Dr. Payne Named City Health Officer; Election Date Set

Dr. T. E. Payne, veteran Eastland physician, was appointed city health officer at a meeting of the Eastland City Commission Thursday night of last week.

Dr. Payne succeeded Dr. L. C. Brown, who resigned because of his recent appointment as county health officer.

Under state law, Dr. Brown is barred from holding both a city and county appointment at the same time.

Dr. Brown had held the city health position for many years.

The commission in the same meeting also ordered a city election to be held Tuesday, April 5, for naming three members of the commission.

Members whose terms will expire are Mayor Dan Childress, C. G. Uffelman and A. J. Blevins, Jr. Holdover members whose terms have another year to run are W. W. Linkenhogger and Herman Rushing.

Members of the commission at the meeting also discussed other city business, including a proposal to extend the city limits, without taking action.

All members were present except Blevins, who was ill.

Lions Hear Talk On Hot Check Artists

How hot checks are passed and how to keep from taking them was discussed before the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff Cotton Graham.

Graham, presented by Program Chairman G. A. Plummer, said the office of Sheriff J. B. Williams is more plagued by hot check passers than by any other criminal offense.

Members of the Club, most of them businessmen with check taking problems of their own, fired questions at Graham freely, and discussed the matter from personal experience.

Bob Vaughan said that his experience had been that the biggest swindlers in the hot check line always had lots of personal identification, so that he had become more wary of the man who identifies himself too readily and thoroughly than of the man who has little identification.

Thomas Presley Ledbetter was born June 19, 1887, at Gainesville, Ark., and came with his parents to Schanton a few years later. He had lived in Scranton and Cisco since then.

Poll Tax Payments Reach 4153 Total

Poll tax payments in Eastland County before the deadline Jan. 31 totalled 4153, or about 3000 less than the total a year ago, County Tax Assessor-Collector Neil Day said this week.

The figure also is the lowest since the end of the war, reflecting the general financial slowing down evident in this area recently.

Last year's poll tax payments totalled about 7000, but there was a general election and national presidential election to spur payment then.

The year before, when there was a situation comparable to this year, the payments totalled 5488, or more than 1300 above the 1949 figure.

Two-Man Gang Hit Ranger, Too

At least no Eastland County town was among those visited on a crime tour by Curtis Lee Bagwill, 17-year-old Texas youth held in connection with the hold-up slaying of Crockett Ross, Stephenville filling station operator, Jan. 28.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said the youth had listed Ranger as one of the scores of towns in which he pulled burglary jobs. Three homes in Ranger were looted, including that of Dr. M. P. Kuykendall.

The youth had been initiated into a life of crime by his uncle, Dan White, who drove a turee surgery truck, and usually waited nearby in a get-away car while his young nephew pulled the burglaries and hold-ups.

Sheriff Williams said he believes Bagwill and White are responsible for two or more unsolved burglaries in Cisco.

The pair admitted after their arrest in Vernon that they could not remember all the towns in which they had performed crimes, there were so many.

Jess Noble Passes; Services Pending

Funeral services were pending late Thursday for J. L. (Jess) Noble, pioneer resident of Eastland County who died Thursday morning in the Graham Hospital in Cisco.

Mr. Noble had just been taken to the Cisco hospital from a Fort Worth hospital, where he had been under treatment for two weeks or more.

For many years Mr. Noble was a farmer between Cisco and Mangum.

Final Services Held For Mrs. Davis

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church Monday afternoon for Mrs. Arthur Davis, who died Saturday, Feb. 5 at Brownwood, where she had made her home for many years. She was 77.

Survivors included an only brother, F. C. Williamson of the Staff community. Mrs. Davis was a former resident of Eastland County.

Baptists Raise \$6300 In Building Fund

A special building fund offering at the First Baptist Church Sunday night brought the fund to a total of \$6300, with \$3700 to be raised by March 1 to reach the \$10,000 goal set for that deadline.

The church had voted to raise the \$10,000 before beginning a re-decoration and repairs program.

100 At Meeting To Mark Opening Of Dairy Program

Exactly 100 farmers, dairymen, businessmen, and other interested persons Monday night attended a celebration meeting of the Eastland County Dairy Association, and heard the association praised as having gotten off to a flying start.

The celebration was occasioned by the fact that on Tuesday, the following day, the association's two technicians, Harry Crow and Bernard Campbell, both of Carbon, began the organization's artificial insemination program. The beginning of the program had been the goal of the group since the association was organized.

Meeting in the annex of the First Christian Church in Eastland, the 100 men heard Dr. David Smokley of the North Texas Artificial Breeding Farms at Dallas explain the technique of artificial breeding, and answer questions as they were fired at him by the interested audience.

Details of the breeding program in Eastland County also were explained.

Crow and Campbell said that they must be called by 11 a. m. on any day if they are to render artificial breeding service on that day.

They each are serving part time as technicians, and will continue farming operations at Carbon at the same time.

Dr. Smokley said that the county association here is quite unusual in his experience in that it has money in the till as it begins the breeding program. The association collected \$1 for each cow signed up under the program, and about 500 cows were signed up for service.

Dr. Smokley said that there have been scoffers about the artificial breeding program ever since it started in Texas, but that so far the fine calves sired by the nine high-grade registered bulls at the Dallas farm have proved the value of the program.

President A. Z. Myrick of the association said that the program was being started with a relatively small number of cows, but that he felt confident the number will be doubled or more during the first year.

Coffee, prepared by Dave Fieny, and doughnuts were served by courtesy of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Nearly 30 prizes were given at a drawing, with the prizes given by merchants of Eastland County.

Future Of Industry In Area To Be Topic For Discussion

What Eastland and Eastland County should be doing about their economic future will be discussed at a meeting in the 88th District Courtroom at 10 a. m. Tuesday.

The meeting, which was to have been held earlier but was postponed because of bad weather, will be attended by officials of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and of the Texas & Pacific Railway. Basis for discussion will be a recent economic survey of this area conducted by the railroad and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas.

One of the purposes of the survey was to find natural resources and economic and labor factors along the railroad which would encourage industry to move into this area more strongly.

Eastland County business and professional men will find the meeting extremely interesting, in that a picture of Eastland County that has never been presented before, with figures to back up the picture, will be given, said H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, which will help sponsor the meeting and which co-operated in obtaining the survey figures.

Among those attending the meeting will be J. J. Finegan, assistant to the president of the Texas & Pacific; Dr. Robert French of the Texas U. Bureau of Business Research; and D. A. Bantzen and Max Bentley of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Alleged Forger Held In Breckenridge Jail

A 26-year-old man identified by Eastland County officers as Robert A. Chick, wanted in Eastland County since 1947 on two or more grand jury indictments for forgery, is being held in jail at Breckenridge.

Chick, it was said, is wanted in many towns in several states. He was arrested Jan. 1 in Las Vegas, Nev. and is being taken by officers to various towns where he is believed to have committed crimes, so his purported victims may have a chance to identify him.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said Thursday that Eastland merchants who had been swindled on forged checks believed passed by Chick would go to Breckenridge in an attempt to identify him.






