47,040 Acres May **Be Planted Under** 

Eastland County farmers may plant 47,040 acres to peanuts the coming season without penalty unred the government's allotment program, a considerably larger acre total than had been anticipated, AAA Administrator Em-

Since only about 54,000 acres were planted last year in the county to peanuts, the decline will not be too great, and farmers are accepting their individual acreage cuts in good grace, Pow-

ell said The 1949 peanut acreage allotment program is the first since the war.
