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### Olden Pastor To Begin 7th Year In Church

Rev. Clifford Nelson began his seventh year as pastor of the Olden Baptist Church Sunday, April 17, having begun his pastorate there on the third Sunday in April in 1943.

In the six years he has been with the Olden Church there have been 139 additions, 50 by baptism, and \$18,000 has been raised for all purposes. Offerings for missions has been increased from \$84.00 per year in 1943 to \$700.00 in 1949.

During the six years he has served as pastor at Olden, Rev. Mr. Nelson has completed his seminary work at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, having graduated in May 1948, with a B. A. degree.

Plans for his seventh year as pastor calls for a revival meeting to begin Sunday, April 24, in which he will be assisted by Rev.

H. T. Connolly, who will do the preaching while Rev. Nelson will have charge of the music.

To the loyal members of his Olden congregation and to other friends in Eastland, Olden, Ranger and surrounding communities, Rev. Mr. Nelson expresses the thanks of himself and Mrs. Nelson for the many kind considerations shown them during the six years of their labor with the Church at Olden. Also they extend a hearty invitation to everyone to attend the Olden services.

Before coming to the Olden Church, Rev. Mr. Nelson pastored the Baptist Church at Okra, Pioneer, and Scranton.

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
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**Ex-Eastland County Resident Is Visitor**

**Chapter Changes Meeting Schedule**

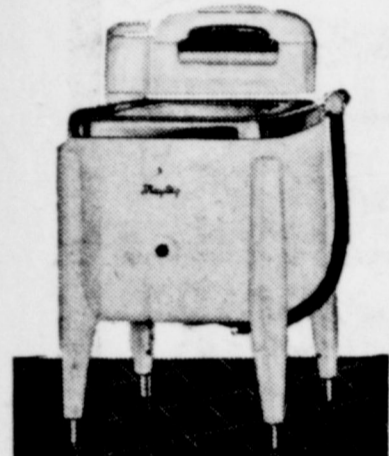
