A horned toad, California style, was received air express Thursday from Coalinga, Calif., to enter in the Eastland Horned Toad Derby Saturday, but no name accompanied the racer.

The horned toad, grayer than the Eastland County variety, was sent in return for the entries Eastland has been sending to horned toad races in Coalinga for several years.

In fact, the Eastland derby was patterned somewhat after the one in Coalinga, which drew a crowd of 15,000 persons in a town about the size of Eastland when it was held this year in May.

Water Allowable Raised In Eastland

You can sprinkle that lawn a little more freely now, if it doesn't rain any more, because the City of Eastland this week raised the consequence in about a month, water minimum allowable from 7500 to 10,000 gallons per month.

In other words, you now can use 10,000 gallons for the same price you can 1000 gallons.

The increased allowable was made retroactive to July 1, but will apply only to the summer months.

It was pointed out at a public meeting sponsored by the City Commission Friday evening that the minimum allowable once was 30,000 gallons per month in the summer months in Eastland, but no return to that figure was in sight.

Others pointed out that the city has a third more water meters than in those days, and no more pumping or settling facilit-

It also was pointed out that Lake Eastland almost ran dry last fall, and could do it again.

seems to me that at least a couple of guys in Eastland should wish they had kept quiet. although by their lights they may think they were doing the right and proper thing, and I give everyone the benefit of the doubt.

And this is no slap at the City Commission members, who have been most co-operative.

But I would like to say this: except in the most unusual circumstances, as long as I am editor The Record will print news as it happens, to the extent of my ability to get it. My view of the function of any newspaper is to let the public know what is going on, because after all, the freedom of the press is guaranteed in the Constitutions of the United States and the State of Texas for

Many public officials, especially in this day and time, think they know what the public needs a lot better than the public does.

That is where the press comes in and always has come in under our democratic system.

But I didn't start out to make speech. What I ddi start out o say is that The Record will not co-operate" with public officials or anyone else, if by "co-operating" is meant the suppression or playing down of news that we consider of interest to the public, and harmful only to the extent that it might arous public opinion.

We will refrain from printing news that aids criminals, or does hurt to any individual or group unnecessarily.
