City Manager Harl O'Brien said Thursday that the rains put between four and five inches of water in the lake. Exact measurement over a period of time is difficult, he pointed out, because the water is being drained from the lake at a present rate of about a quarter of an inch a day, at the same time new water is running in.

The rains were of great benefit to farmers and rancers, whose lands were drying up on top and forming a hard crust except in deep sandy soil.

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
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
#### **Ex-Eastland County** Resident Is Visitor
