## **Court Expected** To Take Action On Increases Monday

Eastland County officials and employees likely will be voted a salary increase of from five to 10 per cent next Monday at the meeting of the Commissioners Court, members of the court said this week after the matter had been discussed in court sessions.

The increases are permitted by a new Texas legislative act. The act, in fact, permits increases of 25 per cent in salaries of elected officials and 35 per cent in the salaries of appointed county employees.

County Judge Lewis Crossley pointed out that during the years of inflation when other categories of workers were getting salary increases from time to time, the employees of Eastland County did not get a single raise.

"Our salary base is the same was in 1935," he said. During that period the

receiving \$3675 per year where in the depression era they were getting \$3500, but the increase was not a cost of living raise, but came automatically because the county got into a different salary bracket under state laws applying to total county valuations.

Judge Crossley said that several county courts had granted salary increases to officials and employees amounting to 10 per cent, but he knew of no counties that had granted the maximum 25 and 35 per cent increases.
