Hopes Of Bumper Farm Harvests

Old Mother Nature, apparently repenting of her unkind and drouthy treatment of Eastland County for the past two years, laid down a magnificent cropmaking rain this week.

It was the first good general rain at this time of the year in the county in many years, and seemed to assure a bumper crop of peanuts and late small grains.

Farmers, however, reported in ome sections of the county that earlier planted grain sorghums were not harvesting out too well. although the plants looked fine and heads were large

In many instances, they said, the grains were not formed in the head, for some reason they did not know.

Peanuts were looking the best they have since 1945, when a big crop was made, or earlier.

With a big crop of over 47,000 acres planted, and some observers predicting a possible yield of 20 busels to the acre or better, this year's crop of peanuts easily may bring in a cash return nearly double that of last year's 55,000 acre planting.

The smaller figure this year was required by a return to government quota restrictions.

Prices this year, determined recently, will be only about \$5 a ton less than last year, a drop of about two percent. However, farmers will need to

make a bumper crop this year at good prices, if they expect to continue raising peanuts as a cash County PMA Administrator Em-

mett Powell said he had learned that next year's planting quotas likely will be reduced about a means that the total peanut acreage in Eastland County next summer likely will be about 32,000 acres, under the federal price

support program. However, Powell pointed out that before the war and its vegetable fat shortages came along, peanut plantings County averaged only about 30,-000 acres annually.

The lesser peanut acreage next year will force diversification on the better farmers, and may well force some of the poorer farmers out of business, with production costs still high. Powell pointed out. But this year's outlook was rosy

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

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


