## **Pea Aphid Threat** To Vetch Crop

The vetch crop in Eastland County, consisting of between 15. 000 and 20.000 acres, is threatened with destruction by insects, county Agricultural Agent, J. M. Cooper said this week. Conditions at present are not alarming, but could easily become so, Cooper said. Two years ago the crop was almost ruined by insects.

A survey has been made by Cooper to detirmine the extent of previous meeting. the pea aphid infestation, and so vetch, have found only small day night's meeting. quantities of them and these appeared to be doing but small damage. Since the survey started, however, a number of vetch growers have reported that they have found the insects are working but a meeting of the school board that they had not discovered them

Vetch is grown in Eastland county as a cover crop and for grazing and seed. According to Cooper, there are two insecticides that are used to kill the pea aphid. These are parathion and benzene hexa-chloride, neither of which is available in Eastland county. with more or less success in other These remedies have been used portions of the country. They are used as sprays and by dusting from the air with planes.
