Lovell was rushed by Hamner ambulance to the Caton-Cowan clinic where he was given emergency treatment.

Cavanaugh stopped his truck and rendered what aid he could to the injured man. He moved his truck only after officers arrived on the scene.

Reburial Rites In Breckenridge For Brothers

The bodies of Sgt. Edwin S. Pvt. Abner R. Cole were arrived at the Kiker Funeral Home in Breckenridge at noon today for reburial. The brothers are natives of the Wayland Community in Stephens County and attended school both in Wayland and in Breckenridge.

Edwin was a graduate of the 1935 class and was mobilized by the National Guard November 25, 1940. He was in the 36th Division which trained in Camp Bowie, Camp Blanding and Camp Edwards. He saw service in the Italian invasion at Salerno and was killed at Alta Villa on September 13, 1943, while directing fire from an out post which had been cut off from the Division by a German counter-attack.

Abner was a member of the Breckenridge High School class of 1943 and a member of the basketball team. He enlisted in February, 1942, and was a paratrooper taking training at Fort Benning, Georgia and Ft. Bragg, North Carolina. He jumped with the 101st Airborne Division in Normandy on June 5, 1944, and was killed near Carentan, France, on June 11, 1944, while attempting to establish a machine gun post forward of the German lines.

Double funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at the First Methodist Church in Breckenridge at 3:00 o'clock with Rev. J. W. Ford of Stephenville, Rev. W. V. Bane of Breckenridge and J. M. Bond of Eastland officiating.

Surviving are three sisters and five brothers. Sisters are Mrs. O. E. Austin of Stephenville, Mrs. J. A. Baggett of the Gunsight Community and Mrs. Paul Wagley of the Gunsight Community. Brothers are Forrest W. Cole and A. B. Cole of Breckenridge, Howard W. Cole of Pasadena, Robert A. Cole of Fort Arthur, and W. K. Cole of Eastland.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 10 (UP) — United States Marines will be moved to Shanghai from Tsingtao soon to protect American lives and essential property in case Communists attack the city, Vice Admiral Oscar C. Badger announced today.

Badger, commander of the western Pacific fleet based at Tsingtao, told a press conference that the Marines would not be based on shore but would remain aboard their transport.

He emphasized there was no intention to have the Marines intervene in any way in China's civil war. They will land only in event American lives and essential property are threatened, he said.

At the same time a group of Shanghai businessmen announced plans to create a volunteer defense army of 100,000 men to defend the city against Communist attack from within or without.

The Communist radio meanwhile claimed that Communist armies would overthrow Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's government in "around one more year."

Badger said that all Americans in the Shanghai area, estimated to number about 2,500, would be brought aboard U. S. warships now in the river off Shanghai in case of trouble.

"We are not here to participate in the Chinese civil war but to protect Americans," Badger said. "It may be necessary to request all Americans in the Shanghai area to board our warships for safety."

"They will be allowed ashore whenever they desire. They can remain in their offices through the day, returning to the ships at night for sleeping."

Other western nationals who are not of American citizenship will be granted refuge aboard merchant ships in Shanghai's harbor, he said. He said there always were enough merchantmen in the area to provide refuge for about 18,000 persons.

Badger refused to estimate the number of Marines that would be moved to Shanghai, but it was assumed that the bulk of those in Tsingtao would be hastened here in event of necessity.

He emphasized that the Marines would be landed only in event local Chinese authorities were unable to preserve order in the city.

On The China Battlefield

Huoshinniao Village, Northwestern Pengpu Front, Dec. 10, (UP) — Chinese Nationalist troops carrying American rifles and supported by Russian-made light tanks swept northwest today through burning villages to relieve a Communist-encircled force of 80,000 men.

Advancing against fairly light resistance, advance units of the sixth army group under Gen. Li Yen-Nien appeared about to join with the encircled troops of Gen. Huang Wei, surrounded in a five-mile area some 30 miles northwest of this village.

In Nanking, the National Defense Ministry announced after Nozick's front dispatch was filed that Li's advancing patrols had established contact with the left wing of Huang's twelfth army group, but said the two main forces had not yet actually linked up.

I walked the last mile into this village just behind Li's advancing troops, as rifles cracked and an occasional Communist mortar shell fell in the smoking ruins. The American six-by-six truck in which I had ridden from Pengpu, 20 miles to the southeast, had stopped well outside the village because of the Red mortar fire.

NINE DIE IN MYSTERY BLAST AT TOPEKA POWER STATION

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 10 (UP) — A still unexplained power plant explosion near the Kansas capital claimed its ninth life today.

All major industries in this city of 90,000 were shut down for lack of electric energy while engineers of the Kansas Power & Light Co. toiled in sub-freezing weather to restore power production at the big bi-ick generating station five miles to the east.

Topeka had an emergency ration of electricity, about a third the normal flow. It was obtained from tying into Kansas Gas & Electric Co. lines at Wichita. But there was not enough power for industrial plants, and an estimated 3,500 workers were idled.

Through the cold, starlit night, temperatures dipping to 11 degrees, and on into the new day, K. P. & L. workmen sought to bring a newly installed boiler in action with generators in the seven-story plant near the banks of the Kaw River.

J. L. Owens, plant superintendent, said it was "slow going." When the arrangement is complete, the blast-torn station will be able to furnish about half its former power output.

The cause of the blasts remained undetermined. At first it was believed one or more of the six big boilers had exploded, but investigation voided that theory.

Following the blasts, electric service was cut off to numerous communities in northeast Kansas momentarily, but in Topeka the disruption lasted nearly three hours.

Some workmen said they had smelled gas at the plant.

Burned over his body by the flash fire as well as hurled about

by the blast, H. F. Shay died in Christ's Hospital this morning.

He was one of 16 workmen hospitalized from the disaster that came without warning and only 20 minutes after a routine inspection of plant valves. A number of other workmen, many from outside firms aiding in a \$15,000,000 expansion program, suffered minor scratches but did not require hospital treatment.

R. W. McClure, K.P.&L. vice president, said after dawn, "we feel sure everyone is now out of the plant."

The other dead: Roy Hamby, maintenance foreman, Charles E. Miller, Clyde H. Redenbaugh, A. W. Freel, Charles A. Allensworth, Albert Sheahan, plumbing foreman; Alfonso Bryant, negro laborer; Arthur O. Dahlene.

Holiday Traffic Death Estimate Staggering

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 10 (UP) — Traffic accidents will kill 85 Texans in the 10 days between Dec. 23 through Jan. 1, Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, forecast today.

"It's even harder for them to believe," he added, "that 30 will be killed and 900 injured in the two days immediately before Christmas."

The department, he said, would again undertake the job of counting the bodies.

"So," he said, "we are asking highway patrolmen to rush reports on every traffic death to Austin. We'll give the reports to the press and radio twice a day. And we hope the bloody details—the names and places—will hit the people in the face like a wet towel and cause at least some to ease up on the accelerator, stay out from behind the wheel when they're drinking, and be extra careful in every way."

Five High School Seniors Enter National Science Talent Search

Preliminary examinations in connection with the Eighth Annual Science Talent Search were held last week under the supervision of Miss Loretta Morris.

Students taking the science aptitude test were Evelyn Ward, Don Butler, J. C. Burke, Johnny Collins and Margil Wadley.

The Science Talent Search for the Westinghouse Science Scholarships is conducted annually by Science Clubs of America, administered by Science Service. The purpose of the Search is to discover and foster the education of boys and girls with skill, talent, and creative originality in science.

Forty boys and girls who lead in the preliminary examinations will be given all-expenses-paid trips to Washington to attend the Science Talent Institute for five days early next spring and take the final examinations for the scholarships. One contestant will be selected by a board of judges to receive a Westinghouse Grand Science Scholarship of \$2,800 (\$700 per year for four years.) One other contestant will receive a Westinghouse Grand Science Scholarship of \$2,000 (\$500 per year for four years.) Eight more contestants will receive Westinghouse Scholarships for \$400 (\$100 a year for four years) and \$3,000 additional in Scholarships will be awarded.

As part of the preliminary examinations, each contestant must submit an essay of about 1,000 words on the subject "My Scientific Project." You may have seen these seniors experimenting in the chemistry laboratory.

Jester Says Tideland Issue Being Clouded

WICHITA, Kan., Dec. 10, (UP) — Gov. Beauford Jester of Texas today accused the federal government of throwing out a "wholly deceiving smoke-screen" to cloud the issues of the tidelands contest, and warned that on the decision rests "the kick-off to nationalization of vital natural resources."

Jester, in a report prepared for delivery at the annual meeting of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, denounced "false and misleading propaganda emanating from some executive agencies of the federal government."

However, he forecast that a "good majority of both the House and Senate" of the 81st Congress will be favorable to the states in their action "if they are armed or re-armed with the facts."

Of congressmen returning, Jester said that of those who voted on earlier tidelands legislation there are 198 who favored state ownership and 26 who voted against it.

Pre-Christmas Sales Show Slump

DALLAS, Dec. 10, (UP)—Pre-Christmas sales at 19 department stores in four major Texas cities averaged four per cent lower last week than for the corresponding week in 1947, the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas reported today.

The percentage change for the four weeks period ending Dec. 4 compared with a similar period last year was down seven per cent.

Dallas sales for the week were off six per cent compared with a year ago, San Antonio off four per cent, Fort Worth down three per cent and Houston sales off less than one-half per cent. The Dallas report was from seven firms.

Fort Worth showed the greatest decline for the four weeks

Warns Against Delay In Mailing Xmas Parcels

With the normal mail volume at an all-time high, Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson today warned Christmas mailers that unless they mail their Christmas parcels at once and their Christmas cards well in advance of Christmas Week that they face the likelihood of not having them delivered until after Christmas.

Directing the attention of Christmas mailers to the fact that normal mail volume in the last several months has daily reached the proportions of the peak of the Christmas period a year ago, the Postmaster General said that this year's Christmas mail, added to the present everyday record, has created the most acute mail congestion and transportation problem in the entire history of the Postal Service.

Only by the immediate mailing of Christmas parcels, Mr. Donaldson said, can the senders be assured that their gifts will arrive
