AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 24, (UP) -Measles have set a new record in Texas for 1948, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, announced today.

Cox said that the number of reported cases exceeded that of any previous year, and the number being reported each week continues to climb.

So far this year, there have been 50,229 cases reported in the

Based on the records of the last seven years, the average number of cases reported during the last week was 51. However, reports to to the state department of health totaled 712.

### Sailor Burned Up Over Car Blow-Up

COLUMBUS, O. Dec. 24 (UP) Beryl Smith, a sailor stationed at the Port Columbus Naval Air Station here, thinks there may be something to the old saying: "You can get too much of a good thing.

Smith thought his 1936 model automobile needed some pep so he filled the gas tank with 110 octane gas the Navy uses for its powerful fighter planes.

### **Building Permits** In 14% Decrease

AUSTIN, Dec. 24 (UP)—Building permits issued in 53 Texas cities during November were down 14 per cent from the same period a year ago, but up six per cent from October, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported.

While permits issued in all 53 cities totalled \$30,829,734, Houston led individual cities with permits totaling \$7,663,925. The Bayou City was followed by Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Wark.

From the heat trap built into the south side of Dr. Telkes' house, the solar warmth is conducted to a series of "heat bins."

Each bin contains an inexpensive chemical compound known as sodium sulfate dekahydrate. When the chemical is warmed, it melts and absorbs heat. When it solidifies, it releases the heat.

A thermostatic control system is connected to each bin which in turn is hooked up to warm air registers. When the thermostat is adjusted to raise the house temperature, stored heat is released from the chemical and wafted into the rooms via the registers.

### THE STORY OF THE WHITE HOUSE AS **REVEALED IN LETTERS TO ARCHITECT**

Truman family's lease on the White House for 4 more years the landlord is going to fix up the place. At that time a Kilkenny Irishman named James Hoban, who in 1792 had won a \$500 prize contest for designing the presidential residence, was on hand to supervise the work. Born in Ireland 190 years ago (1758), Hoban came here in his youth and became the leading American architect of his time.

Letters written to the young architect, along with letters received by and written by a special commission appointed by President Washington to choose a site and design for the President's house, reveal in detail the problems of construction, as well as the untidy conditions that characterized life in Washingon at that time.

President Washington himself ook an interest in young Hoban when the latter apepared before him armed with letters of recommendation from mutual friends. In a letter to the Comm-

sion, Washington wrote: "The bearer of this, Mr. James Hoban, was strongly recommended to me . . . as a person who had made architecture his study and was sualified, not only for planning or designing buildings, but to superintendend the execution of them . . . He informs me that he intends to produce plans . . and is now on his way to view the ground on which



Members of the Commission were Daniel Carroll, a wealthy Maryland land-owner: Dr. Davis Stuart, a relative of Martha Washington and Thomas Johnson, the first Governor of Maryland. By the spring of 1814, during the second term of Madison, the White House had come to represent the best architectural taste in America. A New England girl described it in a letter to her family

"Passing over a mile of rough road, bordered here and there by Congress boarding houses, with veritable swamps between, you come to the President's House—white architecture, upholstery, gilding and paints, set down in the midst of rough unornamented grounds."

Later that same year, the British invaded Washington. While waiting to leave her beatuiful home and with the Amercan troops in retreat, Dolly Madison calmly sat down to write a letter to her sister describing the confusion, the nearby sound of cannon and her fears for her absent husband. The next day (August 24, 1814) the British set fire to the Capitol and the White House.

James Hoban was living in Washington, and as soon as the Americans had rid themselves of their British vsitors he was called in to nspect the charred ruins. He found the vaulting and floors in good condition, the columns and

Because Hoban had ordered the charred brownstones painted white to conceal the ravages of fire, the President's residence thereafter was known as the White House.

Hoban-was chosen a member of Washington City Council when the city was incorporated in 1802. He lived there until his death on December 8, 1831.

In 1848, gas was installed in the White House, and during the Harrison adminstration (1889-1993), it was wired for electricity. The structure was extensively repaired, and weakened construction replaced, in 1902. Heating and air conditioning units have been added since.

PHILADELPHIA, (UP) The paint brush industry in the United States is feeling pinch of the civil war in China.

Fighting in the north of China has diminished greatly the supply of prime bristles from which the brushes are made, the American Brush Manfacturers Association reports. Some 50 per cent of the bristles used by the industry come from Tientsin, Tsingtao and Manchuria.

Industry spokesmen here said the slim supply of bristles may compel a return to the manfac ture of the brush made during Wrold War II. The bristle content of those brushes could not ex-ceed 50 per cent. Of that, 45 per cent was horsehair. Most of the horsehair came frm Canada, the U. S. and the Argentine.
