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Only Taxpayers Eligible To Vote In Election Saturday

Persons who will be eligible to vote in the school election in Eastland Saturday are resident citizens of the enlarged Eastland Independent School District who own taxable property, have rendered it for taxation, and who have paid poll taxes. School Board Secretary Ross Rucker said in a letter to rural voters this week.

The election Saturday will be to determine whether the entire new consolidated district will assume the bonded debt of the former districts, and whether the school tax rate shall be raised to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation over the entire district. Voting will take place in the office of the justice of the peace in the basement of the Eastland County Courthouse. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

In his letter, Rucker said that the vote on the assumption of the bonded debt is "nothing more than a legal technicality which must be acted upon after the initial consolidation of districts." As to the tax rate, he pointed out that school districts all over Texas are voting on new tax rates so as to come under state aid requirements of the new Gilmer-Aikin laws.

"It appears," he wrote, "that the Gilmer Aikin Law will make it a necessity for all districts in the state to adopt the \$1.50 rate if they are to raise the funds that they are called upon to raise under the new system." Eligible to vote are residents, qualified as explained above, of the Eastland, Bedford, Grapevine, Reagan and Leary School Districts, now all combined with the Eastland district by the County School Board.

A simple majority will decide each of the two issues in the election.

Stock Of Eastland Store Is Liquidated

A sale liquidating the stock of the White Auto Associate Store in Eastland will begin in the former White store at 9 a. m. Saturday, it was announced this week by J. W. Nelson of San Angelo, who purchased the stock and fixtures from Tony Falletti. Nelson said he intends to continue to operate the store, but as a dry goods establishment featuring fabrics, lingerie, hosiery and household goods. The new store will be known as Nelson's, the same name borne by Nelson's large store of the same type in San Angelo.

R. V. McDavid is in Eastland to liquidate the auto store stock. McDavid said bargains in fabrics, home furnishings, and other items also are being featured during the disposal sale.

County's Peanut Crop Prospects Best In Many Years

Plans Are Begun For Next Year's Derby Events Here

Profits from the Eastland Chamber of Commerce on the first annual Eastland Horn Toad Derby held July 16 were \$277.62, final figures compiled this week by Manager H. J. Tanner revealed. Chamber officials said the money will go into a special fund to help make next year's derby events bigger and better.

L. E. McGraw, chairman of the general derby committee, pointed out that the amount of the profit came as a surprise to all who were helping promote the derby, since none of them had expected the event to be such a big success in its first year.

"We planned everything too small for the crowds this year," he said. "Next year it will be different." McGraw, who is thinking of next year's derby in terms of bigger prizes, more entries, more and bigger carnival concessions, and so forth, said he will call a meeting soon of Eastland organizations that helped make the carnival a success this year. The meeting will be to lay the groundwork for the event next year, he said.

75 Attend Sessions Of Colored Baptists

Davenport dismissed the county's injunction suit against the City of Eastland on the meter matter, saying the law was on the side of the city, with no doubt in the matter. But he also expressed hope for a compromise in the dispute between the two governmental units.

This was after John Turner, as legal spokesman for the city, had advised the court that no matter which way the decision went, the city would not put parking meters around the Courthouse until and unless the Commissioners Court requested that they be put there.

Good Rains Bring Hopes Of Bumper Farm Harvests

Old Mother Nature, apparently repenting of her unkind and drouthy treatment of Eastland County for the past two years, laid down a magnificent crop-making rain this week.

It was the first good general rain at this time of the year in the county in many years, and seemed to assure a bumper crop of peanuts and late small grains. Farmers, however, reported in some sections of the county that earlier planted grain sorghums were not harvesting out too well, although the plants looked fine and heads were large.

In many instances, they said, the rains were not formed in the head, for some reason they did not know. Peanuts were looking the best they have since 1945, when a big crop was made, or earlier. With a big crop of over 47,000 acres planted, and some observers predicting a possible yield of 20 bushels to the acre or better, this year's crop of peanuts easily may bring in a cash return nearly double that of last year's 55,000 acre planting.

U. T. Law School Gets New Dean

AUSTIN.— The University of Texas Law School will have a new dean on Sept. 15. He is Werdner Page Keeton, 40 year old legal scholar who is leaving the deanship of the University of Oklahoma Law School to return to his alma mater.

He will succeed Dean Charles T. McCormick, who is retiring at his own request.

Keeton left the University in 1946 to become law dean at Okla. He had served on the faculty since 1932 with leaves of absence for study at Harvard University, where he earned the degree of Doctor of Juridical Science, and for government service during the war in several positions, including that of assistant chief counsel of the Petroleum Administration for

war. The Texas born law educator will head the largest law school of any state university and the University's oldest professional school.

Before a background of greenery garlanded with white gladioluses interwoven with daisies, the wedding vows of Miss Emilie Long and Mr. Billie Pat Owen were exchanged in a candlelight ceremony read by Dr. O. P. Clark of Sweetwater in the First Methodist Church of Eastland Saturday evening, Aug. 6.

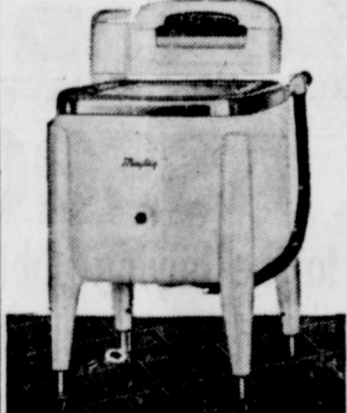
