## 1949 Dodge Car Known By McGraw

The 1949 Dodge car, completely redesigned from front bumper to back will be on display Friday in the showroom of the McGraw Motor Company on South Seaman Street in Eastland.

The new Dodge was described by E. McGraw, owner of the motor, as being shorter in over-length, but with a longer wheelbase, lower from road to top, but more inside headroom; with narrower outside silhouettes, but much wider seats.

The body and chassis engineering features were accompanied, McGraw pointed out, by an increase in engine power and greatly improved riding qualities.

## Wednesday Rain Totals 1 1/2 Inches; Crop Outlook Good

An inch and a half rainfall in Eastland Wednesday, added to the good moisture already in the ground, apparently assured a good planting season for summer crops, and good early pastures for livestock.

J. A. Beard, U. S. weather observer, said that Wednesday's rain brought the year's moisture total in Eastland to 5.46 inches. The total is the most here in many years to this date.

The slow, steady rain this week did little, however, to brighten the outlook for city water supply in Eastland. A measurement at Lake Eastland Thursday morning by Al LeClaire of the city water department, showed the lake level is almost the same as it was five weeks ago, when it was the lowest in several years.

The measurement indicated that the city had been using water at just about the same rate that the rain, sleet and snow had been putting it into the lake.

The moisture's benefit to farmers and ranchers could not be valued in terms of money—it had been too long since there was a similar amount of moisture in the ground at this time of year.

Small grain fields were greening, and the warm weather of the past few weeks was bringing out grass in the pastures.

Fruit buds were swelling, and orchardists were hoping for some colder weather to prevent too early blooming of their fruit trees.

Farmers had begun spring plowing before Wednesday's rain, and were delayed by it, but were glad of the delay—it was the best February rain most of them had seen in three or four years.

An onion chopper that eliminates "weeping" eyes, a one-handed egg beater that doubles as a cream whipper and as gray delumper will be among the kitchen gadgets demonstrated by Miss Julia Hunter of Dallas, home economics director for the Lone Star Gas Company, at a tea to be held Tuesday sponsored by the South Ward P.-T.A.

The demonstration will begin at 3:30 p. m. in the Womens Club and will be open to the public.

Other gadgets to be demonstrated by Miss Hunter, which have been bought from dime stores, department stores, and mail order houses, include an egg separator, vegetable slicer, food grater, and thermometers for candy and jelly making, deep fat cooking, and meat cooking. Items range in price from 10 cents to \$3.50, with the average cost about \$1.

Cookbooks which the South Ward P.-T.A. published recently will be sold at the meeting.

## Crime On Downgrade, Judge Tells Grand Jurors

### Report Is Given On City's Affairs

(Editor's note: The following report on the affairs of the City of Eastland was prepared by Mayor Dan Childress and presented to The Record to publish as an official statement. It is hereby published as such.)

### CITY COMMISSION'S OFFICIAL REPORT As Of February 1st, 1949.

On April 4th, 1947, when a majority of your present commission took over the affairs of our city we found that the General Fund had a balance in our local bank of less than \$200.00 to its credit and that the Water and Sewer Fund was approximately \$2000.00 in the red, and beginning with this condition your commission has accomplished the following, viz:

Paying off a debt inherited by a former commission of \$4600.00 for a trash wagon which you now see on the streets.

The water treating plant had become obsolete, inadequate and we think unsanitary. We proceeded to rebuild it from the ground up with a new concrete and Haydite Block building and equipped it with the latest and most modern equipment at a cost of \$4500.00.

On solicitation of the officers of the fire department we found that their recommendation for an additional fire hose should be granted as the old hose had become unsafe for use. This improvement cost \$1500.00.

The City Managers Official automobile was several years old requiring much repairing and in order to get away from this expense we advertised the Old Black Sedan for sale to the highest bidder and sold it at a price of \$425.00 making a saving to the people of approximately \$600.00 per year on this item. The present City Manager furnishes his own car and is employed at the same salary.

We found that the policemen's car was likewise old and rather expensive to keep in repairs and it was traded in on a New Ford at a cost of \$750.00.

Two new motor driven mowing machines to replace the old one at the City Cemetery which makes that service more efficient at a cost of over \$300.00.

At the city park we have replaced new canvas over our swimming pool and made other necessary repairs there for the comfort and conveniences of the public, at a cost of about \$300.00, and in doing so the price of admission to the patrons has remained the same as before making these improvements.

The Public Library has had our wholehearted support and though we were short on finances we carried on the usual appropriation for its benefit at a cost of \$300.00 per year.

Your city commission has lent all the aid possible to our local school board in that we have remitted all sewer charges chargeable to our public schools during the summer months which results in quite a saving to the schools.

We have reduced the office help at the city hall during the past year \$260.00 per month which makes a saving to our people of \$3020.00 per year and we are having no complaint now as to the service rendered.

Our city is only supporting four paid policemen against Cisco's Six and Ranger Six or more.

In cooperation with our local Chamber of Commerce we have been able to erect what we think permanent street signs on some of our principle streets, which cost about \$300.00.

Your commission has been diligent in looking orward with an anticipation of a bigger and a more adequate water supply and have recently developed what we think will supplement our present supply of water some One Hundred Thousand gallons of pure water per day and this cost less than \$300.00.

MONEY. Our present bank balance as of February 1st, 1949 was as follows: Water and Sewer \$5900.00. General fund \$10,462.16 and in addition to this balance we retired approximately \$40,000.00 of the city's bonded indebtedness. All the city's bills are paid

## Fire Escape Bought For Eastland High

The board of the Eastland independent schools has bought a used fire escape in Fort Worth and will install it soon on the Eastland High School building to meet a long-felt demand, members of the board said this week.

Purchase of the used fire escape came through vigilant reading of classified ads by Robert Vaughan, board member, who spotted the ad in a Fort Worth paper.

The three-story fire escape was purchased for \$200, and it was estimated that installation and alterations will cost another \$200 to \$300.

So serious has been the lack of a fire escape at the school that the State Department of Education has threatened to drop the accrediting of the local high school until an escape was installed.

Also, the fire marshal has been on the board's trail to furnish the students of the school some way of escape in case of fire.

A major purpose of an election to increase school taxes, called by the board a year ago, was to raise funds with which to provide fire escapes at the high school and junior high buildings. But the increase was voted down, and the board remained without funds until Vaughan spotted the second hand bargain fire escape.

It is planned to install the fire escape at the rear of the high school building, with access to it from windows on stairways of the structure.

Vaughan pointed out that this is far from an ideal arrangement, but that there seems to be no other place on the building where it would be practical to put the escape.

The junior high building, which has only two stories as compared with three in the high school structure, still will be left without a fire escape, but perhaps Vaughan will keep on reading the classifieds and that will be remedied some day too.

## \$26,136 Damage Suit Brought In 91st Court

A suit for \$26,136.45 in damages has been filed in 91st District Court by J. W. Lovell against O. D. Dillingham, doing business as the Banner Ice Cream Company.

Lovell, an elderly man, alleges in his petition that on December 10 last he was attempting to cross an Eastland street when he was struck by a truck driven by an employe of Dillingham's and received personal injuries for which he asked \$25,000. Medical, surgical and hospital costs asked in the suit total \$1,136.45.

Eastland-reared W. A. (Bill) Leslie who recently almost made good as a Kentucky coal mine operator, has purchased and assumed operation of the Bradshaw Grocery in the 600 block of West Commerce Street.

Leslie said he will re-stock the store and maintain longer daily hours, from 7:30 a. m. to 8 p. m. The store also will be open Sundays.

Before the war, Leslie worked for the Pipkin Grocery Company and was manager at Olney when he entered the Army. He served as a captain in the South Pacific during the war, and on his return was made manager of the Pipkin Piggly-Wiggly store in Eastland.

He resigned that job a little over a year ago to go to Kentucky to open a coal mine on property owned by his family.

The mine, located near Langley, Ky., was a success, Leslie said, and would be operating at a profit yet had not the supply of coal in the United States suddenly caught up with demand, and his market vanished.

Leslie shut down the mine a few weeks ago, returned to Eastland, and got back into the grocery business.

## Group Investigates Cisco Shooting, Takes No Action

Crime conditions, especially those pertaining to juvenile delinquency, are improving in Eastland county and perhaps over the state as a whole, Judge George L. Avenport said Monday in charging the Eastland county grand jury. There still is too much law violation, however, he said.

Judge Davenport charged the jury, empaneled at 9:30 Monday morning, on law violations in general and on murder, assault with intent to murder, forgery, burglary, swindling by check and violations of the statutes on weights and measures, in particular.

The grand jury investigated a number of matters before recessing until March 10. Three true bills were returned, one of which was against L. F. Marshall, charged on a number of complaints with swindling by use of checks. Some of the checks complained about were cashed by Eastland merchants. Merchants and others cashing checks were admonished by the court to be more particular about such transactions.

A murder charge against Mrs. Myrtle Miller, 38, of Cisco, charged with shooting and killing her husband, Bruce Miller, 45, Humble Pipe Line Company engineer, Saturday evening at the couple's home in Cisco, was investigated by the grand jury, but action on the matter was passed to a future date. A number of witnesses testified but Mrs. Miller, herself, did not appear because of her hysterical condition.

According to District Attorney, Everett Grisham, Miller was shot with a 38 calibre pistol. The shooting occurred after the couple had returned from Breckenridge. "He wanted to go to town to get some liquor. Mrs. Miller told a neighbor, Mrs. Kimmell. "I tried to dissuade him but he grew angry and started to the bedroom to get the gun, but I beat him to it."

Pearson Grimes was named foreman.

## Last Rites Held For Father Of Mrs. Perkins

Funeral services were held Saturday in Colorado City at the First Baptist Church for the father of Mrs. Robert Perkins, Joe H. Smoot, who died at his home Friday after an illness of several months.

Smoot, 57, had been executive vice-president of Colorado City's only bank since 1939. He had been a deacon and had served as finance chairman since 1931 of the First Baptist Church. He was an ex-president of the Colorado City Lions Club, Country Club and was treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce.

Recently he was one of the committeemen who drew up the newly adopted charter for Colorado City and had been serving as secretary to the Colorado River Municipal Water Association.

Mrs. Perkins, who has been in Colorado City for several weeks, will remain for a time with her mother.

Attending the funeral from Eastland were Robert Perkins and Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins. They were accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. C. Keith Beyette of Fort Worth.






