Dairy Association Officers Re-elected Session Here

Officers of the Eastland County Dairy Association, who in a few months have guided the group into a successful beginning of an artificial dairy breeding program in Eastland County, were re-elected overwhelmingly Monday night when the association began its new year.

Officers are A. Z. Myrick of Gorman, president, Harry Crow of Carbon, vice-president, and L. R. Higginbottom of Carbon, secretary and treasurer.

Crow, one of the technicians under the breeding program, reported that during a little less than three weeks of the program, 133 cows had been bred artificially in Eastland County.

This would represent an average of nearly 20 cows per week, at the rate of 1,000 cows per year, although Higginbottom reported that the association has received the \$1 signing up fee for 459 cows.

Crow said that he and Bernard Campbell, the other technician, decided to put up the time they will receive calls to 12 noon, the deadline for breeding calls being 11 a. m.

The technicians' number is 133-Carbon. They may be called by cow owners whose cows are signed up for the program and are ready to be bred.

Members of the association at a meeting in Eastland Monday decided to defer the election of officers until the next meeting, to be in Eastland the last Monday of March.

Myrick appointed committees to work on the annual Eastland County Dairy Show, to be held in Eastland Friday, April 15. Those at the meeting were in a film on brucellosis, or blue disease.

Mrs. E. A. Peck, who formerly lived in Eastland but moved on to hotter climes—no, it's not what you might think, she just moved to Eagle Pass—writes to renew her subscription to The Record and adds the following comments:

"You know we are having lots of fun down here, especially missing your ice and snow, but for some reason it's still nice to read about the people we moved away from."

"I wish more people would take a personal interest in getting news to their respective local reporters. (E. Note: We do, too, Mrs. Peck; we do, too.)"

"Tell our friends we are building a house in the country now—if they will come to see us we will have plenty of room, if we have to make pallets."

"Good luck to all of you guys."

As this is written, no candidates have appeared over the horizon to run for the three places on the Eastland City Commission to be filled April 6, and a noticeable aversion to the commission jobs was being expressed by some of our more prominent people who had been mentioned for the posts.

As far as I know, women never have served on the City Commission in Eastland, but it looks now as if some would have to be drafted, since the men are shying away from the jobs as if they were contaminated.

And it is true that in Eastland, serving on the City Commission is an unprofitable and almost a thankless job for an honest and earnest man.

The city's affairs long have been in such poor shape that no set of city officials can hope to do anything very constructive—the money just never is on hand for such things.

So one set of officials after another has figured and sweated to get enough money to perform the things they really believed needed doing, and let the frills slide. And sometime the essentials have been let slide a bit too because the money just wasn't there.

And the poor city commissioner, serving without pay and giving his time that could be spent with his business or his family, gets cussed from every side because he does or does not do something about the water problem, or extending the city limits, or fixing the city streets, or something else that is of interest at the moment.

Do you wonder that candidates hesitate to file, hoping that someone else will beat them to it so they won't feel impelled to get into the ring at all?

Jim Horton as president of the Eastland Rotary Club has shown a disdain for tradition and a desire to get things done that need doing, that is refreshing in a town where the service club members too often have asked, "How did we do it last year?" when some question came up for decision.

Horton's regime as president is notable during my period of residence in Eastland, nearly four years, and perhaps it will be notable for a long time to come. The club is adding new and young members, and is taking the initiative right away from other service organizations here, in some respects.

Frank Jones tells me he paid \$200 nearly 25 years ago for a one-sixty-fourth undivided royalty interest in a tract of land in Stephens County. Since that time the investment has been repaid many times over, although the monthly checks have gradually dwindled as the oil and gas played out.

Now new and deeper wells are being drilled successfully nearby, and Frank is getting offers again for the purchase of his interest, and he's refusing again, he says—figures he's got nothing to lose on that investment.

Rural Roads Bill Support Is Asked

Support of House Bill 59, designed to raise funds for the building of rural roads in Texas, was urged this week by County Judge P. L. Crossley, county chairman of the Texas Rural Roads Association which has endorsed the bill.

The measure would increase natural resources taxes, with the money so raised to be devoted to the rural road system of the state.

A hearing on the bill will be held in Austin before the Revenue and Taxation Committee of the House, Crossley said.

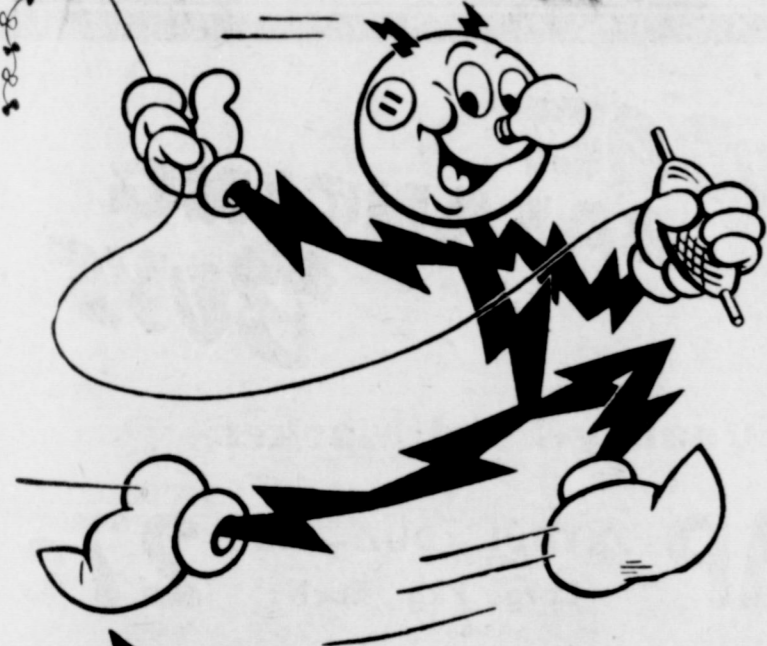
