City Manager Harl O'Brien said Thursday that about two inches of runoff water had been measured at the lake after Monday's heavy rain before freezing weather stopped the runoff.

Whether most of the sleet that fell subsequently would melt into the already wet ground or go into the lake remained to be seen.

The storm, which carried tem peratures in Eastland to a 10-degree low Tuesday morning, started with a 1.05 inch rain Monday, and continued with icy rain and sleet into Wednesday. Weatherman J. A. Beard recorded three inches of sleet and freezing rain, but said he had not melted the precipitation to determine its moisture
