MARSHALL CONDITION TERMED 'EXCELLENT' AFTER OPERATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (UP)—Secretary of State George C. Marshall underwent a kidney operation at Walter Reed Hospital here today. The hospital reported his condition "excellent."

A bulletin issued by the Army hospital at 9:30 A. M., CST, said Marshall was operated on at 8 A. M.

"The operation was successful and Gen. Marshall's condition is excellent," the bulletin said. "No complications are expected."

There were no details on the gravity of the operation which had been disclosed earlier by the State Department.

The department said surgeons at Walter Reed wanted to operate on Marshall last summer when he entered the hospital for a physical check-up. But they delayed it because he had to attend the United Nations meeting in Paris.

The State Department issued the following announcement at 9 A. M. CST: "Gen. Marshall underwent a kidney operation at the Walter Reed Hospital this morning."

"Following a physical check-up last summer the surgeons wished to operate then but because of the Paris Conference the operation was delayed until today."

There were no further details immediately available.

Marshall, who will be 68 on Dec. 31, has been living at the hospital since he returned Nov. 22 from Paris, where he attended the United Nations Security Council meeting.

The State Department announced a week ago that the Secretary of State had entered the hospital for some "tests and examinations."

Group To Probe Business Firms' Profit Excesses

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (UP)—A congressional subcommittee called two accounting experts today to testify on an economist's statement that business corporations are "overstating" their profits.

Sen. Ralph E. Flanders, R., Vt., chairman of the Joint economic subcommittee investigating profits, said "we want to find out just how much difference there is between real and reported profits."

He said he hoped the two accountants could help. They were William A. Haton of the University of Michigan and George D. Bailey of Detroit, past president of the American Institute of Accountants.

Prof. Summer H. Slichter, Harvard University economist, said yesterday that American corporations overstated their profits by about \$16,400,000,000 (B) in the past three years.

He said the practice was "highly misleading to stockholders, employees, customers, and the public." He did not accuse corporations of doing it deliberately.

To Study Texas Election Laws

AUSTIN, Tex. Dec. 7 (UP)—Gov. Beauford Jester's 11-man committee to study revision of the state's election laws will gather here tomorrow for its first meeting.

The membership includes Lt. Gov. Allan Shivers, Speaker of the House, W. O. Reed, Secretary of State Paul Brown and eight other persons.

Selection of a chairman is expected to take place tomorrow when the committee meets at 10 A. M.

Galveston Houston Road Constructed

HOUSTON, Tex. Dec. 7 (UP)—The new Galveston-Houston superhighway will be just that, according to a statement today by district state highway engineer, Jim Douglas.

Douglas stoutly denied published reports that the big project would evolve into only a two-lane road outside the Houston city limits.

He predicted the entire highway four lanes outside Houston and six lanes in the city, would be completed by 1951.

Navy Abandons Survivor Search; 33 En Route Home

JOHNSTON ISLAND, Dec. 7 (UP)—Thirty-three survivors of a mid-Pacific air crash were in route to Kwajalein island aboard the Carrier Rendova today and the Navy discontinued the search for their four missing comrades.

The men were picked up by the Rednova last night, 39 hours after the ditched their crippled C-54 Transport plane. Shortly after their rescue the Hawaiian Sea Fronted at Honolulu said the search for the four still missing was being discontinued. Survivors had indicated that the men were dead, the Navy said.

Capt. James M. Lane, skipper of the rescue ship, reported: "All survivors are on board. The four missing apparently are beyond hope."

Lane said the survivors had told him two men went down with the plane, another died Sunday night and the fourth jumped into the sea.

"All are believed drowned," Lane said. The message added that all the survivors were "well and happy."

Lt. Col. W. R. Calhoun, of Birmingham, Ala., pilot of the C-54, was among the rescued. He recommended that the search be discontinued.

Air force identified the missing men, all passengers, as: S-Sgt Robert C. Harrell of Milledgeville, Ga. S-Sgt William A. Colvin, Jr., of Cross City, Fla. Sgt. Charles T. Millapaugh of Fort Jervis, N. Y. Sgt. James A. Mitchell of Fort Wright, Wash.

Mercury Falls As Cold Front Moves In Today

A periodic winter front, creeping across Texas from the eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains, dropped temperatures in the Dallas-Fort Worth area by mid-morning today and brought a threat of colder weather along the Gulf Coast by tonight.

The "blue norther," one of a series that forecasters of the U. S. Weather Bureau said swept over the state regularly during the winter months, followed a low pressure area that moved across Texas yesterday and last night. Weathermen did not anticipate a severe temperature drop, but said that it would bring cooler weather to the Gulf Coast area.

Skies throughout northwest Texas were fair, but a few light showers — ranging from a trace to as much as .02 inches — were reported along the upper Gulf Coast and in the extreme east-central portion today.

Temperatures early today ranged from 24 degrees at Amarillo to 67 degrees at Brownsville, at mid-morning, Del Rio had a 45-degree reading.

Temperatures were expected to drop to the low 20's in northwest Texas tonight with correspondingly colder weather elsewhere, forecasters said.

Little moisture was reported accompanying the "norther."

Truman Received Less Than Majority

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (UP)—President Truman was elected with less than a majority of the total popular vote cast in the Nov. 2 election, United Press tabulations showed today.

The tabulation, with the official count from 42 states and unofficial count from six, showed a total popular vote of 48,682,679.

Of these, Mr. Truman received 24,059,194 votes, or 282,145 fewer than half the vote already tabulated.

The President, however, had a plurality of 2,138,129 votes over Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, whose popular vote was 21,921,065.

PARIS, Dec. 7 (UP) — John Foster Dulles, in a major American policy address before the United Nations today, called upon the entire world to close ranks against Communist threats and violence.

Dulles spoke in the political committee during debate on the Korean problem. He accused Russia of supporting Communist terrorism in Korea and defying the United Nations.

Overwhelming solidarity against Communist violence and coercion offered those countries outside the Iron Curtain the best chance for peace, he said.

"We see violence, terrorism and internal dissension being stimulated from without by those who hope thereby to gain international objectives," Dulles said.

"Every non-Communist government in the world is, to a greater or lesser extent, subjected to these tactics.

"There is one elemental defense and that is through the UN to evidence at least a moral solidarity with those who, in violation of our charter, are subjected to such threats of violence.

"It may be that the greatest service the UN can render is to be an instrumentality for demonstrating that whenever those methods are used or threatened internationally,

the rest of the world community closes ranks to prevent the success of those methods by whatever peaceful means available, either to the UN as an organization or to member states acting pursuant to the charter."

Dulles' speech was the boldest plea for an anti-Communist bloc the United States has yet delivered before the UN.

The Assembly voted late yesterday to end the current session next Saturday night and reconvene in New York on April 1 to complete its unfinished business.

The Korean question, as well as Palestine and the problem of the Italian colonies, might be among the unsettled issues.

However, the general (steering) committee voted today to recommend to the General Assembly that the Italian colonies be taken up for immediate consideration.

The steering committee recommended that the issue be placed before a special political committee for at least preliminary consideration before adjournment Saturday.

The vote, six to four with three abstentions, was a partial victory for British delegates who have sought discussion of the Italian colonies at this meeting. Britain is interested in obtaining a United Nations trusteeship over Cyrenaica.

Dulles explained the American resolution outlining a program for ending the Korean dispute. He suggested a fresh UN commission be formed to observe the withdrawal of American and Russian occupation forces as early as possible.

He asked the UN to endorse the American-supported government set up in the United States occupation zone of Korea and to ignore the Communist government established in North Korea.



Robert Walker To Get Off Light

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec 7 (UP)—Robert Walker, the \$2,000 a week Hollywood movie star, appeared likely today to avoid police court trial on charges of destroying about \$20 worth of public property.

City Attorney Frank Eresch said a drunkenness charge also probably would be dropped. It might have resulted in a \$10 fine, if prosecuted.

Police Chief E. W. Kaul continued Walker's case until Friday and indicated that if payment is made for breakage damage Walker caused at police headquarters early Sunday the matter may be wiped off the books.

Walker, who went on a Saturday night spree with three companions walloped three police stations glass door panes with his

bare fists. He suffered severe hand cuts. The actor was revealed as a patient at Menninger psychiatric clinic here. M-G-M studio officials and Menninger spokesmen said he was "a very sick man."

Chief Kaul said he had been assured by Menninger authorities that all expenses for destroyed property will be paid by the clinic.

Eresch said it would be necessary only for Menninger officials to testify as to Walker's condition, and added: "We never try a fellow in a mental institution."
