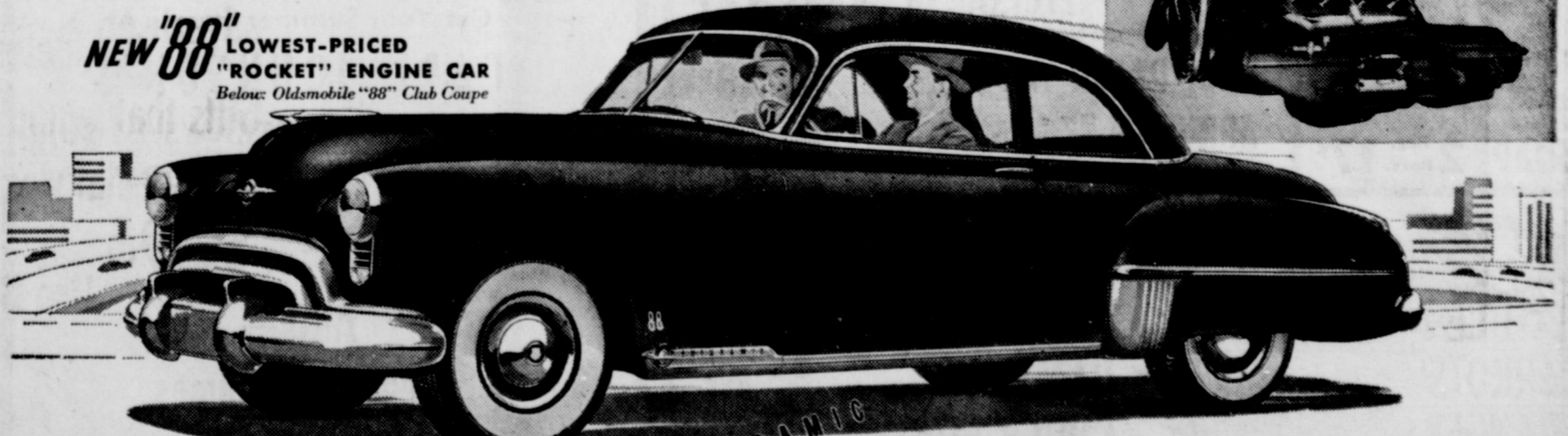

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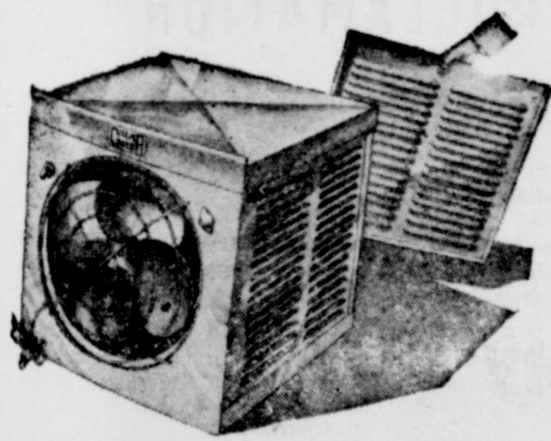

Allison, who despite his youth has already made an enviable record as a minister, is a member of the Ministerial Council, Life Service Band, and Oratorical and Debate Council at the university.

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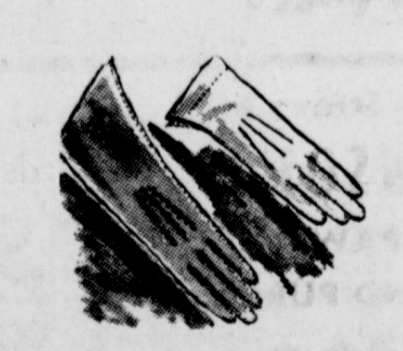

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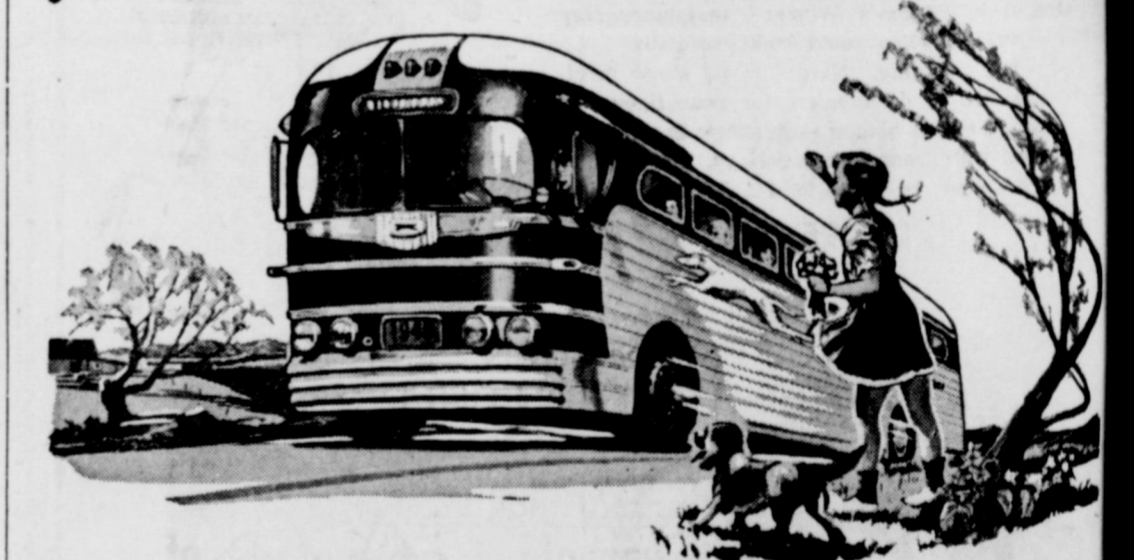
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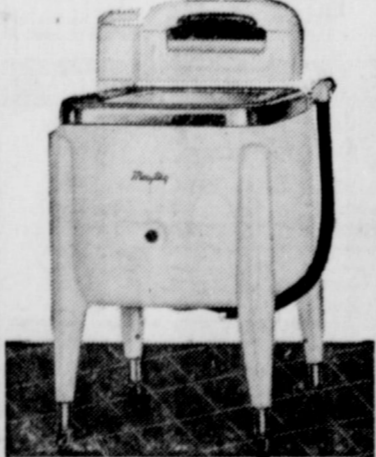
