Well, it seems as though the long drought has been broken. The moisture has been fine to help the pastures, and the farmers have a good season now to prepare the soil for another crop. The ranchers and farmers will be greatly benefited by the moisture, and of course it is a great benefit to everyone. However the cold weather has done a lot of damage.

In this locality, we were without electricity for several hours at different times during the bad weather for the past three weeks. Most of the time the men were kept busy feeding the livestock and keeping the fires burning.

Some in the community have installed butane systems, however, a great number use wood for fuel, and the wood fires were really fine during the cold weather. When we were without electricity, we used our kerosene lamps. The cold helped out on refrigeration, but as it was most cold for washing or ironing; the radios were the most missed during the time that the current was off.

There are only a few in the community who have telephones. Perhaps it won't be long until many more can have them. There is talk of a line being built out of Ranger through Staff, though some had rather a line be built out of Eastland. We are hoping that someone will see fit to build a line out of Eastland and also a better road as most of the residents here seem to prefer East-

land as a trading center.

Staff is located in one of the best farming sections of Eastland County and most of the Staff residents have nice modern homes, so it seems that a good farm to market road is the thing we need most just at this time.

There are two rural mail carriers out of Eastland through this community and three rural schools running busses into Staff. As parts of the roads are impassable during such weather, it is easily seen what a great benefit a better road system would be.

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

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
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News Items From CHEANEY




