Eastland County, apparently the center of one of the worst ice storms in the history of Texas, shed its glittering coat in the general thaw Thursday, but headaches created by the storm were still around.

Utility lines still were down in many places; several persons in Eastland injured in falls on the ce were recovering; broken tree limbs were strewn over the town and countryside; it would take weeks for some of the damage to be repaired.



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

The dinner was followed that afternoon by an open house, at which a number of the couple's Dallas friends called.


