Nobles Test Well Blows In Gusher

Operations at the J. J. Lynn No. 1 Tom Nobles well, which came in as a gusher unexpectedly Friday of last week, were at a standstill this week because of bad weather and lack of materials.

The well, about three miles west of Eastland and a half mile south of the Eastland-Cisco highway, was bottomed at 3164 feet, and the tools were out of the open hole following an unsuccessful drillstem test, when the well blew in.

The oil, pushed by strong gas pressure, blew over the top of the derrick for several hours before the hole bridged and the well shut itself down.

The formation was believed to be the Lake Sand, although that was not certain.

Lynn, of Kansas City, Mo., had undertaken to drill to the Mississippi, and had not expected to hit commercial pay in any quantity much sooner, since old wells nearby had been pumping from the upper pay strata for many years.

The find brought a flurry of lease excitement.

The oil from the well blew over an area hundreds of yards wide near the well, creating a messy situation.

1948 Rainfall Here Only 13.09 Inches

Eastland's rainfall during 1948 was 13.09 inches, or only slightly more than half the normal for a year here, J. A. Beard, official U. S. weather observer, said Thursday.

The rain scarcity was worse on crops and underground and surface water supplies because the year before had been a dry one also, compared to the average, Beard said.

About 18 inches of rain fell in 1947.

Several months during 1948 produced no measurable precipitation and a number of others had only enough to measure.

The semi-desert areas of far West Texas close to El Paso have an average annual rainfall of about nine inches, which shows how nearly the 1948 total rainfall came to putting Eastland County in the desert class.

March Of Dimes Campaign Begun

Eastland's March of Dimes campaign will begin officially Friday, along with that in the rest of the nation, but the local committee, headed by Mrs. Juanita Hickman, has stolen a march on a lot of others by raising over \$500 before the opening of the official drive.

Mrs. Hickman announced this week that the drive in Eastland will be climaxed by a March of Dimes benefit dance in the American Legion Hall Friday, Jan. 28. Tickets for the dance are on sale, she said, at \$1 per person.

The money already raised in Eastland is more than the total contributed during last year's March of Dimes campaign, but there is a good reason.

Last year's costs to the county chapter of handling paralysis cases in Eastland County was the highest in history, and the chapter wound up the year with a \$1500 deficit.

Mrs. Hickman said that Eastland needs to raise another \$900 or more to meet its share of putting the county chapter on a reasonably sound financial basis for meeting future needs.

King And Rucker Open New Office

James H. King and J. Ross Rucker this week announced the opening of their office as public accountants, located at 204 West Main Street with the Production Credit Association office.

King, a graduate of the University of Chicago, has been a public accountant for 10 years, and since he returned from Navy service in 1945, has maintained an office in Ranger, which he will continue to operate.

Rucker, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Rucker of Santo, came to Eastland in 1946 after serving three years in the Navy.

He was associated with the Eastland County Vocational School at that time as an instructor of vocational agriculture at Gorman. Later he was employed for nine months by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, in Georgia and Louisiana. He returned to Eastland in the spring of 1948 and took over the class of distributive education with the Eastland County Vocational School.

He is a 1943 graduate of the Texas A. & M. College, and has taken work toward a Master's degree.

He is a member of the Eastland Lions Club, Delta Psi Omega, and is president of the Young Adult Class of the First Methodist Church. He lives with the Homer Smith family at 400 South Hillcrest.

Dr. Brown Named Health Officer For Eastland County

Dr. L. C. Brown of Eastland Monday was appointed county health officer of Eastland County by members of the County Commissioners Court.

He succeeds the late Dr. F. T. Isbell, who had held the post for 20 years until his recent death. The appointment is for two years and became effective as of Jan. 1. Salary is \$65 per month.

Dr. Brown, health officer for the city of Eastland for more than 10 years, will continue in that position.

He has been a resident of Eastland since 1919, and was active in the practice of medicine for some years before that time.

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Utility Lines Still Down In Vicinity; More Rain Forecast

Eastland County, apparently the center of one of the worst ice storms in the history of Texas, shed its glittering coat in the general thaw Thursday, but headaches created by the storm were still around.

Utility lines still were down in many places; several persons in Eastland injured in falls on the ice were recovering; broken tree limbs were strewn over the town and countryside; it would take weeks for some of the damage to be repaired.

But there was a brighter side to the picture, too. The .55 inch of moisture the storm brought had a beneficial effect on drought-ridden farms and ranches, and was a lifesaver for small grains and winter cover crops.

And there was a forecast that Thursday night's drizzle would turn into rain Friday.

City Manager Earl O'Brien was doubtful that the ice storm had added an appreciable amount of water to the Lake Eastland level. It would take a good, hard rain to do that, he said.

Casualties of the storm in Eastland included:

Mrs. E. M. Grimes, who slipped and fell Monday, the first day of icing conditions, and broke her wrist.

W. C. Bagley, 70, who lives in an apartment in the Rust Building, who suffered a severe hip fracture when he fell on the ice Tuesday on the sidewalk on the west side of the square. He was reported to be doing "pretty well" Thursday at West Texas Hospital in Ranger.

W. A. Cathey, 607 South Daugherty, employee of the Eastland Bakery, who slipped and fell Wednesday while making his route. He was still in bed Wednesday, with a very sore side, but doctors had not determined extent of his injuries.

The storm brought with it the coldest temperature reading of the season in Eastland, a frigid 10 degrees Wednesday morning.

Sunday's low was a warm 49, followed by 20 on Monday, 19 on Tuesday, 10 on Wednesday and 21 on Thursday.

The figures were compiled by U. S. Weatherman J. A. Beard.

There were no serious accidents reported on Eastland streets because of the slippery road conditions, but over the county there were numerous mishaps, and one five-way auto collision west of Cisco resulted in serious injuries to one person.

All wire facilities between the towns of Eastland County and the rest of the world, including telephone and telegraph, were suspended for a day or more as the heavy ice snapped wires.

The communications facilities were far short of normal Thursday.

More wire of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company was down within a 15-mile radius of Eastland than anywhere else in the state, indicating that this was almost the dead center of the worst icing conditions in a storm that covered almost all of Texas and parts of several other states.

Rural electric and telephone customers almost all were without service, and utility officials and employees, many with two or more sleepless nights behind them, continued their weary way trying to restore service.

Schools, closed in other nearby towns because of the heavy icing conditions, remained open in Eastland, and school officials reported nearly normal attendance.

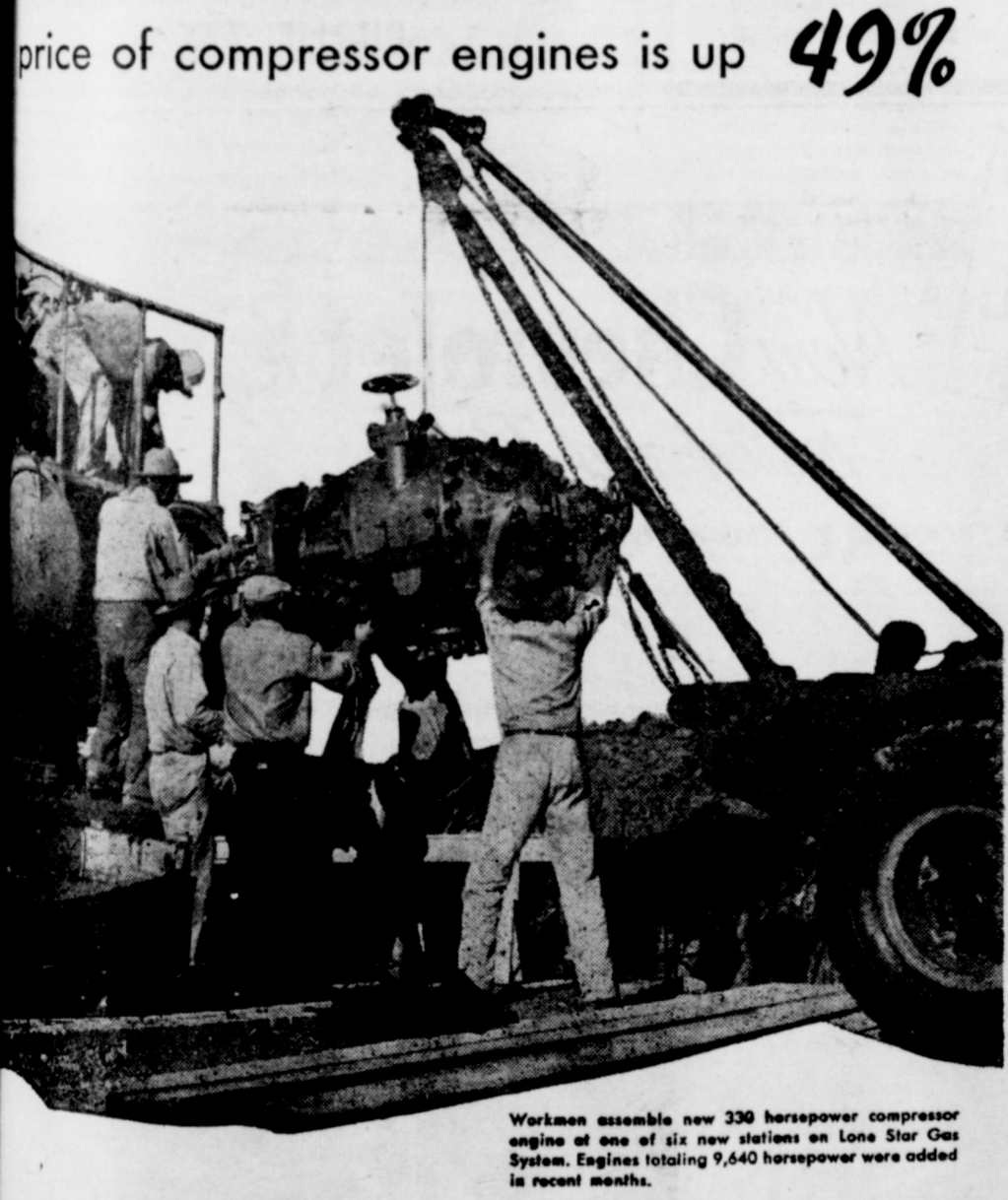

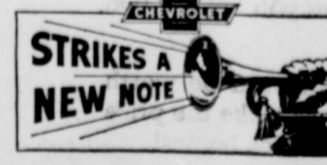
