## Murdocks Die In Crash Of Private Airplane Sunday; Burial Held In Virginia

Sudden death Sunday ended the promising career of a young Eastland doctor and his pretty wife when Dr. Marion Bailey Murdock, 31, and Mrs. Katherine Clay Mallory Murdock, 30, perished in the crash of their private plane near Meridian, Miss.

Probably no one will ever know exactly the time of the Murdock's death, or exactly what caused it, for there were no witnesses. Their crushed bodies and that of their pet dachshund, "Gus," were found in the wrecked Luscombe Monday morning.

Dr. Murdock's shock-proof wrist watch was stopped at 10 o'clock, but it was obvious that the accident had occurred earlier than that, because there was enough light for him to see the partly completed asphalt runway on which he was trying to land at a wartime Army field five miles from Meridian.

The plane crashed into the ground with terrific force about 200 feet from the runway.

### MRS. MURDOCK WRITING

Mrs. Murdock apparently had been writing a letter when the crash occurred, because she was grasping a pencil in her fingers when she was found.

Mr. and Mrs. Murdock came to Eastland a little less than two years ago, and for a year Dr. Murdock and Dr. R. C. Ferguson were associated in practicing medicine.

Then last July Dr. Murdock opened his own office in the Exchange Building, and friends said that in recent months the growth of his practice had been phenomenal.

He won wide acclaim from his patients as a gentle and kindly man who also was a brilliant diagnostician.

Mrs. Murdock operated a clinical laboratory in an office adjacent to her husband's office.

Doors of both offices were sealed Wednesday until relatives could come to dispose of the equipment and supplies.

Also locked and quiet was the Murdock's home at 211 South College Street, which they had purchased recently from the R. L. Perkins.

Dr. and Mrs. Murdock had attended sessions of the convention of the American Medical Association in Atlantic City, N. J., had visited their families in Richmond, Va., and were on their way home when tragedy struck.

They had flown out of Richmond Sunday morning.

The bodies were taken to Richmond, where funeral services were held Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Murdock was buried in the local cemetery in Virginia, and Mrs. Murdock was buried in the same place in Virginia. The couple had been married in New Orleans, La., and lived in New Orleans for much of his spare time in the air in recent months.

Both Dr. and Mrs. Murdock attended the Virginia Medical College at Richmond. They were married Dec. 21, 1943. They had no children.

They attended the First Presbyterian Church in Eastland.

Mrs. Murdock was a member of the Eastland Music Study Club, the Thursday Afternoon Club, the Civic League and Garden Club, and the Alpha Delphinia Club.

Dr. Murdock was a member of the Eastland Lions Club.

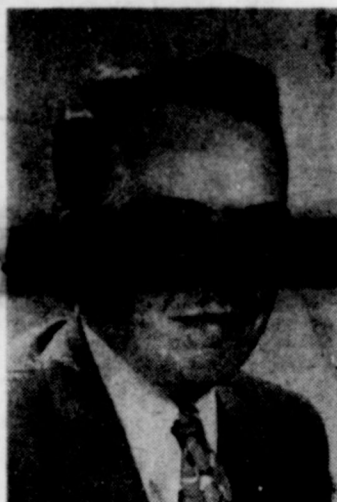
Mrs. Murdock is survived by her mother, Mrs. O. J. Mallory of Farmville, Va., who spent last winter with the Murdock's in Eastland, and by a brother, C. A. Mallory of Richmond.

Dr. Murdock was reared by an aunt, Mrs. W. L. Bailey of Richmond, who has visited the couple in Eastland. He also reportedly is survived by his father, who lives in New York City.

Dr. Murdock was an Army doctor during the war.

Friends of the Murdock's said that Mrs. Murdock disliked flying very much, but went with her husband because he wanted her to do so.

Some weeks ago the couple flew to New Orleans.

## Horned Toad Derby Date Set July 16; Meeting Is Called

Date for the first annual Eastland Horned Frog Derby was set tentatively for July 16 at a meeting of an Eastland Chamber of Commerce committee Tuesday, and a general meeting to discuss the affair was called for 8 p. m. Friday in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Invitations were sent to civic and veterans' organizations of Eastland to have representatives at the meeting to discuss which organization would do what.

It is planned to have game and refreshment booths and possibly other entertainment at the derby, which will be an evening affair.

Under present plans, the derby will be held at the Eastland softball park, Firemen's Field, with the booths outside the stands. Children's entries will be run first in a series of heats, with heat winners to compete in a run-off.

Then will come the derby events, with horned toads to be entered at a tentative \$5 each. Winner of each heat will win a prize, but must put up an additional entry fee for the derby, in which winners will receive handsome cash prizes.

More definite plans are scheduled to be made at the Friday night session.

Members of the committee which met Tuesday with Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner are L. E. McGraw, Parks Poe, W. Q. Verner and H. G. Vermillion.

Members of the committee felt the affair could become a big annual celebration in Eastland, famous as the home of Old Rip, if properly exploited.

## Pipe Is Bought For Golf Course

Seven thousand feet of two-inch pipe valued at \$1260 was bought at Breckenridge Wednesday for the new Eastland golf course being sponsored by the Eastland Quarterback Club, Don Hill, general chairman of the golf course project, said Tuesday.

Failure to find pipe with which to lay out a system for watering fairways and greens was the cause of abandoning a golf course project in Eastland about two years ago.

Hill said he and Dr. W. S. Poe planned to get out late Thursday or some time Friday to begin raising the money with which to pay for the pipe and for other necessary materials and labor for the nine-hole course.

Site of the course is close to the Lake Eastland spillway. Formerly, a golf course occupied the site, but it was abandoned some years ago.

Pumps for the water system at the course already have been obtained. Hill said one of the first construction moves will have to be a fence to keep animals off the grounds.

## His Bonnie Lay Under The Water

Jack Chamberlain was a sad man Tuesday.

### Miss Harbin Named To Represent City At Stamford Affair

Audrey Maxine Harbin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wiley Harbin, has been chosen to represent Eastland at the Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford July 1-2-4, Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner said Thursday.

Miss Harbin, a sophomore in Eastland High School, lives with her parents on their place south of town.

"She's been riding since she was five years old, and makes a fine hand with stock," said her father. She also has been a member of the Eastland Roping Club since it was founded.

She plays the clarinet in the Eastland High School Band.

She will go to Stamford complete with horse and cowgirl outfit.

## Torrential Rains Over County Cause Much Damage

Torrential rains which fell on Eastland County Monday and Tuesday created flash floods on several creeks, did great damage to the ripened grain crop, and washed out numbers of fields of peanuts.

The rains also delayed cultivation of peanut fields, and caused some farmers to say they are going to have to plow up young peanuts and replant, because the grass and weeds are too thick to cultivate out.

Many farmers have not planted peanuts because of the wet weather.

An untold amount of damage was done to the grain crops. The grain mostly was ready to harvest last week, and the heavy rains, accompanied mostly by hard winds, shattered heads and bent stalks to the ground.

A flash flood on the branch of the Leon River just south of Eastland covered lowlands and drove the Alvin Harris family from its home.

Lake Eastland rose well above its spillway level again. Lake Cisco caught a much needed three feet of water, it was reported.

Farmers who were looking wistfully at brassy skies a year ago hoping for some sign of rain were looking at the clearing skies this week and hoping they would stay clear for some weeks.

The ground was so saturated that it will take a long while for low fields to be in shape to be worked.

However, the county's peach crop appeared to be the best in four years, although insects, encouraged by the wet weather, were thriving in unsprayed orchards.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said that the cotton boll worm, which also invades ears of corn, was working on peaches in some orchards of the county, an almost unheard of thing.

## Donations To Cancer Drive Are Lagging

Contributions to the Eastland County cancer drive are lagging, Mrs. R. M. Perkins, who is state chairman for the drive, said this week.

She pointed out that the late Dr. M. B. Murdock, who died Sunday in a Mississippi airplane crash, was one of the first to respond with a check after letters appealing for donations had gone out some while back.

Various others have sent in checks in reply to the appeal, but the response on the whole has been much slower than hoped for, she said.

Dr. Murdock was intensely interested in the fight on cancer, and recently spoke before the Lions Club on it. Mrs. Perkins suggested that donations might be sent in as a memorial to his memory.

## Eastland School District Swelled By Consolidation

The Eastland School District will benefit financially and in other ways as the result of the action of the Eastland County School Board last week in consolidating the Bedford and Grapevine School Districts with the Eastland district, an analysis showed.

Size of the new district is two and a half times the former area. The old district was 18 square miles; the Bedford district brought in another 18 miles, and Grapevine was nine square miles.

The two districts will bring in to the Eastland School District treasury over \$2000 a year in local tax funds.

In addition, to defray the costs of gathering up the students over the wide area, the state will pay \$31.50 for each student transported two miles or more. This will apply also to the present students in the Eastland district, of whom it was estimated there are 12 or 15 in this category.

Last year there were 43 scholastics in the Bedford and Grapevine districts, and they attended the Cisco schools, as students from the districts have for 14 years.

However, talk in Cisco that the big majority of the students in the two districts already have indicated a preference for continuing to attend the Cisco schools, with the implication that they are to be allowed to do so, was discounted on the basis of informed opinion.

The districts were consolidated bodily with the Eastland district, it was pointed out, and the only way any students from the districts may attend Cisco schools is with the permission of the County School Board.

It was believed the board would look with favor on the petition of high school juniors and seniors that they be allowed to finish their high school education where they have been attending, but that all other students likely will attend school in Eastland.

The Eastland School Board discussed briefly Monday night the problems arising from the consolidation, but delayed any kind of action until the recently Gilmer-Aiken school laws have been coded and distributed, said School Board President Norris Wilson.

It seems without doubt that one thing that will be necessary is purchase of a bus and hiring someone to drive it, or contracting to have the students brought in each school day.

The local board tried one school bus operation deal in the depression era, but soon discontinued it because it was costing the local schools money that was not to be had.

Action on annexing the two districts to Eastland and the Central District to Cisco wound up the county board's program of consolidating all dormant school districts in the county into active districts. There were 29 of the dormant districts in the county in March when the program began, said County School Supt. Carl Elliott, who did most of the paper work on the program.

A district is considered dormant if no school has been held in it for two consecutive years.

## Perforating Gun Co. Office Moved Away

The Perforating Gun Company, Inc., which has been located at 303 East Main Street in Eastland since last November, has discontinued its services in this territory and closed its office here.

Part of the Eastland personnel was assigned to Houston and part to Odessa.

While operating here the firm had a crew of five men and had two trucks on duty.

John Phillips, manager of the Eastland branch office, was sent to the Houston main office.

Mr. and Mrs. Billy Hicks of Eastland will leave Friday for Odessa, where they will make their home. Mr. Hicks has been employed by the Perforating Gun Company in Eastland, and has been transferred.

## Side Issues

Red had set the new Side Issues heading on a machine in the Baytown shop and brought it up here on a visit to his family, consisting of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Collins of Carbon, brother, Joe Collins, the county treasurer, sister, Miss Betty Collins who is employed at the bank, and various others I can't at the moment recall.

Anyway, Red now is at Baytown, which formerly was Goose Creek and which I think did right well in the change of names, although Goose Creek was right picturesque or something.

Loss of Dr. and Mrs. M. B. Murdock in the tragic airplane crash has hung heavily over Eastland this week and it has amazed me that so many persons I met in daily life had so many personal memories of a young couple that had been in Eastland only a couple of years.

Aside from the personal feeling of loss, Eastland also is faced with the fact that a great gap has been left in its medical ranks. Dr. Murdock and Dr. Kenneth Cowan were the only young doctors practicing in Eastland, and both of them had nearly all they could do.

As Dr. Cowan pointed out, medical practice is a fluid thing in this part of the country, and many patients go to Ranger and Cisco and Gorman rather than seek out a local doctor, but still, the doctor supply is going to be somewhat short here until someone fills the gap left by the death of Dr. Murdock.

And as Dr. Cowan pointed out also, young doctors don't usually like to set up for practice in a (Continued On Page Eight)

## Olden, M. Valley, Desdemona And Scranton On List

Four high schools in Eastland County have been put on notice that if their scholastics do not increase, they may have to send their high school students to other and larger high schools of the county.

The schools are Morton Valley, Olden, Scranton and Desdemona.

Deputy State Superintendent of Schools Clive Pierce has recommended to the State Department of Education that the four high schools be allowed to continue as is for the next school year as fully accredited high schools, with the recommendation that if the high schools do not show an increase by next year, that after one year they make arrangements to send their high schools elsewhere.

Under this arrangement, the districts in question would continue to operate grade schools as they do now.

Desdemona almost lost its high school the past school year, but local residents raised funds to meet a deficiency in the teacher salary fund caused by the small number of students in the high school.

A change-up of the state school administrative set-up caused by enactment of the Gilmer-Aiken laws may have some bearing on the matter, since the present state school administrative officers may be replaced by another group altogether, but sponsors of the Gilmer-Aiken proposals have been positive in their stress on the need for consolidation school districts in Texas, so it seems unlikely the situation will be greatly changed as regards the warning given the four high schools.

A copy of Pierce's recommendation was received by Eastland County School Supt. Carl Elliott.

Rev. J. Morris Bailey and his family arrived Thursday in Eastland, where he was appointed pastor of the First Methodist Church to succeed Rev. J. M. Bond, pastor for the last year who was assigned to the Trinity Methodist Church in northeastern Fort Worth.

Mr. Bond and his family left Fort Worth Wednesday.

Mr. Bailey, his wife and their children, Evelyn, 9, and Robert, 5, arrived from Corsicana, where he had been pastor of the 11th Avenue Methodist Church for two years.

Prior to that he had held pastorates in Putnam, Ellisville, Mineral Wells, and Glen Rose, and was in the Army for three years. He was a chaplain with the Combat Engineers of the First Army in Europe.

Mr. Bailey said he was especially glad to come to Eastland, since he and his wife have lived in this section of Texas and liked it very much. Both attended Baylor University in Waco, Mr. Bailey's home town, and he received his theological degree in S.M.U.

Mr. Bailey is particularly interested in working with young people, and last year was elected dean of the annual Youth Assembly at Georgetown. This summer he will teach a course on "Youth Friendships" at the assembly.

In Eastland the Baileys will be closely associated with Robert Clinton, musical director at the church, who was in high school in Putnam when Mr. Bailey was pastor there.

In Corsicana, Mr. Bailey was active in civic affairs. He belonged to the Civitan Club and was active in its work.

## O. W. Legg, Owner Of Famed Hunting Dog Pack, Dies After Long Illness

An old Eastland hunter went on to the happy hunting grounds when Oran W. Legg, 69, died in a Ranger hospital after a long illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Legg were held Monday afternoon in the Hamner Chapel, with burial in the Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Legg, a painter by trade, once said in his later years that he painted and hung paper to make a living, but lived to hunt with his pack of hound dogs.

His fox and cat (bobcat) hunting pack was famous in this part of the country, and Mr. Legg dearly

loved to take the dogs out on a spring night and sit on a hilltop while following the dogs by ear as they coursed the valleys below on the trail of a hapless fox.

Recently, he had sold off a number of his dogs, as his illness progressed.

In recent years he had kept the dogs penned at various spots near the southeastern fringe of Eastland.

The dogs that were left of his pack he left to Jim Drake, who often accompanied him on the hunts.

Mr. Legg had made his home in the Texland Hotel in Eastland since September, when L. Y. Morris, his step-brother, and Mrs. Morris moved to Granbury. He had lived with the Morris family for 20 years.

Survivors other than Mr. and Mrs. Morris are a brother, George Legg of Albuquerque, N. M., who was unable to attend the funeral because of illness, and a nephew, L. Y. Morris, Jr.

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## 286 Cows Bred To Date In Dairy Group't Program

A total of 66 cows was bred in May under the artificial breeding program of the Eastland County Dairy Association, to make a total of 286 cows bred since the program began Feb. 8, according to Harry Crow, breeding technician for the association.

However, Crow pointed out, it is time to call a halt to the program for a while, as much as possible. He pointed out that cows for commercial milk production should be bred so as to come fresh in the fall and winter months, when milk production is at a low ebb normally, and demand reaches a peak.

Anyone living in town or in the county can get their cows bred artificially by calling Crow at Carbon.

He is subject to call seven days a week, but it was requested that he be called by 10 a. m. on the day the service is needed. The total cost is \$6 for the first service, with two repeat breedings free of charge if necessary.

A. Z. Myrick, president of the association and a Cisco dairyman, said that to his knowledge the cost of the artificial breeding is cheaper than feeding and taking care of a bull.

"We cannot afford to own the kind of bulls that are at the North Texas Artificial Breeding Farms, and we miss out if we do not take advantage of the opportunity to improve our dairy cows in this way," said Myrick.

The breeding farm cooperates with the Eastland County group to make the breeding service possible.

## 4-H Club Boy To Get Registered Heifer

A registered Jersey heifer calf from the dairy herd of Mack Clayton of Eastland will be given June 25 to some 4-H Club boy of the county, Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper said this week.

The calf will be given under the Sears dairy program, and will go to the winner of an essay contest. Title of the essays is "Why I chose a Dairy Demonstration."

The contest was open only to 4-H boys who previously have had dairy projects in the club.
