## Sign-Up Program Is Termed Vital To Farmers, Ranchers

Extreme importance to farmers and ranchers of the present crop reporting program being conducted by his office was stressed this week by Emmett Powell of the Eastland County P. M. A. office.

Farmers are being asked to reort total acreages planted in 1945, 1946, 1947, 1948, and estimated 1949 plantings in a number of crops, including corn, cot ton, grain sorghums, and others.

Powell said his department was in dead earnest in asking for the figures, and that he had been told that farmers who fail to comply will receive no benefits under the 1949 farm program.

The program in past years has paid farmers benefits for tank and terrace building, for cover crops, and has included the farm price support program.

Powell said the acreage and production figures asked by his office will be held strictly confidential, and will not be turned over to any other branch of the government for any reason.

## Gorman Region Hit Hard As Rain Totals Six Inches

Farmers and ranchers of Eastland County were mostly in a happy frame of mind this week after their ranges and farm lands were soaked again by a series of heavy rains, but there was some comment in the Gorman area about too much of a good thing.

The rains soaked most of the agricultural lands of the county, but around Gorman they flooded and washed them. Almost six inches of rain fell there Saturday afternoon to send creeks out of their banks, flood low-lying areas and wash out terraces on farms.

Generally, farmers were satisfied with the moisture they had received and were ready for clear weather so the land would dry out enough to work.




