The Soviet order affecting, 150,000 potential voters capped a drive of threats, intimidation and agitation against the election of 98 assemblymen in West Berlin. The Soviets boycotted the election and refused to enter candidates.

Slight Majority Passes Plan: To Adjourn In Week

PARIS, Dec. 4. (UP) - The United Nations decided today after the political committee had approved a watered down Pales tine conciliation plan to wind up the General Assembly meeting here one week from tonight.

As the adjournment rush began, the political committee voted by a bare simple majority for a new and weak conciliation plan for seeking a final settlement be tween the Arabs and Jews in Pal-

The tattered remnant of the British resolution on Palestine, from which the vitals of the Bernadotte plan had been eliminated was approved by a 25 to 21 vote of the political committee. It proposed to set up a three-nation conciliation commission, its operat-ions under control of the big five. But the plan still needed a twothirds majority in the assembly.

other development marked the close of the next to last week of the Paris meeting:

1. A special political committee approved 33 to 6 an America-British-French-Chinese resolution 'recommending" that the Big Powers limit their veto rights in the Security Council. It was only a suggestion, and was opposed bitterly by Russia.

 A special political commis-sion rejected an Argentine pro-posal to call a special UN conerence to consider amending the

UN charter.
3. The Western Powers saw little new in the latest Soviet statement on the Berlin currency crisis. But they welcomed Rus sia's acceptance of the principle of committee study of the cur-rency problem, even though Russia appeared fairly cool to the

whole idea. 4. The full assembly plodded through routine reports from committees. It approved a recomme dation to send an Argentine old age declaration to the Economic

and Social Council for study. In its adjournment recommen-dation the steering committee responded to a plea by John Fos-

Quake Shatters Colony; Many

MAZATLAn, Mexico, Dec. 4 (UP)-The governor of the Marias Islands penal colony radioed today that he feared many of the 400 prisoners and civilian employes of the colony had been killed as the result of an earthquake which destroyed 90 per cent of the islands' buildings.

At least one death definitely was reported from the four islands, which are situated in the Pacific, 40 miles off this coastal city. The prison's radio station chief was killed when the station building collapsed during a series of severe quakes between 7:30 and 8 P. M.





He got his start in the business as a printer's devil in St. Louis. At one time he served a term as S. Senator from Tennessee.


