the secretary of the Navy's remarks, he said. But the other afternoon while going to the Navy, he had been fairly trampled on by officers rushing out with their golf bags over their shoulders. It seemed to Horton that the Navy was quitting rather early if there was a crisis near.

Nelson apparently recounted later that at this juncture Knox had leaned over and whispered, "Who is this...?"

But Horton was going right on talking. He had been down the Chesapeake Bay recently, cruising in a patrol boat. And he had sailed right into Norfolk Navy Yard and some all around the "illustrious," shot-up British aircraft carrier which was supposed to be getting secret repairs. Horton said that later he had landed at the yard and walked all over the place without ever being challenged.

"Mr. Secretary," Horton concluded, "I don't think the Navy is ready." Less than four days later came Pearl Harbor.

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 18 (UP)—With Southern Methodist firmly in the favorite's place again, the Southwest Conference returns to its elimination contest among members a week with SMU's two main challengers involved in title play.

The Methodist gain against an intersectional warfar against an improved Southern Methodist machine, while Southern Methodist moves into Houston to meet the Mustangs, who are favored to win the Texas Aggies game.
